TAKE NOTICE that the Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall deemed the following application to amend the Municipality's zoning by-law a "Complete" application under Section 34 of the Planning Act on June 5, 2019.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that pursuant to section 34 (10.7) of the Planning Act, the Application file is available to the public for inspection. Please contact Lori West, Clerk/Planner at 705-342-5252 to make an appointment to inspect the file.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall will hold a public meeting on July 17, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. at the Council Chambers, located at 5 Barager Blvd, to consider a proposed Zoning By-law amendment under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990.

THE PURPOSE of the proposed Zoning By-law amendment is to correct a number of zonings related to the Akzo Nobel (formerly D.I.L.) lands in the vicinity of Nobel. These lands include rezoning the former D.I.L. lands from the Residential Holding (RR-H) to the General Industrial (M1) Zone, Rural (RU) Zone lands to the General Industrial (M1) Zone.

THE EFFECT of the proposed Zoning By-law amendment is to fulfil a number of agreements between the owners and the Municipality.

One of the parcels being rezoned is the subject of an application under the Planning Act for a consent - File No. B32/2016 (McD)(C) – A&B.

Please refer to the opposite side of this Notice for a key map showing the land to which the proposed zoning by-law would apply.

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Municipality of McDougall to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Municipality of McDougall before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision.

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make a written submission to the Municipality of McDougall before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION and material about the proposed by-law is available for inspection at the Municipal Office during normal office hours. If you wish to be notified of the decision of the Municipality of McDougall on the proposed zoning by-law amendment, you must make a written request to the Clerk of the Municipality of McDougall.

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REPORT TO COUNCIL**PROPOSED REZONING****AKZO NOBEL (Sturino Lands)**

July 10, 2019

BACKGROUND

Akzo Nobel (formerly C.I.L.) has been working towards the objective of finalizing matters related to its legacy property at Nobel since the explosive manufacturing ceased in 1986.

This program has included a number of matters such as selling off surplus lands, undertaking environmental assessments, proposing consents to separate lands from retained lands believed to have some marginal environmental issues, closing historical landfills, agreeing to remediation plans and continuing to manage lands on a risk management basis.

On the part of the Municipality, it has worked closely with the land owner but has taken the position that it needed to take the necessary steps to ensure that the legacy property will not be a liability to the ratepayers of McDougall. Along the way, McDougall has placed the lands in an Interim Control By-law and ultimately zoned much of the company's lands in a Residential holding zone.

CONSENT(S)

Originally, Akzo Nobel proposed to sever off the surplus lands in Carling and McDougall known to have no residual contamination. These lands were peer reviewed by the Municipality.

The retained lands, although well characterized, were believed to be better retained for legacy purposes with attendant risk management responsibilities.

GRANDVIEW

Akzo Nobel discovered that it inadvertently transferred a portion of a landfill that is being returned to Akzo Nobel from Grandview.

The landfill has a closure plan that has been approved by MOECP but the lands need to be consolidated in the zoning by-law amendment before council with the other Akzo Nobel lands.

Grandview was to be compensated for the return of the former landfill lands. This arrangement has been discontinued for other considerations.

INTERIM CONTROL MEASURES

Council placed an interim control by-law on a number of parcels owned by Akzo Nobel that led to a Residential Holding by-law.

Akzo Nobel appealed this zoning for the former D.I.L. lands. After further negotiations, the owner withdrew the appeal and Council agreed to return the lands to the General Industrial (M1) Zone.

CURRENT STATUS

Akzo Nobel has an agreement to sell the lands to a new owner who has pledged to honour all of the terms and conditions agreed upon between the company and the municipality. This obligation is believed to be a matter understood by all parties.

The new owners are purchasing all of the Akzo Nobel lands. Therefore, the consent to sever part of the lands from the retained is no longer required.

The return of the former landfill lands (Grandview consent) remains outstanding but it is proposed to be completed as originally intended.

ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT

The subject zoning by-law amendment has two purposes:

1. Return Akzo lands to General Industrial (M1), and
2. Rezone Grandview lands to be returned to Akzo holdings to the General Industrial (M1).

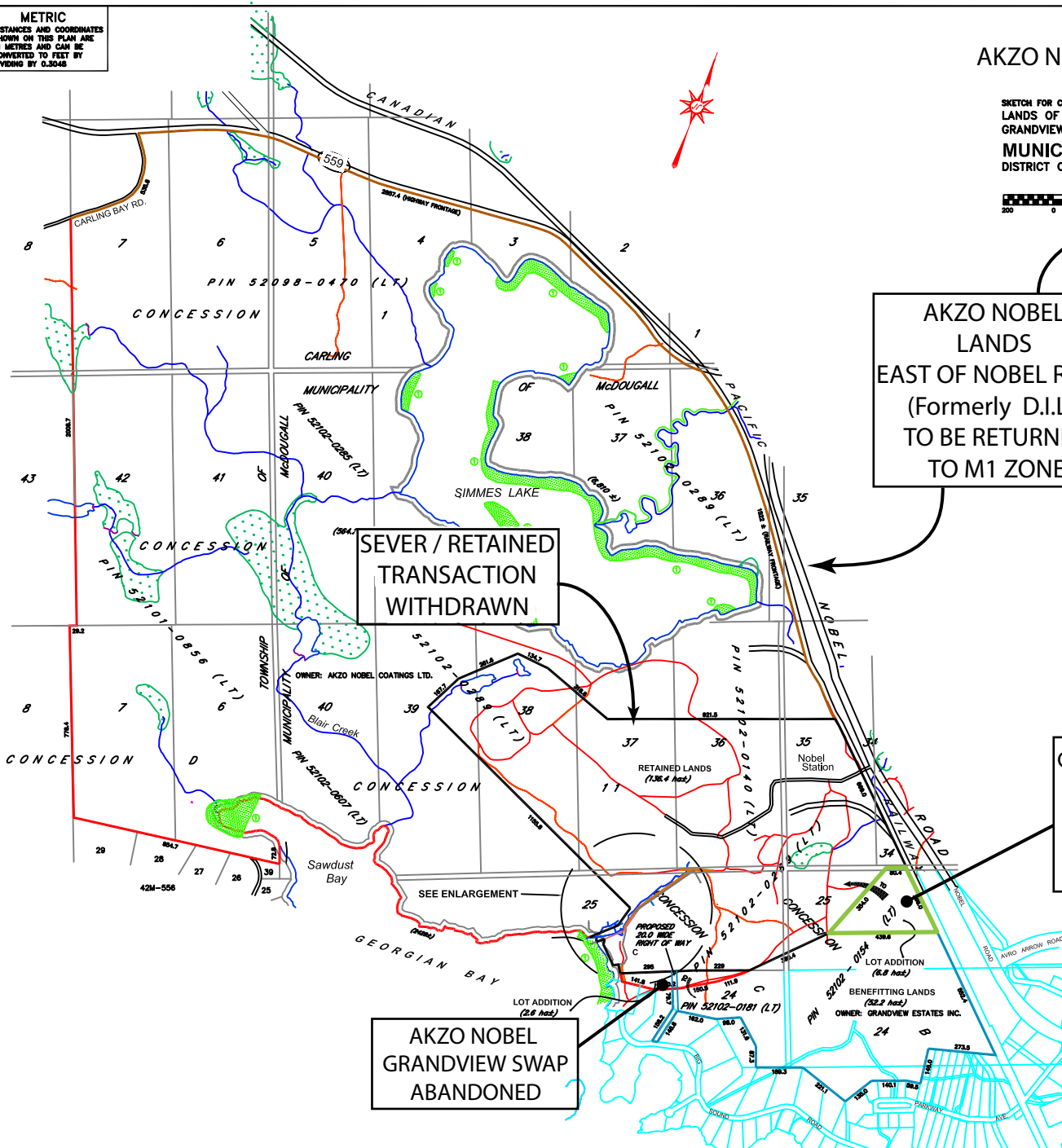

Report to Parry Sound Area Planning Board

CONSENT APPLICATION B20/2019(McD)

Applicant: Norma Curry

Part of Lot 13, Concession A, McDougall

June 21, 2019

Background/Purpose

Norma Curry has a Georgian Bay waterfront lot at 36 Oakridge Road North.



While there is frontage on Oakridge Road North, there is an existing right-of-way coming into the property and a driveway to Mrs. Curry's residence at the north eastern corner of the lot.

The driveway continues around the dwelling to access the waterfront on the subject property.



The purpose of the consent is to transfer the house to one of the children as part of estate planning. The shoreline or retained lands will be put on the market for sale.

Description of Lands

The subject lands consist of a well forested property with two distinct levels.

The upper level is where the existing Currie home is located off the terminus of Oakridge Road North.

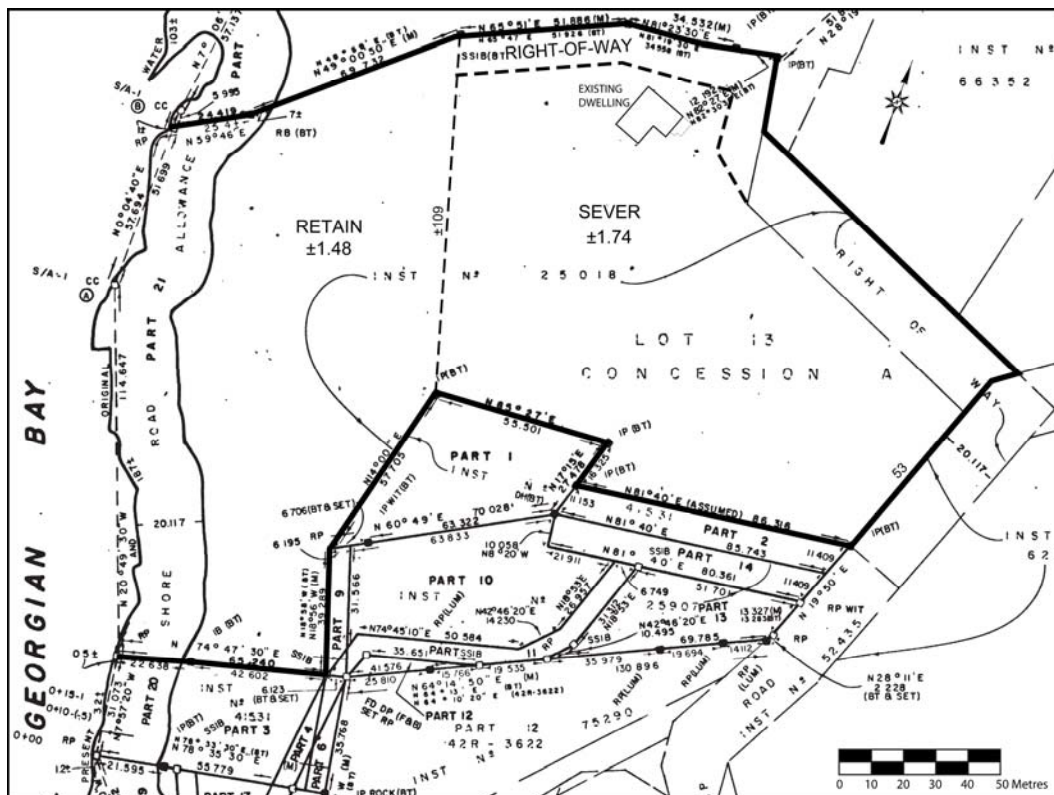
The lands are considered a waterfront property so that the result of this transaction is to create a new Residential (RR) lot.

The access to the waterfront will be along an existing driveway along the north boundary of the property.

The proposed consent is to create a road-front lot and to extend a right-of-way to provide legal access to the waterfront lands.

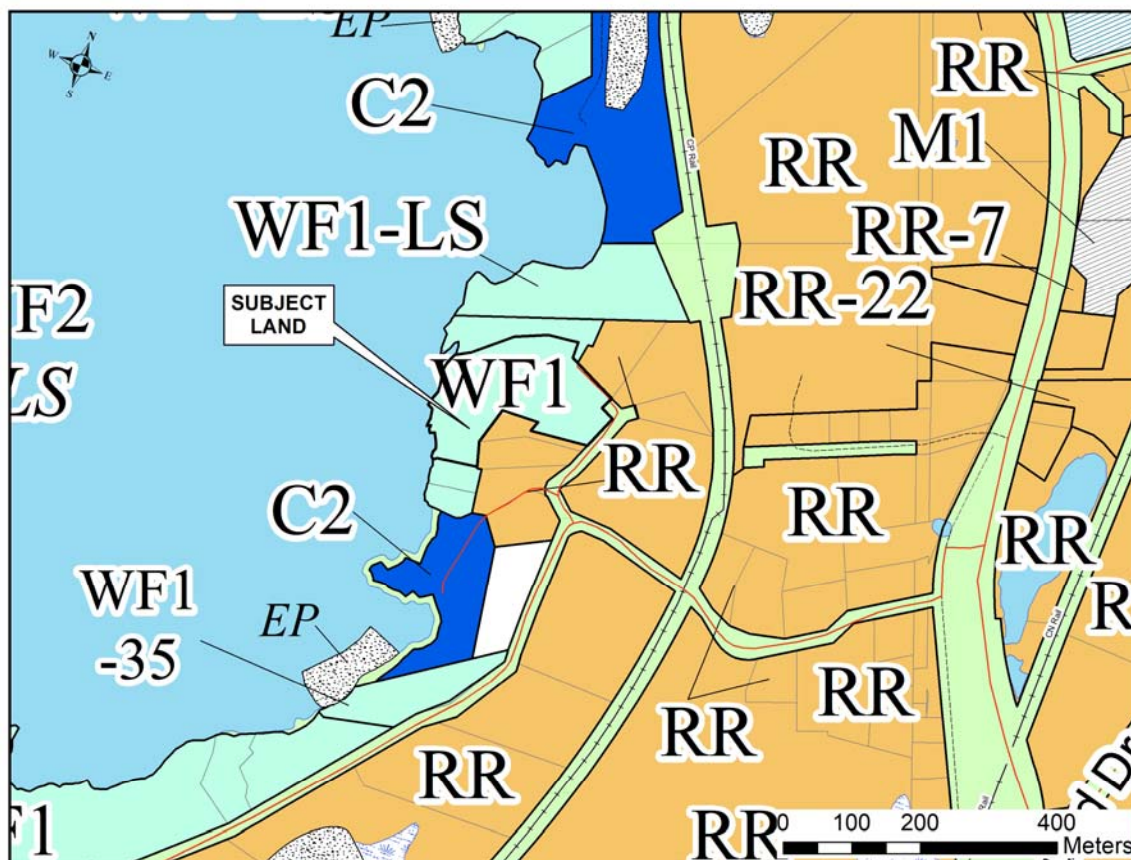
The lands are designated Waterfront. Once the road front lands are separated from the waterfront, the severed lands will be considered part of the Nobel Settlement Area.

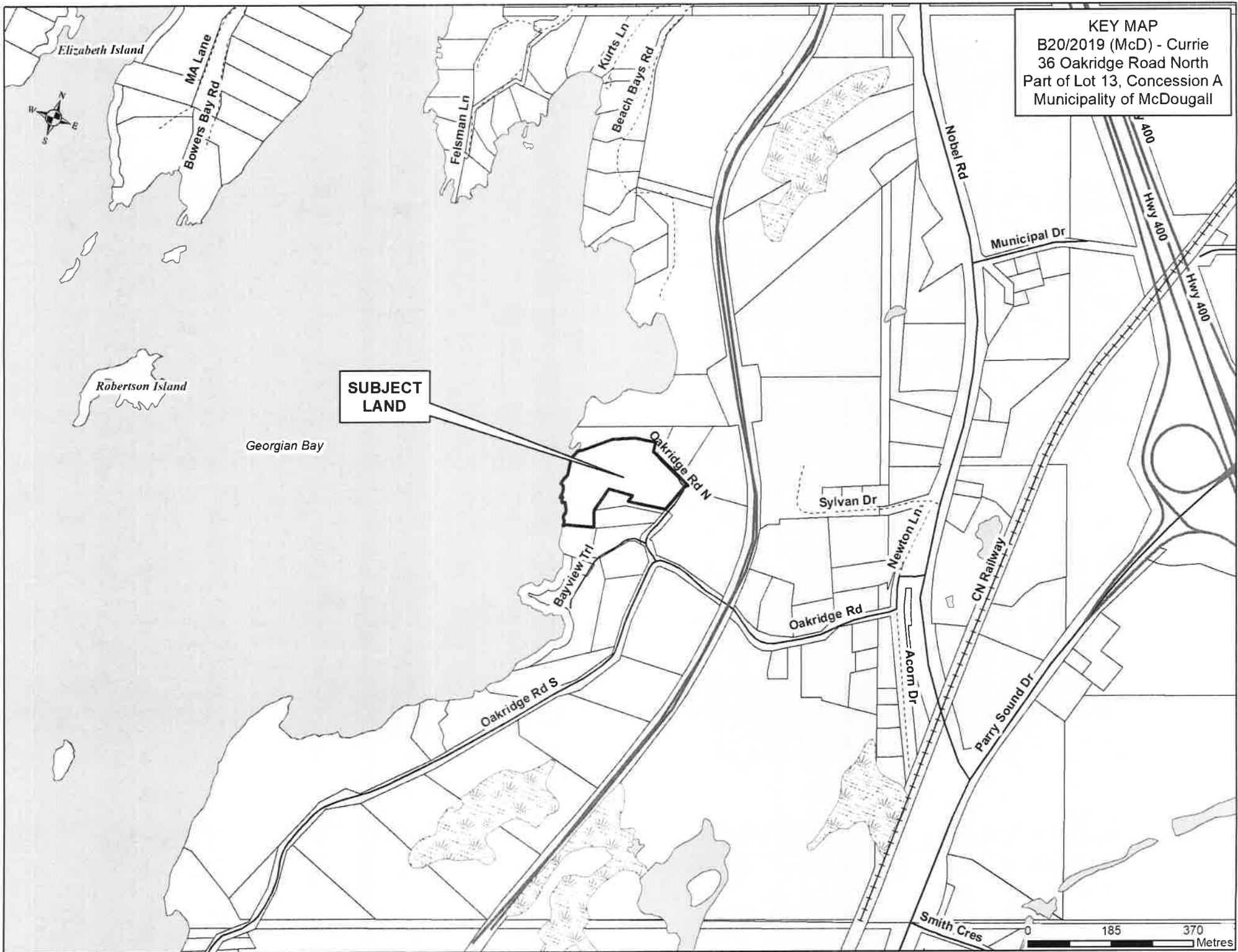

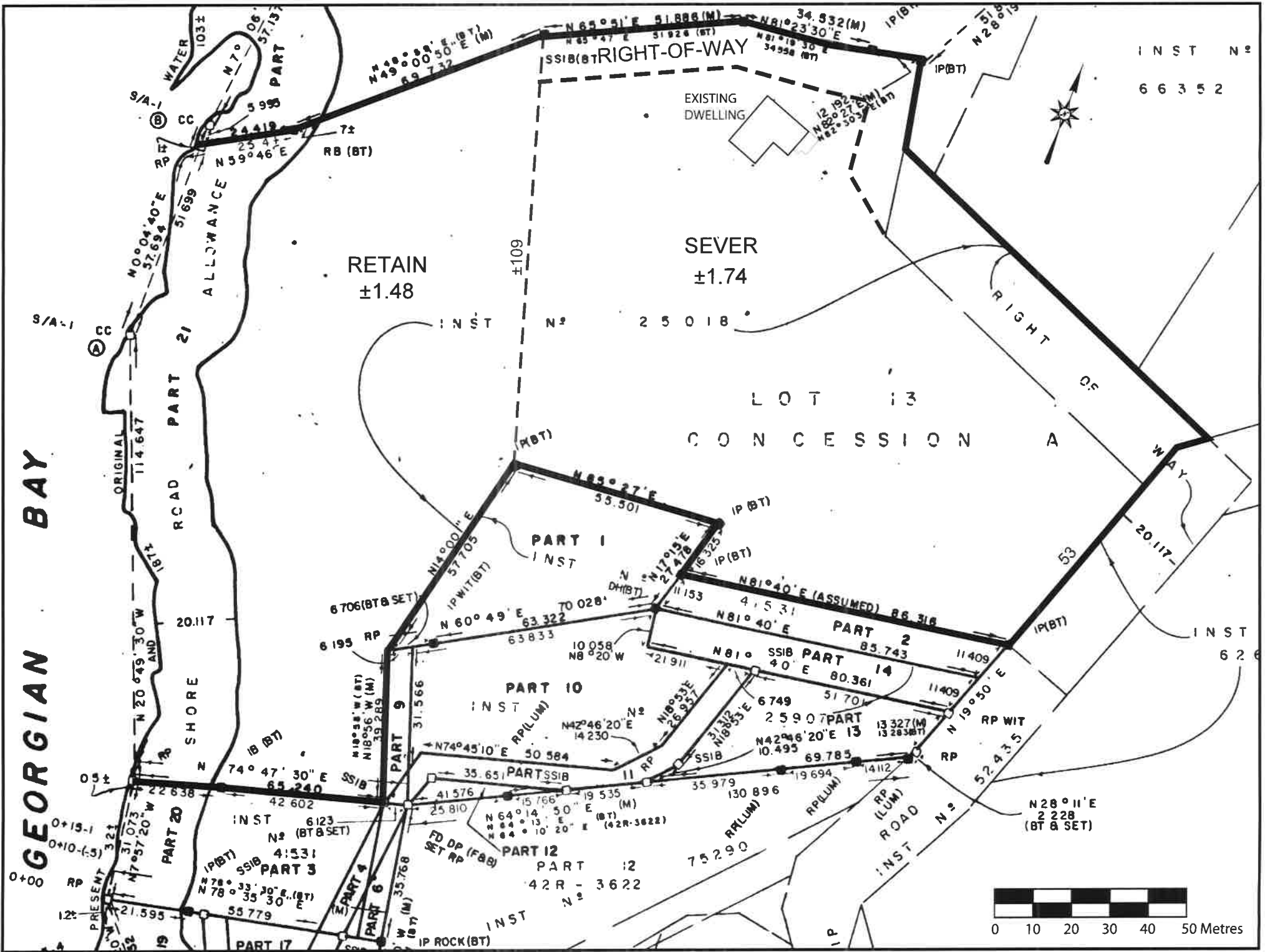

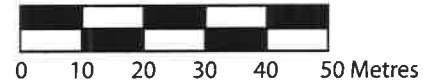

CREW TRAINING FIRE OPERATIONS

Between May and June, an intensive fire pump training program was facilitated by the department Captains. The training included theory and comprehensive hands on operations of all fire department pumps, including all portable fire pumps and the Pumper truck fleet. The main topics were drafting operations, pumping operations and fire ground operations. The final session was firefighter testing and evaluation. The success rate was 98% of trainees.

CREW TRAINING MENTAL HEALTHY FIRST AID

On June 25th, firefighters were introduced to mental health first aid. The session was administered by our Fire Chaplain. The training program was developed from certification training attended by the department Fire Chaplain and the department Public Information Officer. The awareness and initial intervention training the firefighters received was developed and implemented by Canadian Mental Health. This training is initiated from our Municipal PTSD Prevention Policy enacted in 2017.

The initial training delivered on June 25th covered signs and symptoms of emergency service member mental health problems for self-awareness and for peer firefighter awareness amongst the crew.

SMOKE / CO ALARM PROGRAM

On June 29 and June 30, 5 firefighter team members launched the fire boat and attended 18 water access properties on Georgian Bay and Nine Mile Lake. Ninety % of the cottages visited allowed firefighter access and inspection. Compliance rate for meeting the requirements of the provincial legislation was 100%.

A firefighter crew will be canvassing Trout Lake on Civic Holiday weekend in August.

RE: Upcoming Changes

We are writing to advise you of a number of proposed changes to the Assessment Review Board's Rules of Practice and Procedure, and certain practices at the Board.

On January 1, 2019, Tribunals Ontario was formed, consolidating the 19 Boards and Tribunals which were under three clusters within the Ministry of Attorney General. This change will help improve front-line service delivery to our clients who access the tribunal sector each year.

Tribunals Ontario is taking this opportunity to consider how changes to our service delivery model would enhance our effectiveness and efficiency.

In 2016, the Assessment Review Board embarked on extensive stakeholder consultations while developing the Strategic Plan to Resolve Appeals. The Board worked with its stakeholders to divide the appeals equally within the four year assessment cycle and a "commencement date" was assigned to each appeal. For every appeal, a set of timelines called the Schedule of Events was provided. The schedule established deadlines for exchanging documents and set expectations for the parties to engage with each other through a mandatory meeting. This also provided the opportunity for all parties to have a clear understanding of when and how they must start working on the resolution of the appeal.

We are now in the third year of the assessment cycle, and the Board continues to evaluate the caseload and the processes that were established at the beginning of 2017. Building on the Board's successes to date, and comments made at stakeholder committees, further changes are proposed to support the goal to further improve our process.

As such, we are proposing the following changes to the Board's Rules and practices:

1. Any appeal from a previous cycle that does not have a current cycle appeal (2017-2020) will be set to a new expedited Schedule of Events timeline, even if the appeal has been assigned a commencement date.

2. There will be an expedited process for dismissal of appeals for non-compliance with the Schedule of Events.
3. Every appeal will be assigned a “hearing event month.” If a hearing becomes necessary, it will be scheduled to take place during this month.
4. All hearing events before the Board will be scheduled as an electronic hearing unless there is prejudice as per section 5.2(2) of the *Statutory Powers Procedure Act* and the Board’s Rules.
5. Schedule of Events – General Stream Appeals will be reduced from 66-104 weeks to 40 weeks. This change will affect commencement dates on or after October 15, 2019.
6. The terms “Mediation” and “Settlement Conference” will be replaced with the term “Case Conference” in the Board’s Rules.
7. Schedule of Events – Summary Stream Appeals will be updated to allow for a staggered approach to disclosing issues, and the term “disclosure” will be changed to reflect “description of issues.”
8. Rule 18(d) will be amended to more specifically require that “grounds” for appealing to the Board are articulated. This amendment will affect the 2021-2024 cycle of appeals.

As some of these proposed changes require Rule changes, Tribunals Ontario will be seeking input from stakeholders in the coming weeks, and encourages your comments and suggestions at that time.

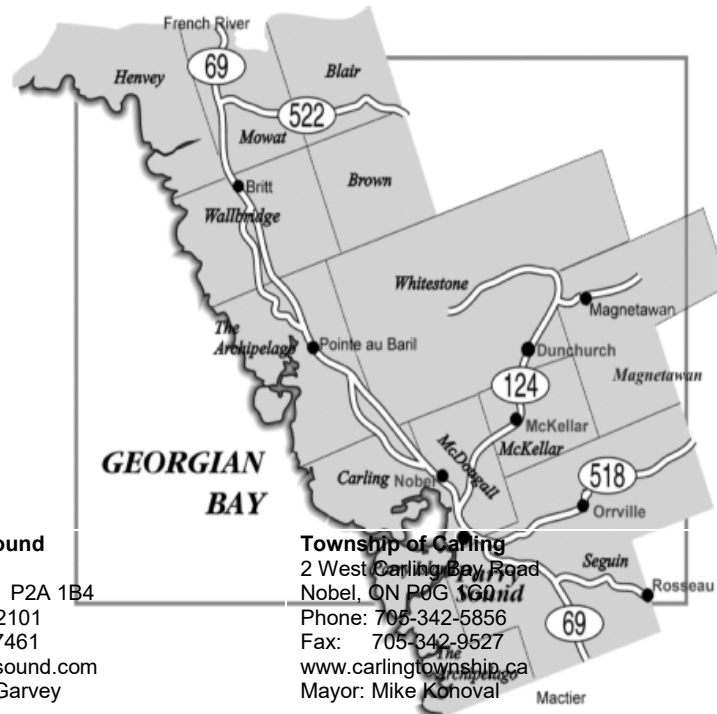

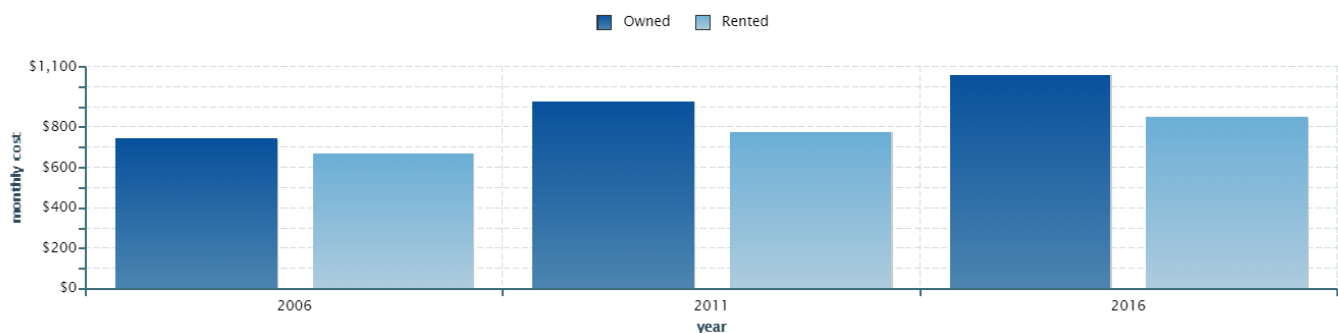

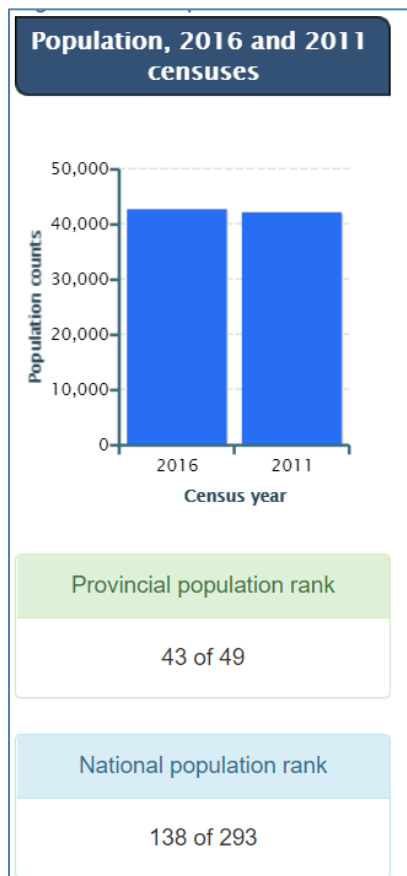

Average monthly shelter cost, Parry Sound, 2006 to 2016



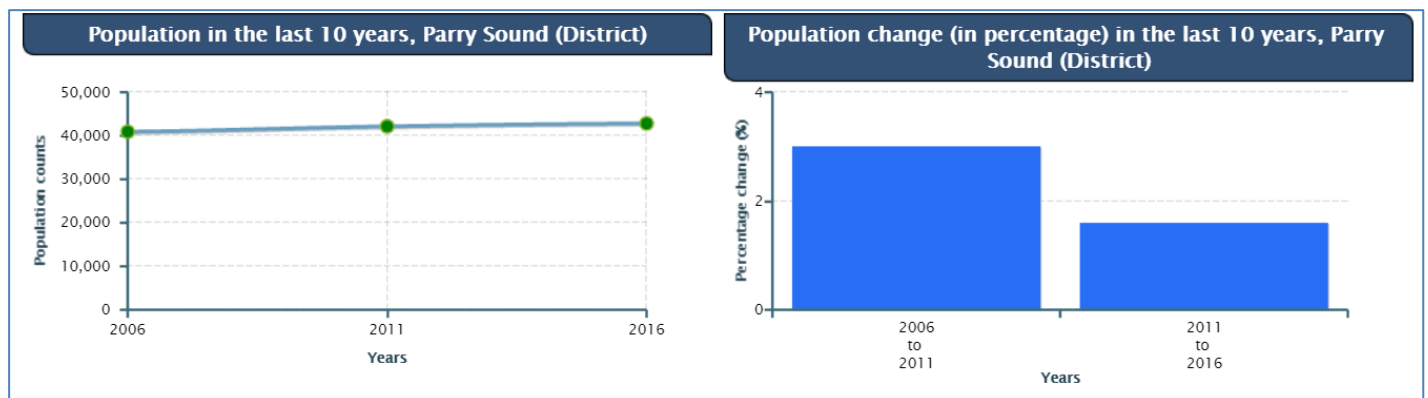

Parry Sound District- Age Distributions, 2006 to 2016

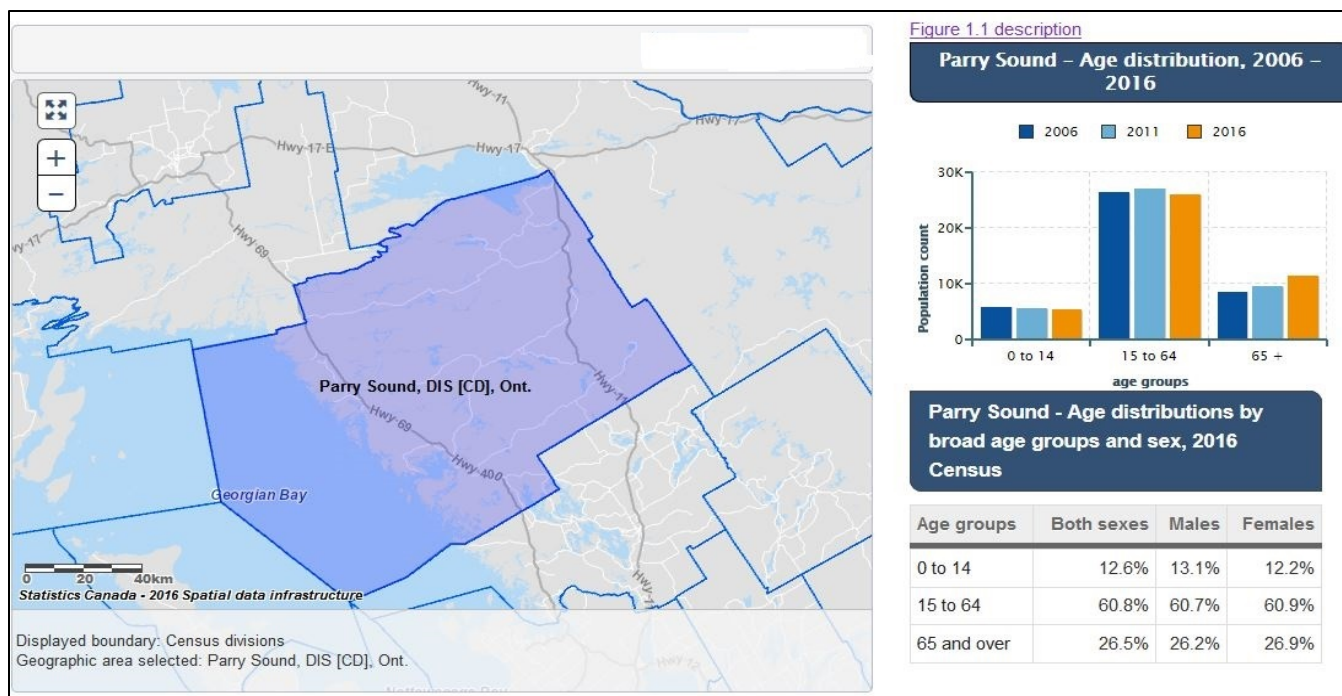

Population Change by Broad Age Groups, Parry Sound District

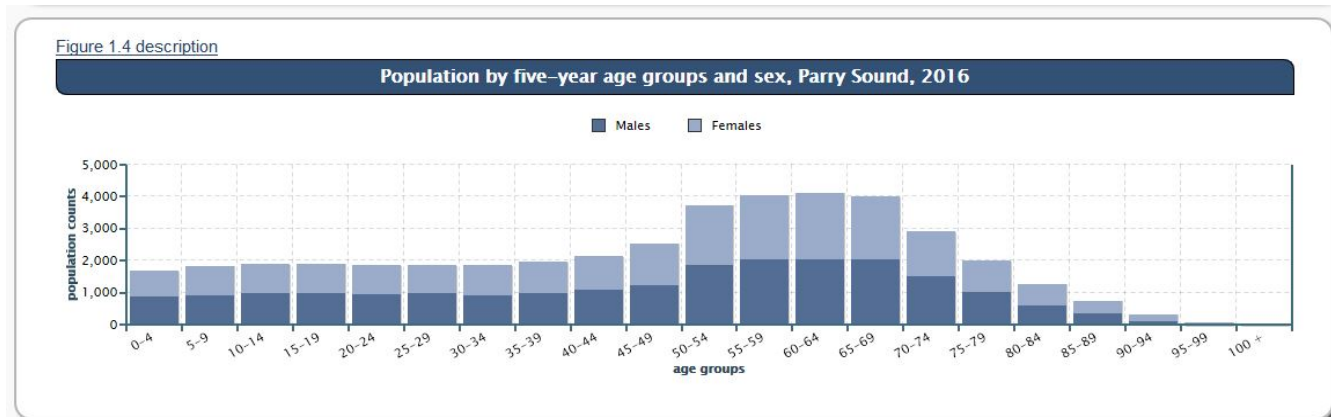


Figure 1.4 -This line graph shows the population by five-year age groups and sex, Parry Sound, 2016. The Y axis shows population counts.

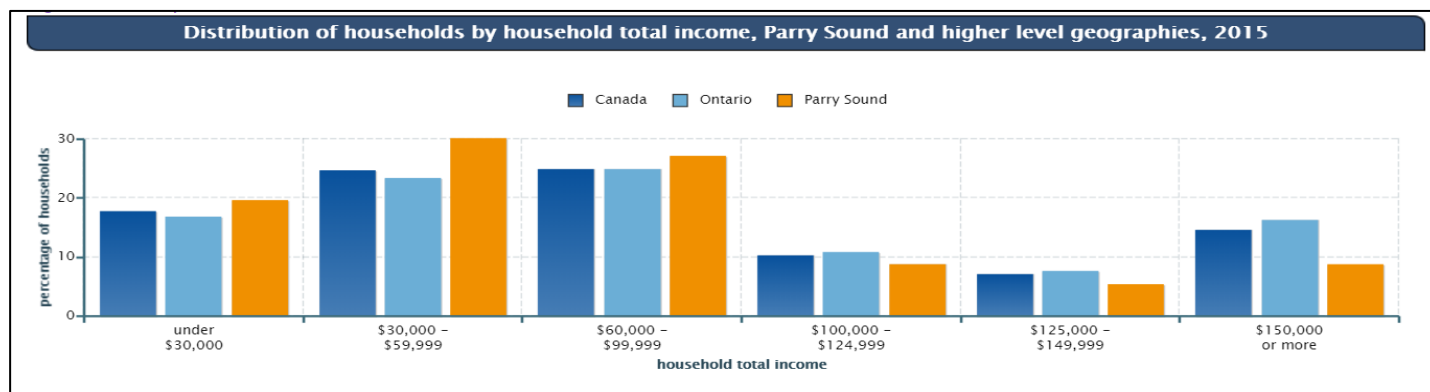

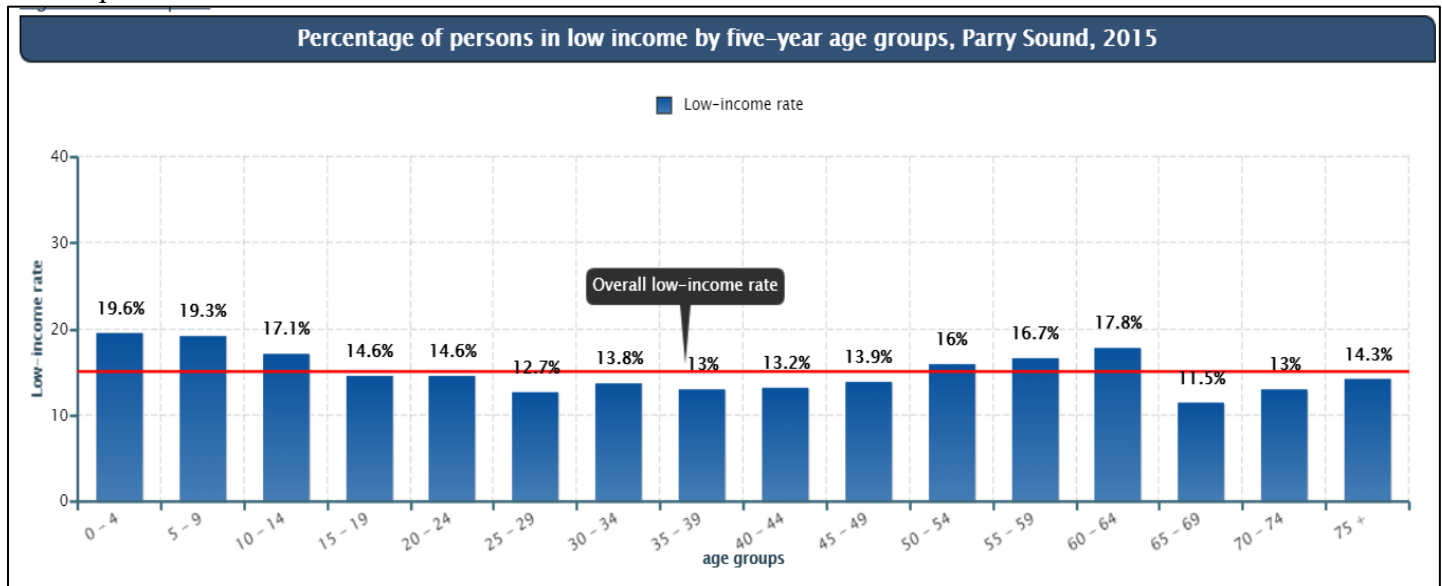

- In 2015, 6,160 persons or 15.1% were in low income, while in 2005, 15.4% of the persons in Parry Sound lived in low income².

- Persons living in lone-parent families had a higher rate of low income at 29.1%, while those living in couple families without children had a lower rate of 9.2%.

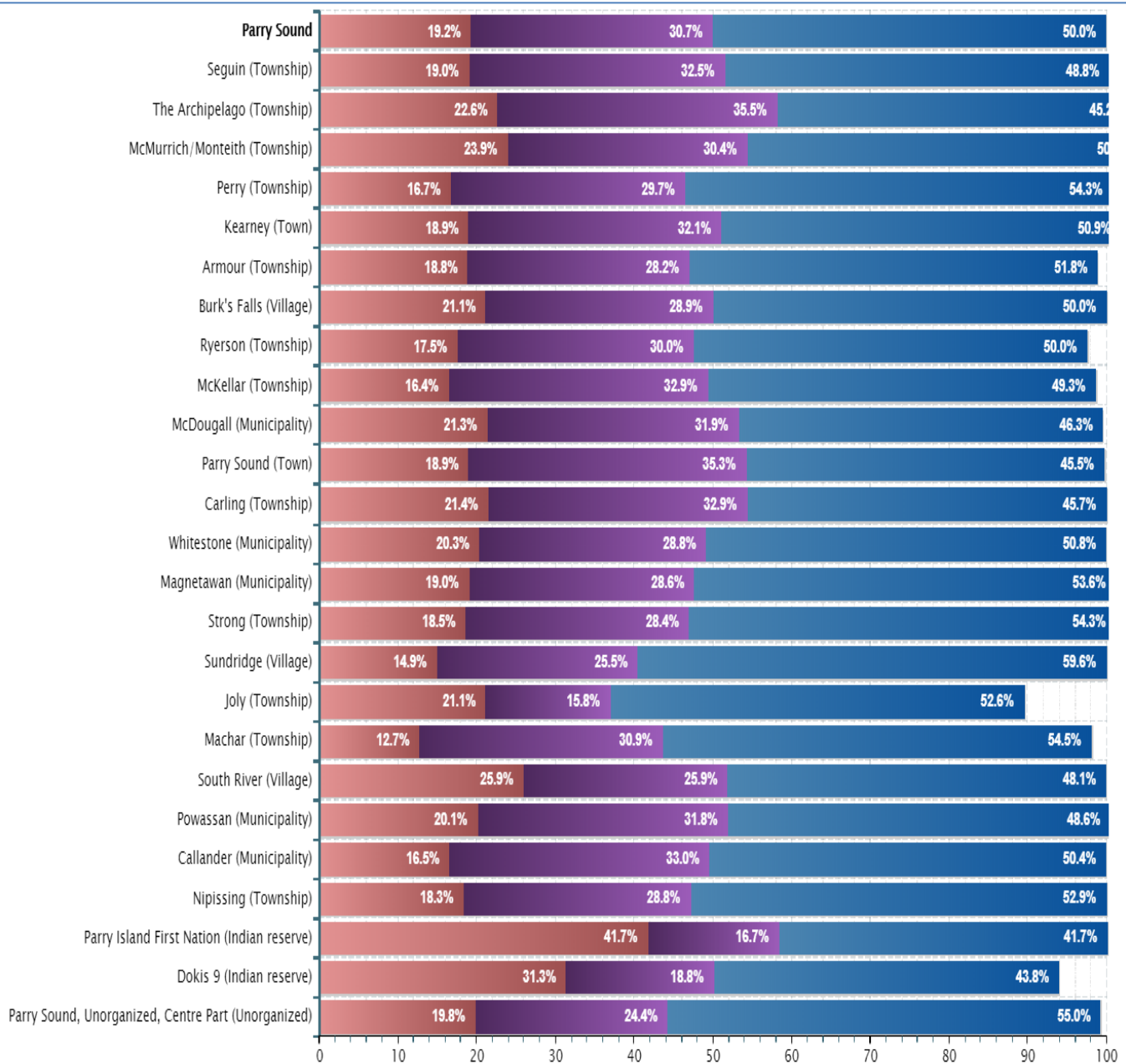

■ A man had higher income

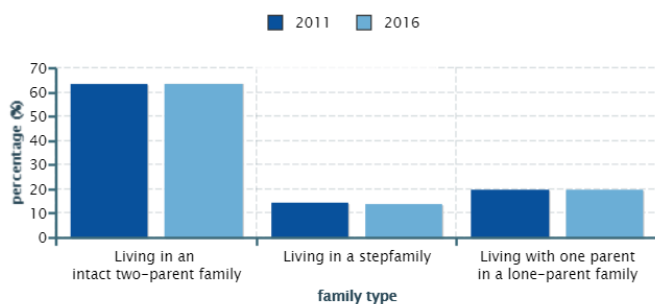

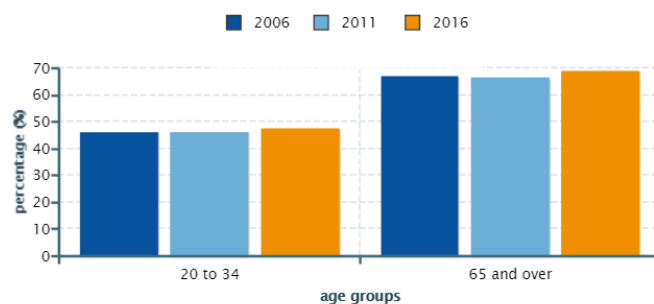

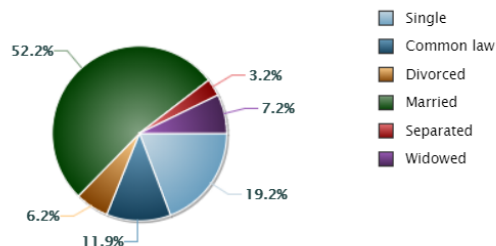

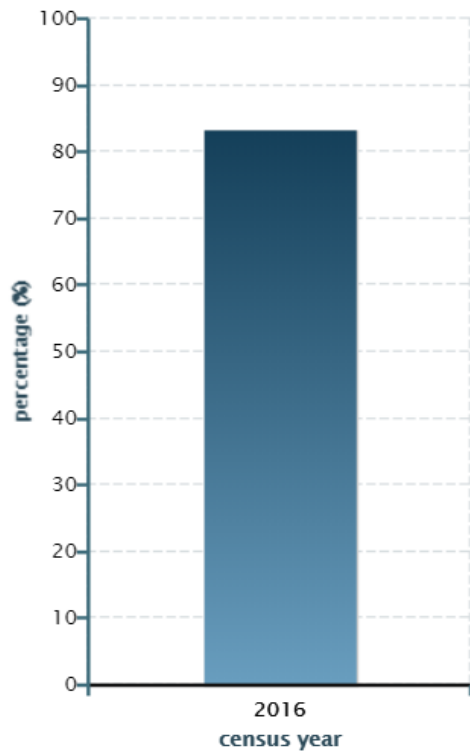

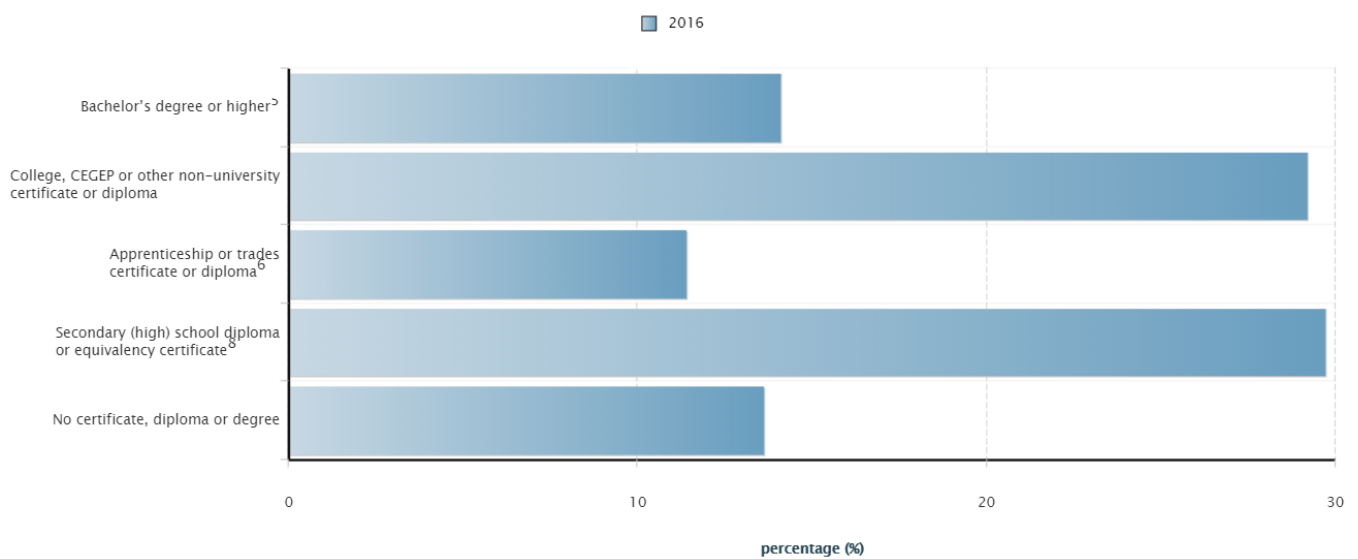
Education, Parry Sound District

- In 2016, 83.3% of people aged 25 to 64 in Parry Sound had a high school diploma or equivalency certificate, compared with 86.3% in Canada.
- In Parry Sound, 14.1% of people aged 25 to 64 had a bachelor's degree or higher in 2016, while 29.2% had a college, CEGEP or other non-university certificate or diploma as their highest level of education, and 11.4% had an apprenticeship or trades certificate or diploma as their highest.
- In Parry Sound, 10.9% of women aged 25 to 64 with a bachelor's degree or higher studied STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics), compared with 26.6% of men. On the other hand, 89.1% of these women studied BHASE (non-STEM) fields of study such as business, humanities, health, arts, social sciences, education, etc., compared with 73.4% of men.

Percentage of the population aged 25 to 64 years with selected highest levels of educational attainment,^{3 4} Parry Sound, 2016

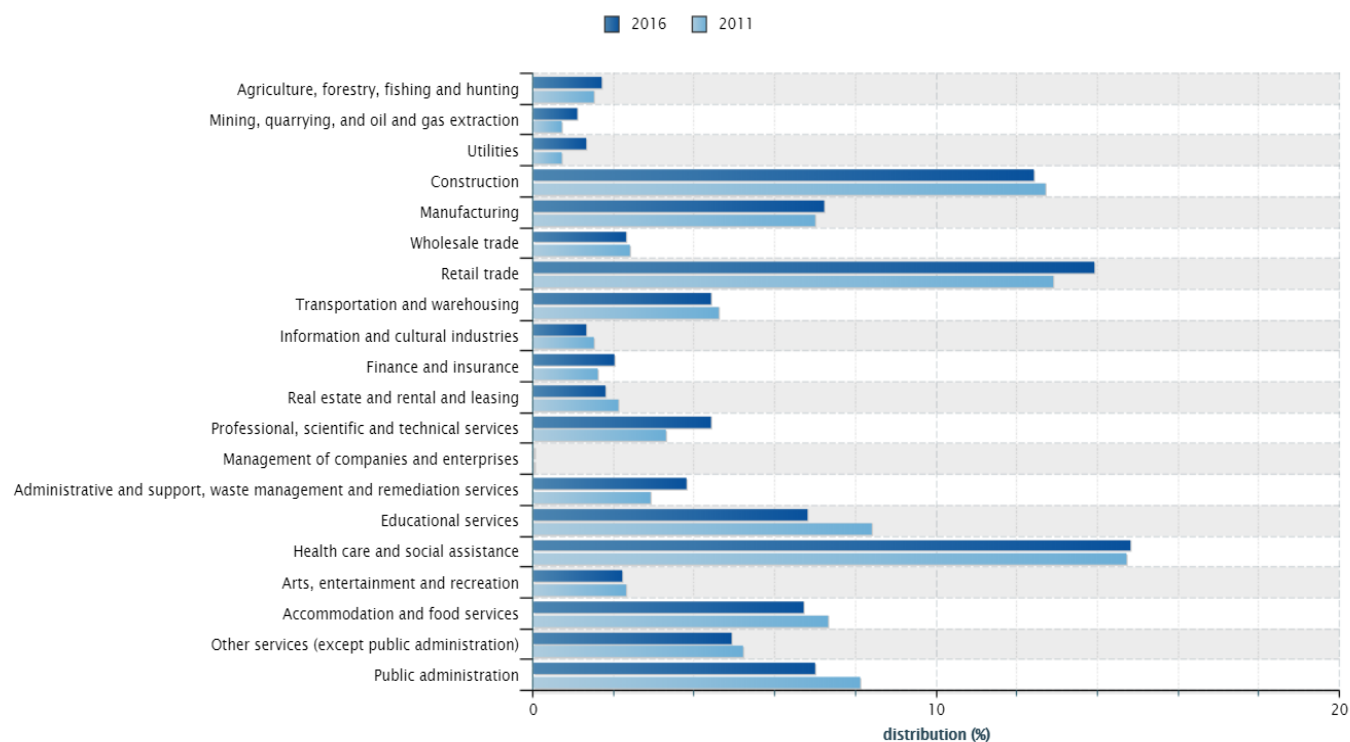

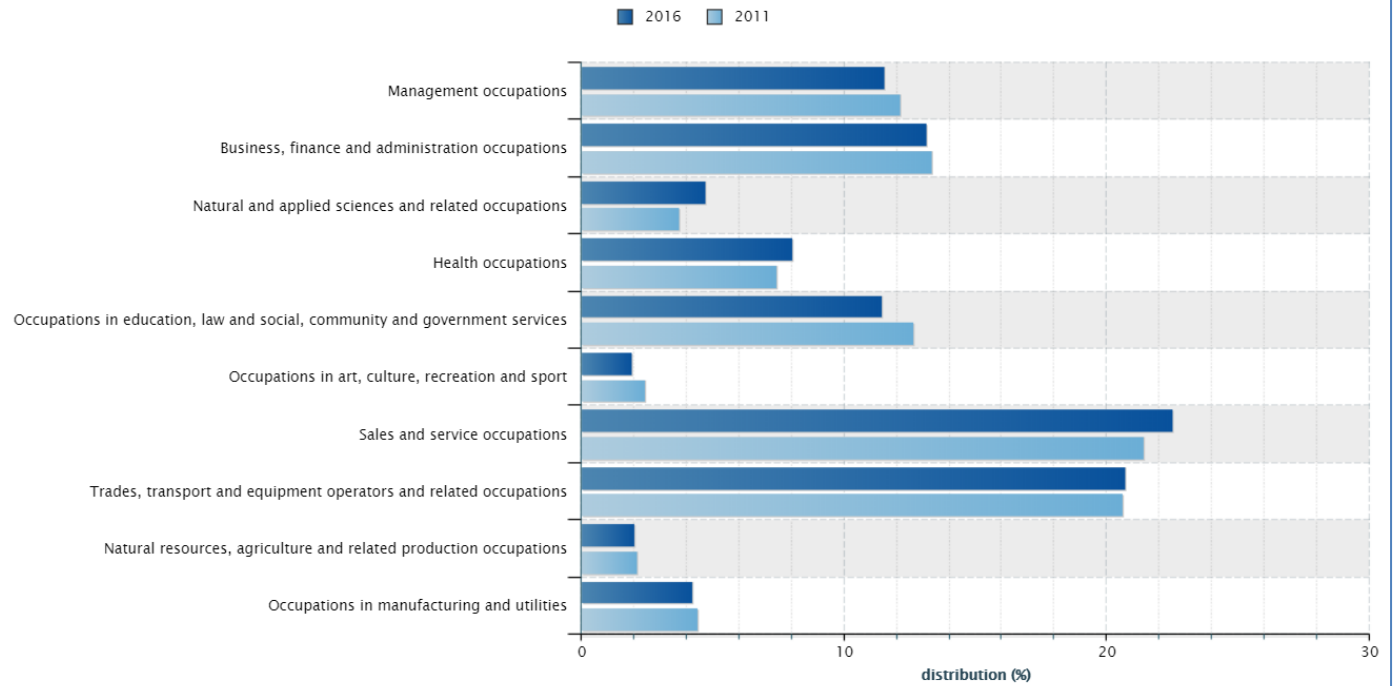

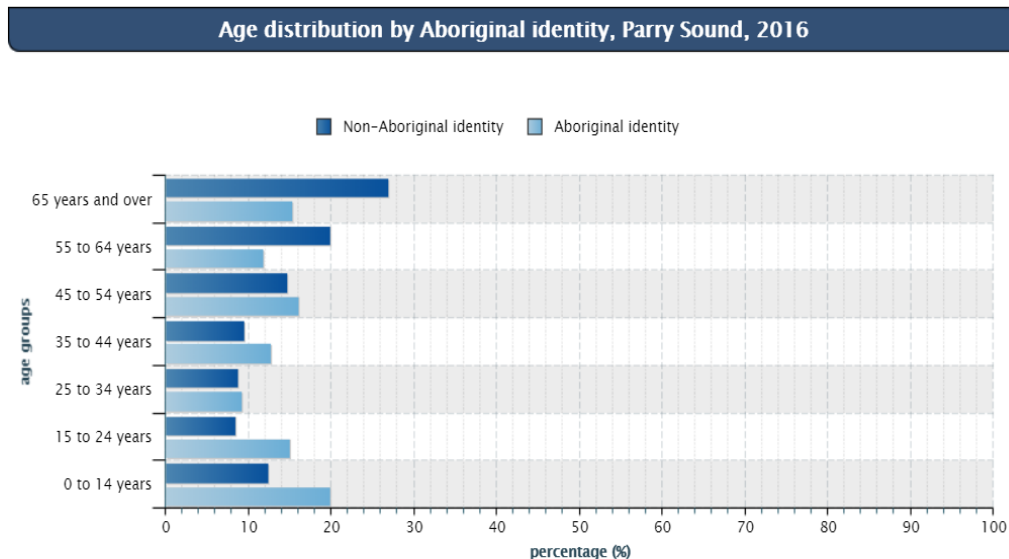

At its meeting held on June 10, 2019, St. Catharines City Council approved the following motion:

WHEREAS people who menstruate need adequate and appropriate access to menstrual products so that they can experience their full health potential, maintain dignity and participate fully in community; and

WHEREAS according to Plan Canada International study, one-third of Canadian women under the age of 25 struggled to afford menstrual products; and

WHEREAS the inability to afford menstrual products is a health equity issue; and

WHEREAS there is a need for low or no cost menstrual products; and

WHEREAS menstruating is a natural bodily function, and access to menstrual products is as necessary as access to toilet paper; and

WHEREAS universal access to menstrual products contributes to the normalization of menstruation and enhanced access in a dignified way; and

WHEREAS other Canadian cities, including London and Sarnia are already piloting and/or assessing the feasibility of menstrual product access programs; and

WHEREAS recreation centres and libraries service a large population, diverse in age and socioeconomic status; and

WHEREAS public-facing City of St. Catharines facilities can be accessed by all members of the community at no cost;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of St. Catharines work towards providing free menstrual products (pads and tampons) in all public-facing municipally-run facilities in the following ways:

1. That staff report back to Council outlining options and costs for a pilot project that would offer menstrual products in select recreation centres and library locations;
2. That the evaluation of the pilot project also include qualitative data from people using the products;
3. That the results of the pilot project inform the feasibility of expanding the provision of free menstrual products in all public-facing municipal buildings;
4. That if passed, the Clerk's Office notify all school boards and municipalities in Ontario of the City of St. Catharines' initiative and encourage them to do the same.

Furthermore Be It Resolved, that the Board, having engaged in this work since 2017, anticipates sharing with the Ministry its experiences so that other regions may benefit and further anticipates providing to the Ministry its expert advice on public health functions and structures for the Northeast; and

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE IN LAKE NIPISSING IN PATTERSON AND NIPISSING TOWNSHIPS

PATTERSON AND NIPISSING TOWNSHIPS – The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) would like to advise the public that a harmful algae bloom (cyanobacteria), also known as blue-green algae, has been found in Lake Nipissing (Campbell's Bay in Patterson Township and Simpson's Bay in Nipissing Township). Species of the algae capable of producing toxins were confirmed by the laboratory of the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks. The toxins in harmful algae can irritate the skin and, if swallowed, cause diarrhea and vomiting.

Due to the many factors involved, government authorities are unable to determine where and when there are no toxins. Users are advised to exercise their judgment. For further details on the location of the algae bloom, and sampling process, contact the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks - Spills Action Centre - 1-800-268-6060.

If you are near where a bloom was detected or where a bloom is visible, follow these safety measures:

- Do not use the water. This includes drinking, cooking, bathing, and brushing teeth. Note: Using a private water system or boiling the water will not destroy the toxins.
- Do not swim and avoid water sports where a bloom is present.
- If skin contact does occur, wash with soap and water then rinse thoroughly with clean water to remove algae.
- Limit the amount of fish flesh you eat. Some toxins can build up in fish and shellfish. Do not eat the liver, kidneys and other organs. Be careful not to cut the organs when filleting.

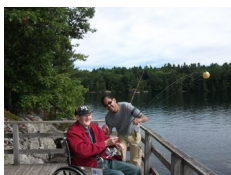

Quick Facts

- Cyanobacteria – also called harmful algae, blue-green algae or 'pond scum' – are not really algae, but tiny bacteria.
- Although usually hard to see, during hot weather they can grow rapidly to form a large mass, called a bloom. Blooms continually change and are difficult to predict. Wind, temperature or sunlight could change where the bloom is located in the water.
- Dense harmful algae blooms may make the water look bluish-green, or like green pea soup or turquoise paint. Very dense blooms may form solid-looking clumps.
- Fresh blooms often smell like newly mown grass, while older blooms may smell like rotting garbage.
- Even when a bloom has disappeared, toxins can persist in water bodies for a period of time.
- Long-term toxin exposure at high levels may cause liver and nervous system damage.
