Appendix 2

Some General Requirements for Development Applications

Planning Application Fees

Fees are required for permit(s) and certificate(s) of approval and set by individual permitting agencies. There is also an application processing fee for plans of subdivision/condominium to be submitted to the Parry Sound Area Planning Board at the time of submission of the application. Please see the attached Fee Schedule for more details.

Early Consultation

Prior to formally submitting an application, the applicant and/or agent(s) are strongly encouraged to contact staff of the Parry Sound Area Planning Board to discuss the development proposal. Early consultation is highly beneficial, as the applicant can review the proposal with Planning Board staff and discuss what supporting documents and information may be required.

"Conformity to/does not conflict with" Provincial Plans:

Planning and development applications must conform/not conflict with the policies in provincial plans.

Consistency with the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS):

The Provincial Policy Statement provides policy direction on matters relating to land use planning and is intended to protect provincial interests. The Planning Act requires that decisions affecting planning matters "shall be consistent with" with the PPS which supports a comprehensive, integrated and long-term approach to planning in Ontario, and recognizes linkages among policy areas. The PPS is intended to be read in its entirety and the relevant policies are to be applied to each situation. For more information, visit the ministry website: www.mah.gov.on.ca.

Conformity to Official Plan

Assessment/review of a plan of subdivision/condominium is based on land use planning legislation, policies and principles and potential social, economic and environmental impacts. A major consideration is conformity to the official plan policies. Applicants are advised to determine if the proposed development is in conformity with official plan policies by discussing the proposal with the Planning Board.

Some Commonly Required Permits and Approvals:

Part 8 Permit/Certificate of Approval for Sewage System Plans of subdivision/condominium proposed on small, private sewage servicing systems, generating 10,000 or less litres of effluent per day on one lot, require a Part 8 Permit under the Building Code issued by either the local municipality, public health unit (HU) or area conservation authority (CA) where it exists and there is no health unit. The municipality, local health unit or conservation authority administers Part 8 of the Building Code that sets out the standards for locating accepted kinds of sewage/septic systems on a lot. Prior to issuing a permit, the health unit would inspect the property, may stake the septic system site and recommend to the planning approval authority whether a servicing options report and/or a hydrogeological report is required.

Plans of subdivision/condominium proposed on larger sewage systems that generate more than 10,000 litres of effluent per day on one lot would require a Certificate of Approval from the Ministry of Environment (MOE) under the Ontario Water Resources Act. Some larger private or communal sewage treatment systems are also subject to the Environmental Assessment Act (generally where there is a surface water discharge).

If servicing works associated with the proposed development are subject to the provisions of the Environmental Assessment Act, the notice of public meeting for the EA application should follow the "Integration with the Planning Act" process and state that the public meeting would address the requirements of both the Planning Act and the Environmental Assessment Act. For more information on larger private or communal sewage treatment systems, contact your regional Ministry of Environment Office.

Communal Systems

Communal septic systems for the development of five or more lots/units would require a servicing options and hydrogeological report.

Communal septic systems proposed for the development of less than five lots/units and generating effluent of more than 4,500 litres per day would need a servicing options and a hydrogeological report,

Communal well systems for the development of more than five lots/units would need a servicing options and a hydrogeological report. Communal well systems for non-residential development may need a hydrogeological report.

Where communal services are proposed (water and/or sewage), need for confirmation, through a signed letter of acceptance, that the municipality or other public body would assume ownership and maintenance of these systems.

Proposal for Servicing: if the project requires a Class EA under the Environmental Assessment Act, contact the Ministry of the Environment to discuss the proposal.

Entrance Permits:

Any plan of subdivision/condominium that is in close proximity to a provincial highway or has the potential to impact upon a provincial highway, would require entrance permit from the Ministry of Transportation issued under the Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act. Contact your local Ministry of Transportation office to obtain information on permit requirements.

Record of Site Condition (RSC) for Contaminated Sites

Proposals for sensitive land uses on sites with potential soil contamination would require the completion of an environmental site assessment (ESA) by a qualified person to determine the extent of contamination and to recommend actions for site remediation.

A change in activity regardless of the zoning could also trigger the need for an RSC as applicable law under the Building Code. A RSC is required when changing from industrial, commercial or community use to a more sensitive land use, such as residences or schools. For more information on contaminated sites, refer to Ontario Regulation 153/04 (Records of Site Condition - Part XV.1) made under the Environmental Protection Act and Ontario Brownfields website at www.on.ca/brownfields or contact your local Ministry of the Environment.

Permit for Alteration to Shoreline

If a proposal has potential to impact fish habitat or cause alteration to a shoreline, a permit would be required prior to any site alteration(s) or erecting of structures. Permits would be required from a local conservation authority or, if there is no conservation authority, the Ministry of Natural Resources. Applicants are advised to discuss their proposal with the Planning Board. You may be directed to contact your local conservation authority or the Ministry of Natural Resources office, as required, prior to making a formal application under the Planning Act.

Work Permit under the Public Lands Act


In accordance with Public Lands Act regulation 453/96, work permits from the Ministry of Natural Resources are required for the construction of trails, roads, water crossings and structures that would be located on any public lands under the administration and control of the Ministry of Natural Resources. The same regulation also requires work permits for filling, dredging, removal of aquatic vegetation, and structures occupying over 15 sq. meters of a shore land.

"Shore lands" include the beds of most navigable waters which are normally Crown owned, as well as adjacent private shore lands if they are contiguous with Crown owned lands. Therefore, a work permit is required from the Ministry of Natural Resources for 'in water' work on most navigable waters, as well as any adjoining private shore lines.

Permit to Take Water

Section 34 of the Ontario Water Resources Act provides that "no person shall take more than a total of 50,000 litres of water in a day" for wells or surface water supply without a permit issued by a Director of the Ministry of the Environment.

Applicants must fulfill related conditions of draft approval prior to obtaining any environmental approvals (Certificate of Approval, Permit to Take Water, etc.). Please refer to Section 34 of the Ontario Water Resources Act or contact your local Ministry of Environment for more details.

Background:

The purpose of this report is to update council on the building permit activity up to the end of January 2021.

The number of building permits issued to the end of January 2021 is 6 compared to 4 issued for the same period in 2020. The permit fees assigned for the month of January 2021 is \$2668.00 compared to \$1560.00 for the same period in 2020. The value of construction to the end of January 2021 is \$209,460.00 compared to \$130,000.00 in 2020.

Building department activity remains busy with inquiries for future projects. Inspection requests remain very steady. I am continuing to issue building permits during the emergency order. It is the responsibility of the permit applicant or property owner to determine if the construction proposed qualifies as essential under the guidelines of the Provincial order.

The new online building software is very close to implementation. We are busy working with Cloudpermit to customize our system to meet our needs with the goal of going live in February 2021.

As we approach the half way point of winter we are continuing to maintain our winter operations throughout the municipality. The conditions thus far have allowed our sand and salt tonnage this year to remain on the average to lower end of usage.

With this winter so far being a bit easier than last year, we have been able to keep on top of our winter maintenance of ice blading, snow removal in turnarounds, parking lots, intersections and around fire hydrants.

The operations and capital portion of the draft budget for roads, transfer station and landfill is now complete.

Our grader is currently out of service due to transmission failure and other issues, this piece of equipment is scheduled for replacement in the 2021 capital budget. We are currently using a rental grader in order to maintain our road system.

Dept. Wide: COVID-19 procedures are still in place to reduce the potential spread of the virus. We have made keeping our Essential Services running a priority. We have been able to maintain regulatory compliance within the Department.

Landfill Leachate:

The facility has been functioning well. We are experiencing moderate flows for this time of year. We are completing end of year reports and coordinating with WSP for the site Annual Monitoring Report.

Nobel Water:

The system was inspected by the MECP via email and phone calls in the 2nd week of December 2020. The MECP report dated Nov 24,2020 is now available (see attachment 1). Our final inspection rating was 98.05% with and inspection risk rating of 1.95%. We have reviewed the report and any room for improvement or correction have been dealt with.

See attached (attachment 2) Summary Report 2020 for the McDougall Nobel Distribution System. This report is directed to Council as per requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). Also attached (attachment 3) is the Annual Report 2020 for the McDougall Nobel Distribution System. This report is to be made available to the public as per the (SDWA). We have no major concerns for 2021 and plan on meeting or exceeding compliance points as before.

Crawford Septic:

Seasonal flows to the bed are low. 6000 imp. Gallons of sludge were removed in December from the Septic Tank as part of the routine annual maintenance program. In 2021 we plan on developing a long term assessment with long and short term recommendations for the septic bed and system.

The McDougall Nobel Distribution System is a stand-alone distribution system which receives treated water from the neighbouring Town of Parry Sound Drinking Water System (DWS#220000585). There is a written legal agreement between the Town of Parry Sound and the Municipality of McDougall for the supply of drinking water to the Municipality of McDougall from Parry Sound's North Sector Water Tower.

The Municipality of McDougall is the accredited operating authority and retains responsibility for operational and sampling responsibilities for the McDougall Nobel distribution system. Thus, an agreement under section 5(4) of O. Reg. 170/03 is not required.



Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks Inspection Report

The McDougall Nobel Distribution System began receiving treated water from the Town of Parry Sound Drinking Water System on December 20, 2006 and consists of: a booster chlorination system located at the North Sector Water Tower; approximately 265 service connections and a service population of 800 residents.

Issue #2 of Municipal Drinking Water Licence (MDWL) #263-101 and Drinking Water Works Permit (DWWP) #263-201 were issued to the Municipality of McDougall on April 11, 2016.

The North Sector Water Tower provides elevated water storage for parts of the Parry Sound DWS as well as the entire McDougall Nobel Distribution System. The operators have access to a room in the water tower which houses:

- two chemical metering pumps;
- a sodium hypochlorite storage tank (with spill containment); and
- a continuous free chlorine residual analyzer.

The system is equipped with Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system.



INSPECTION SUMMARY:

Introduction

The primary focus of this inspection is to confirm compliance with Ministry of the Environment,
 Conservation and Parks (MECP) legislation as well as evaluating conformance with ministry drinking water policies and guidelines during the inspection period.

This drinking water system is subject to the legislative requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act, 2002 (SDWA) and regulations made therein, including Ontario Regulation 170/03, "Drinking Water Systems" (O.Reg. 170/03). This inspection has been conducted pursuant to Section 81 of the SDWA.

This report is based on an inspection of a "stand alone connected distribution system". This type of system receives treated water from a separately owned "donor" system. This report contains elements required to assess key compliance and conformance issues associated with a "receiver" system. This report does not contain items associated with the inspection of the donor system, such as source waters, intakes/wells and treatment facilities.

This inspection report does not suggest that all applicable legislation and regulations were evaluated. It remains the responsibility of the owner to ensure compliance with all applicable legislative and regulatory requirements.

The McDougall Nobel Distribution System is owned and operated by The Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall. The distribution system is registered with the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks under Drinking Water System (DWS) #260079131.

The McDougall Nobel Distribution System is a stand-alone distribution system which receives treated water from the neighbouring Town of Parry Sound Drinking Water System (DWS #220000585). There is a written legal agreement between The Corporation of the Town of Parry Sound and The Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall for the supply of drinking water to the Municipality of McDougall from Parry Sound's North Sector Water Tower. The McDougall Nobel Distribution System consists of 265 service connections and a population of approximately 800 persons.

This inspection has been conducted pursuant to sections 81 and 103 of the Safe Drinking Water Act. This remotely-conducted drinking water inspection included: discussions with the Overall Responsibility Operator and a review of relevant documents from the period of January 22, 2020, to November 24, 2020 (hereafter referred to as "inspection review period").

Treatment Processes

• The owner had ensured that all equipment was installed in accordance with Schedule A and Schedule C of the Drinking Water Works Permit.

The approved water treatment equipment consists of two (2) metering pumps (duty and standby) each capable of 1.66 L/hr, one (1) sodium hypochlorite solution storage tank, and one (1) continuous chlorine residual analyzer and alarm system. The rechlorination equipment is installed in a building located at base of the elevated water tower.

 Records confirmed that the water treatment equipment which provides chlorination or chloramination for secondary disinfection purposes was operated so that at all times and all locations in the distribution system the chlorine residual was never less than 0.05 mg/l free or 0.25 mg/l combined.

A free available chlorine residual is maintained in the water conveyed from the treatment facility and into the distribution system for secondary disinfection purposes to reduce the potential for microbial regrowth within the distribution system, and in accordance with Section 1-5 of Schedule 1, Ontario Regulation 170/03. According to the operations and maintenance manual, the treatment system is designed to target a free chlorine residual of 1.0 mg/L

at the point of entry into the distribution system, which should ensure a minimum free chlorine residual of 0.2 mg/L is maintained throughout the distribution system as is recommended in the Ministry's Procedure for Disinfection.

• Where an activity has occurred that could introduce contamination, all parts of the drinking water system were disinfected in accordance with Schedule B, Condition 2.3 of the Drinking Water Works Permit.

The owner has developed written procedures and checklists for use when responding to watermain breaks to ensure the requirements of the Drinking Water Works Permit are satisfied. A copy of the Ministry's Watermain Disinfection Procedure forms part of the operations manual.

 The owner had evidence indicating that all chemicals and materials that come in contact with water within the drinking water system met the AWWA and ANSI standards in accordance with the Municipal Drinking Water Licence and Drinking Water Works Permit issued under Part V of the SDWA.

Section 14.0 (Chemicals and Materials) of MDWL #263-101 (Issue #2) requires the following:

14.1 All chemicals and materials used in the alteration or operation of the drinking water system that come into contact with water within the system shall meet all applicable standards set by both the American Water Works Association ("AWWA") and the American National Standards Institute ("ANSI") safety criteria standards NSF/60, NSF/61

and NSF 372.

- 14.1.1 In the event that the standards are updated, the owner may request authorization from the Director to use any on hand chemicals and materials that previously met the applicable standards.
- 14.1.2 The requirement for the owner to comply with NSF 372 shall come into force no later than July 27, 2018.
- 14.2 The most current chemical and material product registration documentation from a testing institution accredited by either the Standards Council of Canada or by the American National Standards Institution ("ANSI") shall be available at all times for each chemical and material used in the operation of the drinking water system that comes into contact with water within the system.
- 14.3 Conditions 14.1 and 14.2 do not apply in the case of the following:
- 14.3.1 Water pipe and pipe fittings meeting AWWA specifications made from ductile iron, cast iron, PVC, fibre and/or steel wire reinforced cement pipe or high density polyethylene (HDPE);
- 14.3.2 Articles made from stainless steel, glass, HDPE or Teflon®;
- 14.3.3 Cement mortar for watermain lining and for water contacting surfaces of concrete structures made from washed aggregates and Portland cement;
- 14.3.4 Gaskets that are made from NSF approved materials;
- 14.3.5 Food grade oils and lubricants, food grade anti-freeze, and other food grade chemicals and materials that are compatible for drinking water use; or
- 14.3.6 Any particular chemical or material where the owner has written documentation signed by the Director that indicates that the Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change is satisfied that the chemical or material is acceptable for use within the drinking water system and the chemical or material is only used as permitted by the documentation.

The operating authority maintains documentation verifying that all chemicals and materials used in the drinking water system meet applicable AWWA and ANSI standards.

 Up-to-date plans for the drinking water system were kept in a place, or made available in such a manner, that they could be readily viewed by all persons responsible for all or part of the operation of the drinking water system in accordance with the DWWP and MDWL issued under Part V of the SDWA.

Section 15.0 (Drawings) of MDWL #263-101 (Issue #2) requires the following:

- 15.1 All drawings and diagrams in the possession of the owner that show any treatment subsystem as constructed shall be retained by the owner unless the drawings and diagrams are replaced by a revised or updated version showing the subsystem as constructed subsequent to the alteration.
- 15.2 Any alteration to any treatment subsystem shall be incorporated into process flow diagrams, process and instrumentation diagrams, and record drawings and diagrams within one year of the substantial completion of the

alteration.

15.3 Process flow diagrams and process and instrumentation diagrams for any treatment subsystem shall be kept in a place, or made available in such a manner, that they may be readily viewed by all persons responsible for all or part of the operation of the drinking water system.

Treatment Process Monitoring

The secondary disinfectant residual was measured as required for the distribution system.

Unless at least one sample is taken on each day of the week, Section 7-2(4) of Schedule 7 of Ontario Regulation 170/03 requires that,

- 1. At least four of the samples must be taken on one day of the week, at least 48 hours after the last sample was taken in the previous week.
- 2. At least three of the samples must be taken on a second day of the week, at least 48 hours after the last sample was taken on the day referred to in paragraph 1.
- Ontario Regulation 170/03 defines a "week" as a period of seven days that begins on Sunday and ends on the following Saturday. Ontario Regulation 170/03 defines a "distribution sample" as, a water sample that is taken, in the drinking water system's distribution system or in plumbing that is connected to the drinking water system, from a point significantly beyond the point at which drinking water enters the distribution system or plumbing.
- Operators were examining continuous monitoring test results and they were examining the results within
 72 hours of the test.

Records verify that continuous monitoring test results are reviewed within 72 hours by a certified operator.

- Samples for chlorine residual analysis were tested using an acceptable portable device.
- All continuous monitoring equipment utilized for sampling and testing required by O. Reg.170/03, or Municipal Drinking Water Licence or Drinking Water Works Permit or order, were equipped with alarms or shut-off mechanisms that satisfy the standards described in Schedule 6.
- Continuous monitoring equipment that was being utilized to fulfill O. Reg. 170/03 requirements was
 performing tests for the parameters with at least the minimum frequency specified in the Table in Schedule
 6 of O. Reg. 170/03 and recording data with the prescribed format.
- All continuous analysers were calibrated, maintained, and operated, in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions or the regulation.

Records verify that the continuous chlorine residual analyzer is calibrated weekly.

Distribution System

There is a backflow prevention program, policy and/or bylaw in place.

Section 9 of By-law #2011-53 ("Municipal Water Systems By-law"), dated November 16, 2011, requires the following:

- 9.6. Connections to the municipal water system shall be designed and installed so that non-potable water or substances that may render the water non-potable cannot enter the system.
- 9.7 No connection shall be made between the potable water system supplied with water from the municipal water system and any other potable water system 9.8 Any building to be connected to the municipal water system shall install, if not already provided, a control valve and back-flow preventer on the water ,service between the wall or floor of the building as the first device after the curb stop. The control valve shall have capability to be drained and shall be mounted so the valve can be drained when the water supply is shut off.
- 9.9 Backflow prevention devices to protect the municipal water system from contamination shall be selected.

installed and field tested in accordance with CAN/CSA-B64.10 "backflow Prevention Devices-Selection, installation, Maintenance and field Testing"

The owner had implemented a program for the flushing of watermains as per industry standards.

The watermains are flushed twice per year (spring and fall) and dead ends more frequently, as required. It should also be noted that operators flush half the hydrants in the spring and half the hydrants in the fall. This meets the regulatory requirements of the Fire Code - Subsection 6.6.5 Inspection of Hydrants.

- Records confirmed that disinfectant residuals were routinely checked at the extremities and "dead ends" of the distribution system.
- A program was in place for inspecting and exercising valves.

The operations and maintenance manual contains a Valve Operation Procedure which details the approved method for inspecting and exercising valves within the distribution system.

Operators have historically exercised distribution valves on an as-needed basis. The Valve Operation Procedure does not include a specific frequency to exercise each valve, however the operating authority is currently undertaking a multi-year process to revise their valve operation program and the revised procedure will include a specific frequency to operate valves within the distribution system to ensure that these vital components function as designed.

There was a program in place for inspecting and operating hydrants.

All hydrants are inspected and flushed annually.

There was a by-law or policy in place limiting access to hydrants.

Section 8.7 of the MDWL stipulates that the Municipality shall be responsible for the operation and maintenance of all Municipal Water Systems including required testing, servicing and the removal of snow from around all hydrants, as deemed necessary.

Furthermore, section 12 (Hydrants) states the following:

12.1 No person shall use hydrants connected to any Municipal Water System except as follows:

Employees or volunteer fire fighters authorized by the Fire Chief or designee for the purposes of training or fighting fires:

Employees authorized by the Public Works Supervisor— and —

Persons having been granted permission by written agreement with the Municipality and having authorized access to a Hydrant Meter Valve.

12.2 Where a person who is not a consumer wants access to the Municipal Water Supply, the person may apply to the Public Works Supervisor for access to the Municipal Water Supply through a Hydrant Meter Valve. Such application shall be in writing and shall be accompanied by the fee as set out in Schedule "A" of this By-law.

12.3 Upon receipt of an application for access through a Hydrant Meter Valve together with the fee, a Hydrant Meter Use Agreement shall be competed and signed by the applicant and approved by the Public Works Supervisor.

12.4 .No Hydrant Meter Valve Use Agreement shall be issued to any company whose vehicles contain or may contain any pesticide or other chemicals or materials that may contaminate the Municipal Water Supply. Trucks must have an air gap device for loading.

12.5 The consumer shall be invoiced in accordance with the municipal water rates as approved, from time to time, by the Council of the Municipality of McDougall. Any amount owning shall be debited against the deposit.

The owner was able to maintain proper pressures in the distribution system and pressure was monitored to
alert the operator of conditions which may lead to loss of pressure below the value under which the system
is designed to operate.



Distribution System

The operating authority was able to maintain adequate pressure throughout the distribution system, with one possible exception due to a watermain break.

Due to the significant costs involved, there is not a dedicated pressure monitoring system located within the distribution system to alert the operator of conditions which may lead to loss of pressure below the value under which the system is designed to operate. However, there is an operational pressure gauge located at the point of entry into the distribution system which is connected to the SCADA system and the remote alarm system. Should system pressure fall below to an unacceptable level, the operating authority would be immediately notified. Additionally, the operating authority monitors and reviews the SCADA system trending/reports and looks for instances of "spikes" or higher trending flows which can point to a leak or break. The operating authority would then investigate in the community to find and fix the leak. Using the existing monitoring equipment and this method, the operating authority was reportedly able to discover and identify the location of the last three consecutive watermain breaks within one hour of each break and prior to receiving any calls/complaints from members of the public.

The donor had provided an Annual Report to the receiver drinking water system.

Operations Manuals

- Operators and maintenance personnel had ready access to operations and maintenance manuals.
- The operations and maintenance manuals contained plans, drawings and process descriptions sufficient for the safe and efficient operation of the system.

The operations and maintenance manuals are kept on site and up to date as changes are made. Operators are immediately informed of any additions or changes made to the manuals. The documents appear to be sufficient, enabling the staff to safely operate the drinking water system.

• The operations and maintenance manuals met the requirements of the Drinking Water Works Permit and Municipal Drinking Water Licence issued under Part V of the SDWA.

Condition 16, Schedule B of the Licence prescribes that the operations and maintenance manual(s) include at a minimum:

- 16.2.1 The requirements of this licence and associated procedures;
- 16.2.2 The requirements of the drinking water works permit for the drinking water system;
- 16.2.3 A description of the processes used to maintain secondary disinfection within the drinking water system.
- 16.2.4 Procedures for monitoring and recording the in-process parameters necessary for the control of any treatment subsystem and for assessing the performance of the drinking water system;
- 16.2.5 Procedures for the operation and maintenance of monitoring equipment;
- 16.2.6 Contingency plans and procedures for the provision of adequate equipment and material to deal with emergencies, upset conditions and equipment breakdown;
- 16.2.7 Procedures for dealing with complaints related to the drinking water system, including the recording of the nature of the complaint and any investigation and corrective action taken in respect of the complaint;
- 16.3 Procedures necessary for the operation and maintenance of any alterations to the drinking water system shall be incorporated into the operations and maintenance manual or manuals prior to those alterations coming into operation.

The operations manual and contingency plans for the drinking water system appear to address all of these topics sufficiently, providing the utility operators enough information to effectively operate the drinking water system. The operations and maintenance manuals, as well as the contingency and emergency plan meet the requirements of the Licence and Permit for the facility. The manuals are kept up to date and revised as changes occur.

Loabooks

 Records or other record keeping mechanisms confirmed that operational testing not performed by continuous monitoring equipment was being done by a certified operator, water quality analyst, or person



Logbooks

who suffices the requirements of O. Reg. 170/03 7-5.

The logbooks of the drinking water system verify that only certified utility operators are performing the operational tests throughout the system.

- For every required operational test and every required sample, a record was made of the date, time, location, name of the person conducting the test and result of the test.
- The operator-in-charge ensured that records were maintained of all adjustments made to the processes within his or her responsibility.
- Logs or other record keeping mechanisms were available for at least five (5) years.

Contingency/Emergency Planning

- Spill containment was provided for process chemicals and/or standby power generator fuel.
- Clean-up equipment and materials were in place for the clean up of spills.

Clean-up materials are available on-site in the event of a chemical spill.

Security

The owner had provided security measures to protect components of the drinking water system.

The water treatment facility is secure against intrusion and tampering. Security measures include, but are not limited to: alarmed door contacts, perimeter lighting, secure compound fencing equipped with lockable gates, remote alarm notification and response, and preventative external vent screening.

Consumer Relations

 The owner and/or operating authority undertook efforts to promote water conservation and reduce water losses in their system.

Section 3.0 (OFFENCES) of By-law #2011-053 includes the following clauses:

- 3.2 No person, being an owner, tenant, occupant or resident of any apartment, commercial, or residential building supplied with water form the Municipal Water System, shall waste water.
- 3.3 No person, being an owner, tenant, occupant or resident of any apartment, commercial, or residential building supplied with water from the Municipal Water System, shall, without the consent of the Public Works Supervisor, lend, sell or dispose of water, give water away, permit water to be taken or carried away, use or apply water to the use or benefit of another, or to any use and benefit other than the person's own, or increase the supply of water form the Municipal Water System to another building.
- 3.7 No person shall willfully let off or discharge water so that the water runs waste or useless out of the Municipal Water System.

Section 15.0 (WATER USE REGULATIONS) of By-law #2011-053 includes the following clauses:

- 15.1 During the months of June, July and August, lawn and garden watering is permitted; only from 7.00am to 10.00am local time and 7.00pm to 10.00pm local time.
- (a) on even calendar dates at only those municipal addresses ending with even numbers 0,2,4,6,8.
- (b) on odd number calendar dates at only those municipal addresses ending with odd numbers 1,3,5,7,9.
- 15.4 The Chief Administrative Officer or the Public Works Supervisor is hereby authorized at any time to make further regulations to restrict the external use of water and this authority includes the power to ban completely the external use of water.

The operating authority also monitors and reviews the SCADA system trending/reports and looks for instances of

"spikes" or higher trending flows which can point to a leak or break. The operating authority would then investigate in the community to find and fix the leak.

Certification and Training

The overall responsible operator had been designated for each subsystem.

In accordance with Ontario Regulation 128/04 (Certification of Drinking Water System Operators and Water Quality Analysts) made under the SDWA, the McDougall Nobel Distribution System is classified as a Class 1 Water Distribution Subsystem.

At the time of this inspection, an individual possessing a Class 2 Water Treatment Subsystem and a Class 2 Water Distribution and Supply Subsystem certificate has been designated to act in the capacity of Overall Responsible Operator (ORO). Other operators, who possess at a minimum Class 1 certification, may serve in the ORO capacity, if required.

· Operators-in-charge had been designated for all subsystems which comprised the drinking water system.

There are three certified drinking water operators who act as an operator-in-charge (OIC) on a regular basis. At any point during a regular shift, any of the operators may be required to enter the treatment plant and/or distribution system to act as OIC.

- All operators possessed the required certification.
- Only certified operators made adjustments to the treatment equipment.

Only certified operators are permitted to make adjustments to the treatment equipment, and are required to note all actions in the logbook. Only certified operators are permitted to make entries into the logbook.

Water Quality Monitoring

All microbiological water quality monitoring requirements for distribution samples were being met.

Based on an estimated population of fewer than 1000, section 10-2 of Schedule 10 to Ontario Regulation 170/03 requires the owner and operating authority for the system to ensure at least 8 water samples are collected monthly from distribution system sites and tested for E. coli and total coliforms, with 25% of those samples tested for general bacteria population expressed as colony counts on a heterotrophic plate count (HPC). A review of analytical reports provided during the inspection indicates operators collect two distribution samples per week and submit each sample for total coliform, E. Coli, and HPC analysis. An additional sample is collected weekly at the point-of-entry to the distribution system.

 All haloacetic acid water quality monitoring requirements prescribed by legislation are being conducted within the required frequency and at the required location.

Section 13-6.1 of Schedule 13 of Ontario Regulation 170/03 requires the owner and operating authority for the system to ensure that at least one distribution sample is taken in each calendar quarter, from a point in the drinking water system's distribution system, or plumbing that is connected to the drinking water system, that is likely to have an elevated potential for the formation of haloacetic acids (HAA). Section 6-1.1 of Schedule 6, Ontario Regulation 170/03 requires that these samples be taken at least 60 days, and not more than 120 days: after a sample was taken for that purpose in the previous three month period. Haloacetic acid sampling is typically conducted from the sampling stations installed at locations of minimal distance from the treatment facility likely to have an elevated potential for the formation of haloacetic acids.

HAA samples have been collected at the required frequency and they have been collected from a variety of locations in accordance with recommendations provided by the Ministry via a letter to municipalities on May 9, 2018. The running annual average (RAA) HAA concentration for the last quarter of 2019 and the first three quarters of 2020 was 61.1 ug/L.



Water Quality Monitoring

 All trihalomethane water quality monitoring requirements prescribed by legislation were not conducted within the required frequency and at the required location.

Section 13-6 of Schedule 13 of Ontario Regulation 170/03 requires the owner and the operating authority for the system to ensure that at least one water sample is collected every three months from points in the distribution system (including connecting plumbing) likely to have an elevated potential for formation of trihalomethanes (THM). Section 6-1.1(4) of Schedule 6, Ontario Regulation 170/03 states that if this Regulation or an approval, municipal drinking water licence or order, including an OWRA approval or OWRA order, requires at least one water sample to be taken every three months or in each calendar quarter and tested for a parameter, the owner of the drinking water system and the operating authority for the system shall ensure that at least one sample that is taken during a three-month period or calendar quarter for the purpose of being tested for that parameter is taken at least 60 days, and not more than 120 days, after a sample was taken for that purpose in the previous three-month period or calendar quarter.

THM sampling was conducted quarterly during the inspection review period, however the difference in time between the January 27, 2020, sampling and the June 1, 2020, sampling was 126 days. The drinking water system operating authority did not ensure that a THM sample was taken at least 60 days, and not more than 120 days, after a sample was taken for that purpose in the previous three-month period or calendar quarter, in accordance with the requirements of section 6-1.1(4) of Schedule 6, Ontario Regulation 170/03. The operating authority did ensure that subsequent THM sampling conducted on August 10, 2020, met the requirements of Schedule 6 and 13. The running annual average (RAA) THM concentration for the last quarter of 2019 and the first three quarters of 2020 was 66.0 ug/L.

- The owner ensured that water samples were taken at the prescribed location.
- All sampling requirements for lead prescribed by schedule 15.1 of O. Reg. 170/03 were being met.

The operating authority qualified for reduced sampling in 2014. Section 15.1-5(10) (Reduced Sampling) of Schedule 15.1 of Ontario Regulation 170/03 stipulates that the owner of the drinking water system and the operating authority for the system shall ensure that samples are taken as described in clause (3) (c), in accordance with subsection 15.1-7 (2),

- (a) to test for total alkalinity and for pH during each of the periods described in subsection (5) in every 12-month period; and
- (b) to test for lead during each of the periods described in subsection (5) in every third 12-month period. The operating authority ensured that distribution samples were collected at the required frequency and tested for total alkalinity and pH during the inspection review period. The operating authority has elected to sample the distribution system for lead on an annual basis instead of every 3 years as required. Lead, pH, and total alkalinity testing was last conducted in the distribution system on September 29, 2020.
- Records confirmed that chlorine residual tests were being conducted at the same time and at the same location that microbiological samples were obtained.

Subsection 6-3 (1) of Schedule 6 of Ontario Regulation 170/03 prescribes that if a microbiological sample required by the regulation is taken, that another sample must be taken at the same time from the same location and tested immediately for free chlorine residual.

Records provided by the operating authority and reviewed during the course of this inspection indicate that the operating authority ensured that a free chlorine residual sample was taken at the time of all microbiological samples. Operational staff recorded the free available chlorine residual tests directly on the Laboratory Sample Submission / Chain of Custody form at the same time that microbiological samples were obtained. The chlorine residuals associated with microbiological sample were then included by the laboratory on the analytical report associated with results of the microbiological test.

• The owner indicated that the required records are kept and will be kept for the required time period.



Water Quality Monitoring

Water Quality Assessment

 Records showed that all water sample results taken during the inspection review period did not exceed the values of tables 1, 2 and 3 of the Ontario Drinking Water Quality Standards (O.Reg. 169/03).

The standards for drinking water quality in Ontario are prescribed in Ontario Regulation 169/03 'Ontario Drinking Water Quality Standards' (ODWQS). Background and supporting information for each of the standards can be found in the Ministry's 'Technical Support Document for Ontario Drinking Water Standards, Objectives and Guidelines'.

Results of sampling conducted during this inspection review period met the microbiological and chemical requirements of the ODWQS.

Reporting & Corrective Actions

• Corrective actions (as per Schedule 17) had been taken to address adverse conditions, including any other steps that were directed by the Medical Officer of Health.

A watermain break which occurred on October 26, 2020, resulted in a temporary loss of pressure in the distribution system. The operating authority immediately implemented all required corrective actions in response to this incident.

 All required notifications of adverse water quality incidents were immediately provided as per O. Reg. 170/03 16-6.

A watermain break which occurred on October 26, 2020, resulted in a temporary loss of pressure in the distribution system. The operating authority immediately implemented all required corrective actions, including verbal notifications, in response to this incident.

All required written notices of adverse water quality incidents were provided as per O. Reg. 170/03 16-7.

A watermain break which occurred on October 26, 2020, resulted in a temporary loss of pressure in the distribution system. The operating authority immediately implemented all required corrective actions, including written notifications, in response to this incident.

• In instances where written notice of issue resolution was required by regulation, the notice was provided as per O. Reg. 170/03 16-9.

A watermain break which occurred on October 26, 2020, resulted in a temporary loss of pressure in the distribution system. The operating authority immediately implemented all required corrective actions, including the written notice of issue resolution, in response to this incident.

• Summary Reports for municipal council were completed on time, included the required content, and were distributed in accordance with the regulatory requirements.

The 2019 Summary Report was accepted by the municipal council on March 17, 2020.

• All changes to the system registration information were provided within ten (10) days of the change.



1 General

This Summary Report is prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) and Ontario Regulation 170/03 (as amended) Schedule 22 –"Summary Reports for Municipalities". This Report covers the period from January 1st, 2020 to December 31st, 2020. This Report has been prepared prior to the regulated deadline date of March 31, 2021. This Report is to be kept for at least five years.

It can be seen that there was 1 incident over the course of the year 2020 which triggered Adverse Water Quality Incidents (AWQI). The AWQI was a result of a service line break that could only be repaired by shutting off flow to the distribution system. After the repair, the system was in a Boil Water Advisory (BWA) until the MOH and MECP conditions were satisfied. There was 2 inspections by the Ministry of the Environment Conservation and Parks (MECP) on January 22, 2020 and Nov 24,2020. Scott Hanselman conducted the first inspection and gave the system a 100% Final Inspection Rating, with an Inspection Risk Rating of 0%. Peter Vredugdenhil conducted the second inspection and gave the system a 98.05% Final Inspection Rating, with an Inspection Risk Rating of 1.95%. Therefore the system operated above the design criteria set out in the Nobel Water Distribution System Design Brief dated Dec. 14th, 2006 by Abacus Engineering and Planning Services Inc. Based on these numbers the system should not require capacity expansion in the near future. It should also be noted that the Fire Flow Demand for 2020 is a Peak number and that we did not run the system at this flow for two hours. Based upon this peak and sustained high flows during our flushing routine we determined that we meet the Design Fire Flow Demand. The 2020 Infrastructure review outcomes show that the Nobel system continues to operate as designed and that the long term forecast for the adequacy is more than sufficient to meet current and projected needs. We anticipate few problems in 2021 and look forward to monitoring the system's performance.

We discuss planned topics, including Satellites' role in addressing the North's Broadband deficiencies. We shared our thoughts on the Transportation issues facing communities and commerce in the North. President Whalen commented, "we want to ensure that any Northern Provincial Transportations Strategy is not to only take people and resources out of the North" as well as seeking clarity from the Province on the challenge the Province is experiencing with Homelessness, Mental Health & Addictions.

The board members also discussed the Ontario Vaccine distribution strategy, commenting that the Provincial Task Force is not forgetting the North. We noted that several Northern Health Units had recently received shipments of the Moderna Vaccine.

Earlier this month, at a FONOM's Board meeting, Chad Evans, Vice President of Corporate Service for the ONTC, provided the Board an overview of their current divisions. He spoke to the synergies that have developed since the ONTC transitioned to the Ministry of Transportation. "the ONTC continues to be a valuable community partner for so many municipalities," said FONOM President Danny Whalen, "we appreciate their efforts to connect the North." As well shared was the process that is presently underway to assess rail conditions, which will aid the Government when they discuss the of the Northlander.

During the Board meeting, members shared regional observations of the impacts the COVID19 pandemic has on communities. Stressed by several is the enhanced cooperation between communities and agencies, hoping that these lines of dialog continue after the pandemic ends. The Board also discussed the release of FONOM's third of eight "GoNorth" videos (www.youtube.com/watch?v=qkEeQSnLHnA). The videos have been well received, as they are showcasing Northern Ontario as a healthy part of the world to operate a business. The Board shared their appreciation to Drew Gauley



(Good Gauley Productions), Jennifer Baker (Jennifer Baker Consulting Ltd), and Todd Eastman's team from the Trade, Investment & Marketing (TIM) Unit of (ENDM). For all the hard work done on these videos and their promotion.

Dear Premier Ford:

Speeding on provincial, county and municipal roadways continues to put the lives of Ontarians at risk. While we have access to several tools to help mitigate speeding traffic, the one tool that is currently not fully available to us is Automatic Speed Enforcement (ASE) (aka Photo Radar). Over the past decade, in South West Oxford the vast majority of charges laid are for drivers travelling well in excess of the posted speed limit. The cost of providing police time for something that could be done through the use of technology is disturbing to our council. The Council feels that it would be far more effective to have police concentrate on other problems such as Break and Enters, illegal drugs and domestic problems.

We need a way to address the poor behaviours and habits that are putting our citizens at risk and tying up much needed first responder resources that could be better utilized to improve the well-being of our communities. Speeding, particularly through our small villages, creates community concerns for the safety and wellbeing of our children and other vulnerable members. We need your help.

In keeping with this The Council of the Township of South-West Oxford duly moved and carried the following resolution at the regular meeting held on January 5, 2021:

...RESOLVED that the Council of the Township of South-West Oxford provide direction to the Clerk to send a letter to the Premier, MPP Ernie Hardeman, AMO and all Ontario municipalities in support of the use of Automatic Speed Enforcement (photo radar) by municipalities.

Please help municipalities in the Province by passing the necessary regulations for municipalities to use ASE (if they choose) that will bring about the driving behavioural changes we need.

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m.

WELCOME

Introduction by S/Sgt. Dionne, provided her background. Advised that the Detachment Commander position for West Parry Sound has been advertised and is closed. Proceeding to Stage 2 of the process now.

MINUTES

The meeting package, including draft minutes and reports, was forwarded to CPAC members by e-mail prior to the meeting.

The Minutes of the meeting held on 06 February 2020 were presented.

BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES

REPORTS

2020 - 3rd Quarter

- passed to CPAC members for comments
- Sgt. McDonald advised that the common theme is a reduction in number of calls, likely related to the pandemic. There is still a large number of people in the community, many cottagers. Some areas have had an increase in property crimes, domestics, and by-law incidents. Some of these calls can be attributed to people working from home during the pandemic.

There has been a drastic reduction in 911 calls. Screening is being done differently in PCC.

- Record check numbers are down. The centralized system is no longer operating. The system was in place to reduce contact for staff and the public. The centralized system could not handle the workload but we will likely see it in the future again. Record checks at detachment are now backlogged as the record checks have been downloaded on detachments. Most of the VS checks were for healthcare or other frontline employment. The detachment is starting to see volunteer applications again.
- J. Ryman commented that cottagers seem to be staying longer than usual. Sgt. McDonald agreed that it seems to be busier in town than usual for this time of year. The detachment has enough officers to handle any increased service demands due to this. There is sufficient staffing to handle 100,000 people during peak so no concerns with 15-20,000 in off peak. B. Keith noted that it may be a full year before we see a true picture of the increase in population. Some seasonal residents may change their minds and not stay the full winter. A. McDermott advised that school enrollment is up. She advised that the Principal of Humphrey School has insisted the parents or guardians of newly enrolled students change the address on their driver's licence to that of their local residence. She does not want parents using the school as a convenience until December and then she is left with an excess of teachers.
- S/Sgt. Dionne commented that the pandemic has forced us to capitalize on the infrastructure we have and to utilize the technology we have.
- J. McEwen was surprised when looking at the numbers that the population increase did not cause an increase in calls. A. McDermott advised that she expected assault calls to be up as people were forced to be home together for extended periods. B. Keith commented that people may not always have called police. If individuals have nowhere to go they might not call. Sgt. McDonald advised that this is a valid point. It is much more difficult to reach victims if they are not in the community. Messaging has been put out by Victim Services to assist in this. S/Sgt. Dionne noted that assaults, domestics, and sexual assaults are always under reported.
- Sgt. McDonald advised that there are 3 experienced officers that have transferred in. PC Slack from Port Credit HSD, PC Arnold from Collingwood Detachment, and PC Scott from

Huronia West Detachment. New recruit Winser will start on 23 October 2020. She is owed time off due to guarantine while in training.

- R. Osborne asked for elaboration on the increase in assaults, for the year to date, on RMS for Seguin Township. It shows as a 240% increase from last year. Sgt. McDonald advised that the assault term is vague and it is inclusive for all types of assault. One would have to go into RMS and look at each individual incident to differentiate.
- R. Osborne questioned if recent drug bust was in Seguin or Parry Sound. Sgt. McDonald clarified that this was in Parry Sound.
- R. Osborne inquired as to whether the OPP had a code of conduct that required officers to wear masks when approaching vehicles. Sgt. McDonald advised that there is no code of conduct and that if the officer maintains distance they do not have to wear a mask. If the officer is encroaching on someone's personal space and there are no exigent circumstances then the officer is encouraged to wear a barrier mask. R. Osborne commented that he has seen an officer within 3 feet of someone and the officer was not wearing a mask. S/Sgt. Dionne advised R. Osborne that if he had concerns he could certainly contact the detachment and the circumstances could be reviewed.

Focused Patrol Updates

- Sgt. McDonald advised that there are no previous focused patrols from this summer to discuss.
- A. McDermott noted that she had a lot of constituents complain about drivers speeding. Council approved the purchase of 2 speed monitoring signs. It was under \$5000 for 2 signs and rumble strips. The rumble strips have been put in a few municipal locations to reduce speeds. The signs have been in use for about 3 weeks now and are moved to a different location after a week. The data goes into a Cloud system and Sgt. McDonald is able to view it. The data can be shared with others.
- Sgt. McDonald commented that the Town of Parry Sound has used one as well. It gives important data that helps to utilize OPP resources when and where most needed. Simply having officers at the problem locations during peak times can change driving behaviours. A Focused Patrol will be started this weekend. Members will document their stops and whatever enforcement action is taken. S/Sgt. Dionne noted that the visibility of officers will drop speeds. The township might not see a lot of tickets but should see a change in behaviour.
- B. Keith questioned whether a focused patrol had been conducted on Waubeek Street after the Town of Parry Sound forwarded concerns. Sgt. McDonald advised that officers were patrolling the area at the start and end of shift. The issue was with some drivers that were attending the Salt Dock area and the driving behaviours they were exhibiting. The Salt Docks were patrolled regularly as part of this as well. It was not a formal focused patrol though.
- Sgt. McDonald noted that a focused patrol does not have to specifically be traffic related.
- J. Ryman questioned whether 2 ups can be operated on a roadway. Sgt. McDonald will check with ATV trained officers.

- J. McEwen commented that ATV's have become a big issue this year and will likely continue to grow. J. McEwen questioned what the speed limit was for ATV's. Sgt. McDonald clarified that if the speed limit for other vehicles is 50 km/h then the limit for ATV's is 20 km/h. If the speed limit for other vehicles is 80 km/h then it is 50 km/h for ATV's. ATV's can never exceed the 50 km/h limit.
- M. Kekkonen inquired as to whether or not there is liability on the municipalities if they do not post speed limits for ATV's. Sgt. McDonald advised that the responsibility is on the rider. S/Sgt. Dionne could get PC Scali to do some messaging through the media if needed. The timing would coincide perfectly with hunting season. M. Kekkonen noted that the townships could also educate and maybe reduce liability this way. D. Crocker would like information to put in the township's newsletter. S/Sgt. Dionne advised that all necessary information would be easily obtained on the Ministry of Transportation's website. Will work with townships to develop something for education.
- D. Crocker advised of concerns regarding construction on the highway and the speed signage. She questioned whether a driver could do the normal posted speed if pylons are pulled aside and a bag is on the speed sign. Sgt. McDonald indicated that you have to go by the signage. D. Crocker countered that that signage is inconsistent. Sgt. McDonald agreed that the signage has been inconsistent. The Safety Officer for Fowler's Construction is supposed to be ensuring it is consistent.

NEW BUSINESS

Still River Detachment

- Sgt. McDonald advised the committee that Still River Detachment has been closed. This was done in consultation with the municipality and the First Nations. It will not affect the policing, it will just look different going forward. The closure will not affect staffing levels. Still River will now be a patrol zone and the Platoon Sergeant will assign a member to patrol and respond to calls in the zone.
- S/Sgt. Dionne noted that the detachment is looking for an ESO and is working with the municipalities toward this. An MOU will be signed once a location is found.

Correspondence for Discussion

- M. Kekkonen noted that he sent in a question about a drone flying in the area during the summer that was believed to be involved in peeping Tom type behaviour. The social media posts were forwarded to Sgt. McDonald. Sgt. McDonald responded that he would have to review this matter. The information was forwarded for clarification. S/Sgt. Dionne will review key messaging. Transport Canada sets the rules for drones.
- M. Kekkonen questioned whether the OPP would enforce the aerodrome in McKellar. Sgt. McDonald advised that this is Transport Canada's responsibility.

Police Service Boards

- B. Keith questioned whether there has been any more movement on Police Service Boards. Sgt. McDonald advised that there has not been much movement on this yet, still waiting on new Police Services Act. S/Sgt. Dionne noted that with the new Integrity Commissioner there are other changes to be finalized. J. Ryman commented that the Police Services Boards will not fall under Social Services Board. Input showed the majority were against this. B. Keith noted that the Town of Parry Sound put out a resolution that it was not in support of it falling under DSSAB.
- Sgt. McDonald noted that some areas are trying to model what is already being done here. J. McEwen commented that many detachments do not have active CPAC. Sgt. McDonald expects that if things go as planned, CPAC will have more involvement in the detachment's action plan. The Community Well Being Plan was extended.

Marine

- A. McDermott questioned whether there will be more members added to marine patrol. Sgt. McDonald advised that there were two full time members this year. This was required as the detachment has accommodated members and members on maternity leave. Joint patrols were effective. It was a very busy summer. S/Sgt. Dionne advised that a request for an Accolade Award was submitted for the Marine Unit. The unit responded to numerous calls for service, supported the road officers, did a lot of proactive work, and located many impaired boaters. As a side note, North East Region will be hosting the award ceremony this year and has chosen the Carling Community Centre for the event.
- A. McDermott advised there have been many positive comments from constituents about the Marine Unit. S/Sgt. Dionne advised that one marine member felt that the main issue this year was PWC's and it was becoming problematic. M. Kekkonen questioned whether OPP would consider adding the option of reporting marine issues on the online reporting system. S/Sgt. Dionne noted that it currently includes traffic complaints and she will look into it with Corporate Communications.
- Sgt. McDonald will have the marine statistics for the next meeting.
- R. Osborne questioned if there was a marine student this year. Sgt. McDonald responded that there has not been a marine student for the past couple of years. This has been an SEO position. The detachment had a student last year but not in 2020 due to the pandemic. S/Sgt. Dionne further commented that it is not an OPP run program, but rather is Ministry run. The Ministry allocates where the positions go.

Round Table

B. Keith

Drug Seizures – concerned about an increase in Parry Sound. Also concerns about drug use and the users frequenting downtown. Inquired if there could be a focused foot patrol downtown. S/Sgt. Dionne responded that this could be considered. West Parry Sound Detachment has a CSCU. Officers have to be careful sometimes not to crossover into Street Crime Unit or Undercover operations. Uniform presence could hinder this. There has been

an increase in drug use and overdoses due possibly to CERB. Sgt. McDonald advises that this is a priority in the community. The Chief Superintendent sees this as a priority as well. There could be an increase in members assigned to CSCU. It is key that the OPP works with its community partners such as CMHA, Addictions Outreach, and RAAM. The situation table is also very important.

B. Keith is happy to hear this. Most people do not know the number of overdoses that are happening in the community. Support agencies are not able to work normally right now which furthers the issue. Agencies need to be creative to address the problem. S/Sgt. Dionne furthered that the solution isn't always to arrest users but rather to get the users the help they need. The focus is more on arresting the traffickers.

B. Keith commented that the people walking downtown need to feel safe too. It's a complicated issue.

J. Ryman

No issues

J. McEwen

Most issues have been covered already. He is always getting complaints about a lack of police presence. He has seen an increase in police presence though. Marine presence during the summer was good. Whitestone has been complimenting their residents' compliance more than reprimanding. There have been a few issues surrounding cottage rentals.

R. Osborne

Very pleased about the speed station usage. He commented that he has not seen any stationary speed enforcement in Seguin for 6 months and questioned if stationary enforcement has been reduced. Sgt. McDonald advised that members are encouraged to do proactive policing if not engaged in an active investigation. R. Osborne further questioned if there is a schedule for enforcement. The Township of Seguin invested in the speed monitoring equipment because of complaints. S/Sgt. Dionne noted that the analytics from the signs will lead to Focused Patrol. Officers are assigned patrol zones but calls for service are always a priority. The OPP just finished its latest Traffic Safety campaign. Every long weekend is a campaign. Communities are facing a lot of different issues of concern lately so we need to strike a balance.

M. Kekkonen

Wished to thank OPP for the anti-fraud presentation for seniors.

Advised that council has passed resolution for a Community Safety Zone in McKellar. Might be helpful to have the speed signs and the associated analytics so OPP know when best to be out there. S/Sgt. Dionne advised that the OPP will not purchase the signs but there are grants available to municipalities. Detachment can advise when next Community Safety grant opportunity becomes available and let the municipality know. There are OPP members who can assist with the process.

M. Kekkonen questioned why there were not 4 marine members this year. S/Sgt. Dionne responded that these members belong to regular platoons and perform General Law Enforcement duties in the winter. The detachment could not dedicate 4 to marine this year.

M. Kekkonen inquired as to whether the numbers could increase if funding increased. Sgt. McDonald clarified that an increase in funding would only come if there were an increase in calls for service.

Township of McKellar has Safe Quiet Lake signs and has posted them.

D. Crocker

Thanked Sgt. McDonald for his response on the marine issue. The Township of Carling will be providing handouts again next year.

A. McDermott

A. McDermott recommended talking to Save Quiet Lakes if a municipality is having problems on its lakes. This organization has resources to distribute and has a website for information.

Short term accommodations and rentals have been a big issue for Seguin Township. The main problem has been the behaviour of the persons renting. There were problems this past long weekend with gatherings that were too big. A. McDermott questioned if OPP would respond to these situations. S/Sgt. Dionne replied that the OPP would respond as it is a call for service.

A. McDermott advised the township will have some traffic resolutions before council.

The township has received notification from AGCO about a cannabis retailer possibly opening at the Petro Canada. Sgt. McDonald advised that the OPP has not been notified of this yet. Municipalities may have the ability to ban. A. McDermott thought it might be too late for that.

S/Sqt. Dionne

Some of PC Scali's duties have had to be modified. If he goes into a school he cannot go into another school for 14 days. He is working with the school board to see what he can work out.

OPP REQUEST PUBLIC ASSISTANCE TO IDENTIFY PERSON OF INTEREST

(PARRY SOUND, ON) - The West Parry Sound Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is requesting the public's assistance in identifying a person of interest.

He is described as a white male with short brown hair, brown eyes, beard, is 5 foot 8 inches tall (173 cm) and approximately 190 pounds (86 kg).

(PARRY SOUND, ON) – On December 16, 2020 at approximately 4:30 a.m., members from the West Parry Sound Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a weapons call at a residence on Bowes Street in Parry Sound. An investigation was conducted by the Parry Sound Crime Unit with the assistance of the OPP Forensic Identifications Service (FIS).

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(**ORILLIA, ON**) - Between robust mandatory alcohol screening laws, vigilant citizens and dedicated officers, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) reminds drivers they'll have plenty to worry about if they choose to get behind the wheel after consuming alcohol or drugs over the holidays.

The OPP's Festive R.I.D.E. campaign kicks off this week and runs until January 3, 2021.

With more than **21,800** calls to the OPP to report suspected impaired drivers so far this year (2020), the OPP is praising these proactive citizens for doing their part to help keep these dangerous drivers off our roads. Close to **3,300** such calls were placed during the 2019/20 Festive R.I.D.E. campaign and reflect the 'zero tolerance' attitude the OPP encourages everyone to adopt every day.

Motorists are reminded that officers regularly conduct Mandatory Alcohol Screening (MAS) with drivers who are lawfully pulled over and they will be ramping up this investigative measure, including at R.I.D.E. stops, throughout the campaign.

Now heading into its third year, under the MAS law, an officer with an approved alcohol screening device can demand a breath sample from any driver without having reasonable suspicion that they have alcohol in their body.

Drug screening equipment that detects cannabis (and cocaine) in a driver's saliva is another important resource officers have at their disposal. These devices are used to enforce the provincial <u>"zero tolerance" sanctions</u> that apply to young, novice and commercial drivers who are suspected of having the presence of drugs in their body.

Under impaired driving laws, the OPP can also demand that a driver submit to a Standardized Field Sobriety Test (SFST) and a Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) Evaluation. SFST-trained officers and DREs have the expertise to detect impairment by alcohol, drugs or both in a driver.

"As Ontarians celebrate this physically distanced holiday season, an important part of staying safe is ensuring you have a solid plan that prevents you and your family from driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs. The OPP encourages citizens to continue reporting impaired drivers to police. Combined with the dedication of our frontline officers, our collective efforts can significantly help keep you and your loved ones safe on our roads during the holidays and throughout the year." -- Thomas CARRIQUE, Ontario Provincial Police Commissioner

"Impaired driving continues to be the leading criminal cause of death and injury on Ontario's roads, and these dangers remain a threat to our communities as we continue to face COVID-19 this holiday season. We all want a safe and happy holiday season, and it is important to remind our friends and family to plan ahead and make alternative arrangements to get home safely. The

decision to get behind the wheel impaired can be a matter of life and death." -- Solicitor General Sylvia JONES

Team Approach to Cyber Security Awareness Month

(**ORILLIA, ON**) -The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is again joining forces with law enforcement, government and other public safety partners to recognize *Cyber Security Awareness Month* and highlight the advancing threat posed by cybercriminals.

Cybercrime occurs when technology is used to carry out criminal offences or when technology is the target of the criminal offence. To the end of September 2020, the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre received more than six thousand complaints of 'cyberfraud' via e-mail, internet or social media platforms from Ontario and identified 3,659 victims who sustained combined losses of \$17.84-million. Phishing -- an email or text message that appears to be from a legitimate person or organization but contains malicious links or attachments -- accounts for a majority of all reported cyber security incidents. In our technologically-driven world, cyber security must continue to be a top priority for all internet users. Cyber security and cyber hygiene become even more important when working with personal and confidential information.

Cybercriminals have multiple motivators for doing what they do, and their criminal benefits can vary from financial or political gain to raising awareness for a cause or ideology or even causing damage through acts of anarchy. Their interests may serve themselves or a larger group in which they have a vested interest. The OPP, along with other police services and cyber security experts from across the country, want to safeguard all Ontarians from becoming victims of cybercrime.

This year, the OPP 2020 *Cyber Security Awareness Month* campaign has focussed on five primary themes:

- 1) Cyber Security
- 2) "Why Me?" Why Cyber-Thieves Want your Info
- 3) How Attacks Work: Cybercrime Anatomy 101
- 4) Thwarting Cybercriminals: How to Recognize and Respond to Threats
- 5) Safety Practices for all Devices

News Release: Health Unit Closes OFSC Snowmobile Trails

Posted on Monday January 18, 2021

NORTH BAY, ON - The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) is requiring all Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs' (QFSC) trails and trails utilizing Crown Land in the Health Unit district to close effective January 21, 2021 at 12:01 a.m. for the duration of the Stay-at-Home Order and will be reassessed at such time. This closure is done under the Medical Officer of Health's ability to increase restrictions within their district.

In accordance with the provisions of the Emergency Management and Civil Protections Act, and the Regulations thereunder, specifically Stay-at-Home-Order, and the Reopening Ontario (A Flexible Response to COVID-19) Act, and the Regulations thereunder, specifically Rules for Areas in Stage 1, the Medical Officer of Health for the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit deems it reasonable and necessary to close all Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs' (OFSC) trails and trails utilizing Crown Land in the Health Unit district effective January 21, 2021 at 12:01 a.m. throughout the entire district served by the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit in order to decrease or eliminate the risk to community health presented by COVID-19.

"We have been told to stay home and we need to do this. I have received many complaints about people travelling from other districts to use the local anowmobile trails, thus putting our district at risk of COVID-19. The OFSC recommends that anowmobilers avoid trailering and travelling to destinations that are outside their health unit region to snowmobile, but people have not taken the direction seriously," explains Dr. Jim Chirico, Medical Officer of Health. "We are also seeing groups of snowmobilers congregating on trails, in parking lots and other locations not maintaining a two metre distance and exceeding the gathering limits."

On January 12, 2021, the province of Ontario announced the change in outdoor gathering limits from 10 to five. Individuals must maintain a two metre physical distance from people they do not live with. Individuals who live alone are allowed to be in close contact with one unique home, but must physically distance with anyone who does not live in that home. Face coverings are also recommended to be worn outdoors.

1 do not recommend anyone gather with people you do not live with or if you live alone people who are not a part of your unique close contact home," states Dr. Chirico. "We are seeing an increase of COVID-19 cases locally and the provincial projections do not look good. Our local hospitals have very little surge capacity and limited resources which must be protected for the health and safety of our community. We must take extra precautions to keep our district safe. However, the key is we must all work together."

Outdoor physical activity, such as walking, running, playing outside and biking are important for physical and mental health and still recommended by the Health Unit. However, all activities outside the house need to be done with extreme caution, following the COVID-19 public health measures, and should be done close to home.

If you think you may have COVID-19 symptoms or have been in close contact with someone who has it, first self-isolate and then use Ontario's Self-Assessment Tool to see if you need to seek further care. If you need further assistance call your health care provider or the Health Unit at 1-800-563-2808. If you have severe symptoms, such as difficulty breathing, you should call 911 and mention your symptoms.

COVID-19 Vaccine Update

NORTH BAY, ON – The Ministry of Health has announced that vaccination of residents, staff and essential caregivers of long-term care homes has begun in many parts of the province, with the goal of having the first dose administered in all homes no later than February 15, 2021. The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) expected to receive a shipment of vaccines on February 1, 2021; however, due to a limited supply of vaccines throughout the province and Canada, there may be a delay receiving our first shipment of vaccine.

The Health Unit is ready to start to administer vaccinations, once supply is provided. The Health Unit will be prioritizing residents of long-term care homes. In the event enough vaccine is provided priority will also be given to:

- staff, essential caregivers (including family caregivers) and other employees in long-term care settings,
 retirement homes and congregate living settings for seniors;
- health care workers, including hospital employees, staff who work or study in hospitals and health care personnel;
- adults in First Nations, Métis and Inuit populations;
- adult recipients of chronic home health care.

The Health Unit will continue to update the district on the status of the COVID-19 vaccine as information becomes available.

The Health Unit in Collaboration with Stay On Your Feet Asks You to Clean Out Your Unused Medications

NORTH BAY, ON - It's your yearly reminder to clean out your old and outdated medications. Each year the Stay On Your Feet (SOYF) coalition and the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) offer medication cleanout bags to older adults to encourage them to return unused medication to pharmacies.

Approximately 40 per cent of older adults take five to nine medications. Drug interactions around prescription medications and over-the-counter drugs can cause drowsiness and dizziness, which can lead to a fall. SOYF recommends that you keep your medications in a secured locked cupboard or box, out of the reach of all children and visitors.

The goals of the medication cleanout are:

- To promote the safe storage and disposal of prescription and over-the-counter medications and other drugs;
- To reduce the amount of medications that are available in people's homes;
- To reduce the environmental impact associated with the inappropriate disposal of medications in the garbage and sewer systems; and
- To increase awareness that unused or expired prescriptions, over-the-counter medications, vitamins and herbal supplements can be returned to any pharmacy for safe disposal any day of the year.
- To encourage older adults to consult with their pharmacist or health care provider every 6-12 months to review medications.

The municipal operations are continuing to function with all staff attending the work place. Precautions are being followed with no issues to report.

The CAO pool committee continues to meet and stay up on the current issues at hand, and are hoping to hear something from the federal government soon.

CP Rail has requested mediation on the CIL crossing repair and maintenance costs. This mediation will deal with the \$ 178,302.00 invoice for crossing repairs. The municipality refused this invoice immediately and has stated that the primary user of that crossing over the last 30 years has been CP. The municipality will argue that any damage caused to the crossing, base or ballast will have been caused by CP or its contractors. I have signed a mediation agreement as per the proto call for Transport Canada Agency. I expect this process will take another year or two to settle.

I have been working with our lawyer to have an agreement put in place with the land owner that uses the CIL crossing exclusively. This agreement will transfer all costs associated with the CIL crossing to the land owner. This is not a public road nor is it available for public use, but all crossings must be assumed by a municipality. This agreement will include all crossing repairs and maintenance and all protection fees (bells, lights and guards) as well. Draft agreement is attached.

I am working on plan and cost analysis for the renovation or replacement of the municipal office. The municipal administration has out grown the space available for staff, equipment and records. The building is 50+ years old and has been renovated several times. I hope to have this completed for the budget meeting.

I have sent out several versions of the new sign for the front of the office, and it looks like the most popular is the first and last sign against the stone. I am suggesting approval for No# 5,

Generally things are going very well and as always we will respond to any Covid order or restriction immediately.

McDougall will be celebrating its 150th anniversary in May of 2022, so if council could put some thought to any type of event or promotion, we should assemble a committee to start putting something together. 15 months is not that far away and with covid being a possible threat, anything that may have to be made or ordered will need plenty of time for delivery. This will be a budget item for 2021

Being a by-law to enter into an agreement with Robert J. Durance and Susan D. Durance as a condition of approval of Consent No. B20/2020 (McD) Durance

WHEREAS pursuant to Section 224, of the Municipal Act S.O.2001, as amended, it is the role of Council to represent the public and to consider the well-being and interests of the municipality, and to develop and evaluate the policies and programs of the municipality, to determine which services the municipality provides;

AND WHEREAS Section 51(26) of the Planning Act authorizes municipalities to enter into agreements as a condition of approval of a consent;

AND WHEREAS Council deems it appropriate to enter into the attached agreement with Robert J. Durance and Susan D. Durance as a condition of approval of consent No. B20/2020 (McD);

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall enacts as follows:

- 1. The terms of the attached agreement between the Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall and Robert J. Durance and Susan D. Durance are hereby approved and that the Mayor and the Clerk are authorized to execute the said agreement on behalf of the Municipality.

WHEREAS Section 51(26) of the Planning Act authorizes municipalities to enter agreements as a condition of approval of a consent;

AND WHEREAS the Parry Sound Area Planning Board approved a consent for a new waterfront lot on Bell Lake in Application No. B20/2020(McD);

AND WHEREAS the application was approved with a number of conditions including the requirement that the applicant enter into an agreement to fulfil a number of the conditions;

NOWTHEREFORE, THIS AGREEMENT WITNESS THAT, in the consideration of other good and valuable consideration and the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) of lawful money of Canada now paid by the Municipality to the Owner, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, the Owner and the Municipality, covenant, declare and agree as follows:

PART A - GENERAL

- 1. The lands to be bound by the terms and conditions of this Agreement referred to as "the subject lands" are located in the Municipality and more particularly described in Schedule 'A' hereto.
- 2. The survey plan describing the severed land is plan 42R-21555.
- 3. This agreement shall be registered on title to the subject lands as provided for by Section 51(26) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended, at the expense of the Owner.
- 4. This agreement will not be amended or removed from the title of the subject lands except where agreed upon by the Municipality and the Owner.

PART B - PURPOSE OF THE DEVELOPMENT

5. The Owner has applied for and received approval by the Parry Sound Area Planning Board under File No. B20/2020(McD) for a consent for a new waterfront lot on Bell Lake.

PART C - ACCESS

- 6. The Owner hereby acknowledges and recognizes that the right-of-way being Part 3 and 5 of Reference Plan No. 42R-11388 and providing access to the subject lands is a privately owned and maintained road.
- 7. That the private right-of-way is an existing private right-of-way.
- 8. The Owner hereby covenants and agrees that the road is a private road.
- 9. The Owner hereby recognizes and agrees that the Municipality is not responsible or liable for the non repair of the private roads identified in paragraph 7 above.
- 10. The Owner hereby understands that the Municipality may not be able to provide emergency services to the subject lands accessed by the private rights-of-way.

PART D - SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN REQUIREMENTS

- 11. Sewage disposal beds (either conventional septic tank tile field or Ontario Building Code approved filter beds, or tertiary treatment systems) be in accordance with the requirements of the approval authority of the North Bay Mattawa Conservation Authority.
- 12. The installation of any septic systems on the subject lands will be in accordance with the letter report by the North Bay Mattawa Conservation Authority dated July 7, 2020.

PART E - EXPENSES TO BE PAID BY THE OWNER

- 13. Every provision of this Agreement by which the Owner is obligated in any way shall be deemed to include the words "at the expense of the Owner" unless the context otherwise requires.
- 14. The Owner shall pay such reasonable fees as may be invoiced to the Municipality by its Solicitor, its Planner, and its Municipal Engineer in connection with all work to be performed as a result of the provisions of this Agreement.

PART F - INDEMNIFICATION FROM LIABILITY AND RELEASE

- 15. The Owner covenants and agrees with the Municipality, on behalf of itself, its successors and assigns, to indemnify and save harmless the Municipality, its servants and agents from and against any and all actions, suits, claims and demands whatsoever which may arise either directly or indirectly by reason of the negligent or unlawful performance of or failure to perform any work by the Owner or on his behalf in connection with the carrying out of the provisions of this Agreement provided that such default, failure or neglect was not caused as a result of negligence or breach of this Agreement on the part of the Municipality its servants or agents.
- 16. The Owner further covenants and agrees to release and forever discharge the Municipality from and against all claims, demands, causes of actions, of every nature and type whatsoever that may arise either as a result of the failure of the Municipality to carry out any of its obligations under this Agreement, or, as a result of the Municipality performing any municipal work on the said lands or the adjacent properties which may damage or interfere with the works of the Owner, provided that such default, failure or neglect was not caused as a result of negligence or breach of this Agreement on the part of the Municipality, its servants or agents.

PART G - ADMINISTRATION

- 17. The Owner acknowledges that this agreement is entered into under the provisions of Section 51(26) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended and that any expense of the Municipality arising out of the administration and enforcement of this agreement may be recovered as taxes under Section 326 of the Municipal Act, 1990 as amended and further that the terms and conditions of this agreement may be enforced under conditional building permits under the Building Code Act and regulations thereunder.
- 18. The Owner and the Municipality acknowledge that the provisions of Section 67 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended that provides that persons who contravene Section 51 and 52 of the Planning Act are liable on a first conviction to a fine of not more than twenty-five thousand dollars and on a subsequent conviction of not more than ten thousand dollars for each day or part thereof upon which the contravention has continued after the day in which the person was first convicted.
- 19. This agreement shall ensure to the benefit of and be binding upon the respective successors and assigns of each of the parties hereto.
- 20. This agreement shall come into effect on the date of execution by the Municipality and the Owner.
