




Background

Tim McGuire has a parcel of land at the terminus of Paul's Bay Road on Harris Lake.



Property Description


The subject lands have an irregular shape with 13.6 hectares (34 acres) and approximately 400 meters of lake frontage. The lands are described as Part 4 of Plan 42R-20822.



Previous Consent B12/2018 (McD)

Mr. McGuire applied for a consent in 2018 for one new waterfront lot on Harris Lake.

There was a concern over the extent of any fish habitat features along this shoreline and Mr. McGuire obtained a biologists report to confirm that the new lot being created had shoreline area that was clean of critical fish habitat.




The retained lands consisted of a large parcel beyond an area referred as "flooded land".

It has always been Mr. McGuire's intention to develop additional lots across the "flooded lands" that drain beaver meadows further inland. The issue has been how to traverse the flooded are to access the balance of the lands.

The applicant has designed a crossing that will avoid any "in water" works thereby avoiding any impacts on the fishery or other important habitat features. Concrete abutments have been established at each end of the flooded land and a series of engineered beams will be extended across the span capable of car and truck traffic.

Proposed Consent

The proposed consent will create three new waterfront lots on Harris Lake. This will include a right-of-way extension at the terminus of Paul's Bay Road and across the new bridge.

The retained and severed lands meet the minimum standards for new lots. The lands are heavily forested with well drained soils and are relatively constraint-free in terms of development.

Official Plan

The subject lands are designated Waterfront in the Municipality's official plan.


The land division policies of the official plan recognize the consent process for creating a limited number of lots on a private road.

- 8.01.2 The consent process shall only be considered where it is clear that a proponent is not trying to circumvent the subdivision procedure. For the purpose of this section, the consent process shall be limited to those applications that propose a maximum of three new lots not including the retained lot.
- 8.01.4 Consents to sever land will be permitted, in contrast to plans of subdivision;
 - a) where only a limited number of lots are being proposed;
 - b) where the pattern of development has been established;
 - c) where the consent conforms to all other policies of this Plan;
 - d) where there is no major extension to any public road or other municipal services; and
 - e) where the land complies with the road frontage requirements of this Plan.

<u>Access</u>

A limited number of new waterfront lots are available to be created where access is by a registered right-of-way.

The subject lands will be access off Paul's Bay Road, a private right-of-way off Lorimer Lake Road.



After the creation of the new lots there will be ten lots that will be using Paul's Bay Road, a private road.

To ensure that the private road is recognized as a private road and not subject to any municipal responsibility, an agreement will be required to be registered on the severed and retained lands to indemnify the municipality from any liability and to impose basic standards to ensure access for emergency vehicles.

Waterfront Policies


The Municipality of McDougall has waterfront policies aimed at protecting the character of lake neighborhoods and water quality.

The proposed consent would generally meet or exceed these policy objectives.

<u>Harris Lake.</u>

Harris Lake is a mid-sized lake with good water quality and it's generally characterized as a nice recreational water body.

There are about 150 dwellings on the lake with two thirds being cottages.



Although somewhat dated, the MNRF lake data shows the lake to have +/- 13 micrograms of phosphorus per litre. This qualifies the lake as a good quality warm water fishery. (See Lake Report)


The Lake can best be described as resilient with a fair amount of residential capacity.

Natural Heritage Features

Mr. McGuire prepared a fish habitat assessment for the shoreline of the subject land that included the lands that are proposed to be divided, Their earlier assessment identified the extent of Type 1 Fish Habitat.

A copy of this report is enclosed. The Type 1 Habitat has been overlain on the consent stated.

In accordance with section 14.03.1.(b), all of the lots would appear to have at least 15 meters of shoreline clear of Type 1 Fish habitat.



Public Interest

Ratepayers are extremely protective of their lake neighborhoods. It is likely that many parties will express concerns over the additional lots being created on the lake.

These consents have been assessed in accordance with the planning criteria set out under section 51 (24) of the Planning Act. These criteria include a broad range of planning assessments.

Persons on the lake have dropped in to discuss concerns with the activity on the property. The planning board has shared all of the information with these ratepayers.

There will likely be additional concerns related to increased traffic on the private road. These concerns are fair but the additional lot owners will be required to contribute to the ongoing maintenance of the private road.

Recommendation

That the consent application by Tim McGuire for the creation of three new waterfront lots on Harris Lake as applied for in consent application No. B18/2021 (McD) be approved subject to:

- 1) The applicant entering into a private road agreement with the Municipality to:
 - 1. Ensure the standards for private roads are in place.
 - 2. Indemnify the municipality from all liability and responsibility for the use of the private road.
- 2) That a fee in lieu of parkland be paid in accordance with the municipality's fee by-law.
- 3) Payment of all applicable planning fees.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The property at Part Lot 8, Concession 3 is located within the Municipality of McDougall and District of Parry Sound. It is situated within a small bay at the north end of Harris Lake (Figures 1-2). It consists of approximately 380m of shoreline frontage, which is separated into two sections by flooded channel that leads to a small basin to the northwest. A dirt road extending to the east of Lorimer Lake Road is used for land access to the southwest/west section of the property. The north/northeast section can only be accessed by boat, although it is Azimuth's understanding that the landowner is in the process of installing a bridge to connect both areas.

The property does not contain any existing residences, buildings, or permanent shoreline structures. A small temporary floating dock is tied to the southwest section of the shoreline. A previous development application was submitted to (and approved by) the Municipality of McDougall in 2018 for the severance of a parcel of land to the southwest (Figure 2).

The landowner now proposes to sever the remainder of the property into five lots (as shown in Appendix A), each of which will have lake access and involve the installation of a dock. Design information is not available at this time; however, the landowner has indicated that the docks will employ a floating design.

It is also understood that while consultation with the Municipality of McDougall has not yet been initiated, a fisheries evaluation for new shoreline structures within Type 1 Fish Habitat is anticipated to be required, as per Section 14.03.1.4 of the Municipality's Official Plan (McDougall, 2015). That fisheries evaluation is provided herein.

2.0 STUDY APPROACH

2.1 Planning

Mapping in the Official Plan of the Municipality of McDougall indicates that Type 1 Fish Habitat is found along subject lands, and in basins with mapped wetland habitat located to the northwest/northeast (Appendix B). A definition of Type 1 and Type 2 Fish Habitat was not found in the Township's Official Plan; however, the Official Plan of the nearby Township of Georgian Bay provides the following description (Georgian Bay, 2014):

D.1.6.2	The Ministry of Natural Resources has undertaken <i>Fish Habitat</i> classification mapping which provides a general indication of the type of <i>Fish Habitat</i> that exists. These include:
	 a) Critical Habitats (Type 1) – are those which have a high productive capacity, are rare, highly sensitive to <i>Development</i>, or have a critical role in sustaining fisheries (e.g., spawning and nursery areas for some species, and ground water discharge areas);
	 Important Habitats (Type 2) – are moderately sensitive to <i>Development</i> and although important to the fish populations, are not considered critical (e.g. feeding areas and open water habitats of lakes);

In regards to the installation of docks, Section 14.03.1.4 of the Official Plan of the Municipality of McDougall (2015) specifies the following:

14.03.1.4 Any new structures along shoreline identified as Type 1 or unknown fish Habitat will not be permitted unless it can be demonstrated that there will be no adverse impacts.

(Source: Municipality of McDougall Official Plan, 2015)

2.2 Background Information

In lieu of the traditional step of submitting an information request, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) has communicated their preference that environmental consultants search the Land Information Ontario (LIO) database in order to access the most recent fisheries records.

For Harris Lake, the LIO database indicates the presence of a coolwater fish community, with fish species that include: Northern Pike, Smallmouth Bass, Largemouth Bass, White Sucker, Brown Bullhead, Yellow Perch, Pumpkinseed, and Black Crappie (MNRF, 2020).

The LIO database also confirms the fish habitat designations in the McDougall Official Plan, as seen in Appendix B (MNRF, 2020).

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) aquatic species at risk mapping indicates that there are no records of aquatic Species at Risk in the study area (DFO, 2019).



2.3 Field Evaluation

Azimuth completed a fisheries evaluation of the shoreline and nearshore environment of the five proposed lots on September 8, 2020. This survey was completed by boat, with the landowner having previously marked proposed dock locations for each of the lots using flagging tape.

3.0 EXISTING CONDITIONS

The property is completely forested, with a shoreline dominated by rock topped with thin soils. Overhanging trees (primarily overstory conifers with some early successional deciduous species) provide partial/full shade to many sections of the nearshore environment. This is particularly evident along Lots 3 and 5.

The littoral zone consists of a relatively shallow gradient and substrate dominated by sand, making it productive macrophyte habitat. Dense beds of arrowhead, pickerelweed, white water lily, and water shield are scattered along the shoreline, with gaps with very little to no vegetation. The majority of aquatic vegetation is located within the narrow channel leading to the vegetated basin to the northwest. This basin is expected to function as high-quality, specialized spawning and nursery habitat for a variety of fish species in Harris Lake, particularly centrarchids, Northern Pike and Yellow Perch. Vegetation beds along the remainder of the property are also expected to support a variety of important fish habitat functions, including spawning, refuge and feeding.

Areas between vegetation beds tend to be more dominated by stone. Small and large woody debris is widespread along the shoreline, and several large overstorey trees have fallen into the water by Lots 2/3. An old beaver lodge is present along the shoreline of Lot 3, and likely hosts common baitfish. All of these habitat features serve to provide cover and refuge habitat for a variety of coolwater fish species.

Site photographs, including the proposed dock locations, are included in Appendix C.

4.0 IMPACT ASSESSMENT

The proposal to install five docks for the lots shown in Appendix A is anticipated to have a negligible impact on fish and fish habitat. While their size and footprint are unknown at this stage, there will be no loss of lakebed habitat through infilling as they will utilize a floating design. Furthermore, the landowner has selected ideal locations for all docks in order to avoid impacts to high-quality fish habitat. This includes avoiding all emergent/floating macrophyte beds, large downed woody debris and the



beaver lodge. The docks for Lots 1 and 2 will also avoid impacts to sensitive, specialized fish habitat in the narrow channel leading to the northwest wetland basin through placement away from this channel.

The amount of shoreline vegetation removal required for dock installation is unknown, but is expected to be minimal for Lots 1, 2 and 4. In these lots, docks will be located away from overstory trees, and will likely only result in a small loss in shrub cover. In Lots 3 and 5, it is anticipated that several overstory trees will require removal to facilitate dock installation and access. Permanent floating structures are expected to offset most of the loss in shading to the nearshore environment from tree removal. The docks will also provide artificial cover for fish species including Smallmouth Bass.

It is not anticipated that blasting will be required for the proposed docks. Minimal excavation may be required, bringing with it the risk of sediment mobilization into the lake. Section 5.0 provides recommendations for dock design and installation in order to protect fish and fish habitat. Assuming these recommendations are adopted, potential impacts are considered mitigable, and there is no expectation that dock installation will negatively harm fish and fish habitat adjacent to the five proposed lots.

5.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

Dock design and installation should consider employing the following recommendations and Best Management Practices (BMP's) in order to avoid/mitigate impacts to fish and fish habitat:

- For access to and installation of the proposed docks, riparian vegetation removal (including overstory tree removal) should be limited to the extent possible. Riparian vegetation below the high water line of Harris Lake is considered to be fish habitat under the federal *Fisheries Act*, and its removal should be limited to only that required for the width of the dock;
- All site disturbance should be minimized to the extent possible, and any areas of disturbed soil remaining after construction should be re-vegetated;
- All lake materials, including stone and woody debris, should be left untouched, and not moved/used for construction;
- If abutments are required for the proposed docks, they should be located above the high-water line of the lake. If concrete is to be used, casting and curing of concrete should occur away from the water before its final placement;
- Wherever possible, untreated materials should be used for dock assembly. If seals or stains are required, only environmentally-friendly (non-toxic) products should be used, with adequate drying time away from the lake environment;



- The shoreline and nearshore environment are to be protected at all times from sediment. For any excavation/tree removal required along the shoreline,
 sediment controls should be utilized to ensure erodible soils and site runoff is contained, particularly following rain events;
- It is recommended that site disturbance be minimized during times of maximum runoff, which is typically during the spring months following the period of snow melt. No in-water work is anticipated to be required for installation of the floating docks. However, near-water work should aim to avoid the period from April 1 to July 1 to protect fish during the spring spawning and rearing period;
- If machinery is required, it should be stored, serviced and refueled more than 30m away from the property's shoreline. The excavator operator should have an appropriate spill response plan, including a spill kit on site at all times;
- At no time is machinery permitted to enter the nearshore environment
- Review of final dock designs by a Fisheries Ecologist may be required to
 determine permitting requirements under the *Fisheries Act*. However, floating
 docks that minimize vegetation removal, have relatively small footprints (eg.,
 <50m²), do not involve infilling of the lake bed, do not require blasting, and
 involve the installation of any abutments above the high water line are not
 expected to require Fisheries and Oceans Canada review.

6.0 CLOSURE

Based on a review of existing habitat and the proposed placement of the five docks, and provided recommendations in Section 5.0 are adhered to, the proposed docks will not adversely impact fish habitat (including Type 1 Fish Habitat) within Harris Lake.




Figure 2: Property Location (Part Lot 8, Concession 3, Municipality of McDougall; blue star/arrows show study area; red polygon represents previously severed lot; source: VuMap, 2020).





Background



Attached to this report is a draft road naming bylaw to formalize Burnside Trail into our official road name list (as a private road).

Community Sharps Bin Installed in the Town of Parry Sound

PARRY SOUND, ON – The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) is pleased to announce, in partnership with the Town of Parry Sound, a community sharps bin has been installed in Parry Sound. When used sharps are discarded improperly, such as in recycling, garbage or even in a public place, it is often the result of not having a place to properly dispose of them. Providing a place for people to safely discard sharps helps keep the community safer for everyone.

The community sharps bin, located at the corner of Seguin Street and Gibson Street, is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It is important that only loose sharps (e.g., needles) or sharps in a puncture-proof container be put into the bin. Garbage and other drug-use equipment, such as wrappers, water and tourniquets, are to be disposed of in the garbage can located near the bin.

Harm reduction services, such as needle exchange and sharps drop off, will still be available at CMHA-MPS, the OATC, the Health Unit and other locations throughout the community.

The Health Unit is mandated by the Ministry of Health to provide harm reduction services, including a needle exchange program. Harm reduction services aim to build relationships with individuals in an effort to restore human dignity.

"Our objective is to work with clients over time with the goal of connecting these individuals with the support they need, when they are ready," said Chris Bowes, Manager of Healthy Living at the Health Unit.

The needle exchange program aims to reduce the adverse health, social and economic consequences associated with drug use. The Health Unit follows Best Practice Recommendations for Canadian Harm Reduction Programs. As such, the Health Unit's needle exchange program distributes sterile needles and drug use supplies to clients in the quantities requested to reduce the risk of contracting blood-borne infections, such as HIV and hepatitis C. Evidence shows that strict exchange policies such as "one-for-one" do not lead to higher return rates of needles, and do not work to prevent the spread of infection.

"The reasons why individuals use substances are complex. Personal, social, economic and environmental factors often influence why someone might use drugs. These factors are called the social determinants of health," explains Sam Docherty, Community Health Promoter.

Lack of education, unemployment/poor working conditions and lack of adequate housing; social environment (e.g., safe neighborhood, family violence), decreased access to social support and health services; and personal factors such as gender, personal skills (e.g., resiliency), ethnic background and biology/genetics can play a role in problematic substance use and addictions. By addressing the social determinants of health, working with community partners, lobbying the government, and providing services that help to address barriers to health, individuals in our community can overcome these barriers.

Have Symptoms of COVID-19? Arrange to be Tested

NIPISSING & PARRY SOUND, ON – The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) is reminding the public when they have any one symptom of COVID-19 to self-isolate immediately and arrange to be tested. Although the Health Unit's case count remains low compared to other areas of the province, the district has seen continued increase in reported cases in our region since around the beginning of April. At the same time, testing rates across our district have been lower than usual since mid-March. This means there are likely more cases in the community than are reported in the district numbers, and we must continue to work together as a district to help slow the spread.

"We all know what to do, we just need to put it into practice," explains Dr. Jim Chirico Medical Officer of Health. "Anyone who has symptoms of COVID-19 needs to self-isolate immediately, arrange to be tested, and continue the isolation until a negative test result is confirmed. Individuals are not to self-diagnose their symptoms."

Individuals who wish to be tested can book an appointment at any of the Assessment Centres in or near our district.

Make COVID-19 Safe May Long Weekend Plans

NIPISSING & PARRY SOUND, ON – We are just over a week away from the unofficial start to summer – the May long weekend – however, this **does not** mark the end to COVID-19. Although it is uncertain whether the province will extend the Stay-At-Home Order and the provincial shutdown, individuals are reminded that public health guidance must still be followed.

"Many people look forward to the May long weekend as a time to celebrate the warmer weather with others, but everyone needs to make sure these plans are COVID-19 safe," states Dr. Jim Chirico, Medical Officer of Health. "COVID-19 safe means to only gather with people from your own home, or if you live alone, only gather with your exclusive close contact home. By making the smart choices now, we can help prevent a shutdown over the summer."

Public health measures include:

- Remaining at home except for essential purposes, such as going to the grocery store or pharmacy, accessing health care services (including getting vaccinated), exercising outdoors, or for work that cannot be done remotely;
- Practicing physical distancing staying two (2) metres from others who do not reside in your home or where you are living, and if you live alone, physically distancing from anyone outside your exclusive close contact home;
- Wearing a face covering indoors and outdoors as required and whenever physical distancing is difficult;
- Washing or sanitizing your hands often;
- Coughing and sneezing into your sleeve;
- Avoiding touching your eyes, nose or mouth;
- Cleaning high touch objects and surfaces often.

If you think you may have COVID-19 symptoms or have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive, first self-isolate and then use <u>Ontario's Self-Assessment Tool</u> to see if you need to seek testing or further care. If you need further assistance, call your health care provider or the Health Unit at <u>1-844-478-1400</u>. If you have severe symptoms, such as difficulty breathing, you should call 911 and mention your symptoms if you are able.

More Vaccine Remains Priority for Health Unit as Eligibility Expands

NIPISSING & PARRY SOUND, ON – As Ontario acts quickly to open COVID-19 vaccine appointments to new age bands and priority groups, the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) wishes to remind the public that a limited supply of vaccine has been allocated to the Health Unit, which may not align with the increase in local demand that is expected over the coming weeks with the new eligibility groups. The Health Unit is assuring the public that everyone who wants a COVID-19 vaccine will get one, but asks for patience as the province continues to prioritize hotspot locations.

"We've been fortunate that we've been able to open up appointments to more individuals recently, and we're excited that our Health Unit met the provincial target of having 40% of our adult population vaccinated with at least one dose by the end of April," says Andrea McLellan, Director of COVID-19 Immunization Strategy at the Health Unit. "However, vaccine supply is still a critical factor for us in making sure we are able to continue to meet our targets and continue offering appointments to everyone who becomes eligible."

The Health Unit is already seeing higher demand after eligibility was announced yesterday for individuals born in 1966 or before. Online booking is strongly encouraged and is now available for this group at <u>Ontario.ca/BookVaccine</u>. The Health Unit Call Centre is available for eligible individuals who are unable to book online, and continues to receive a high number of calls. As a result, the Call Centre will be extending its hours to be available 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, May 1, and the Health Unit is reminding the public to please be patient when calling to book an appointment.

Dear Heads of Council and First Nations Chiefs:

I am writing to provide you with an update on the new Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment boards under the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA).

As you may remember, in February 2020, the Ministry of the Solicitor General conducted seven regional roundtable sessions across the province. Discussions at these sessions focused on new OPP-related regulatory requirements under the CSPA. Municipalities and First Nation communities receiving policing services from the OPP were invited to learn more about new OPP-related legislative and regulatory requirements and provide the ministry with feedback to inform the development of related regulatory proposals. In addition, we heard from many of you through various letters and engagement opportunities, including meetings with the Association of Municipalities of Ontario MOU Table and Rural Ontario Municipal Association about what you would like your new OPP detachment board to look like.

In response to your feedback, an OPP detachment board framework has been developed that we hope will provide municipalities and First Nation communities receiving direct and/or supplemental services from the OPP the flexibility to create a board that reflects your community and local needs.

Under this framework, municipalities and First Nation communities receiving direct and/or supplemental services from an OPP detachment are being asked to submit one proposal (per detachment) indicating the composition of their board and, if needed, a rationale for multiple boards and the composition of each additional board.

Municipalities and First Nations within a detachment are asked to work together to determine the composition of their board(s) as well as the manner in which they will submit their proposal to the ministry. For example, after determining the composition of the detachment board(s), municipalities and First Nations within a detachment area may select one municipality or First Nation to complete and submit the proposal.

Proposals must meet base requirements set by the ministry, which include a minimum number of five members per board and a requirement that each board should be composed of 20% community representatives and 20% provincial appointees. To that end, municipalities and First Nations are not required at this time to identify the names of the individuals that will be participating on the detachment board. Rather, you are only asked to identify the number of seats each municipality and First Nation will be allocated on the detachment board as well as the number of community representatives and provincial appointments.

To streamline and support the proposal process, the ministry has developed a digital form that can be accessed using the link included <u>here</u>.

The ministry will work with municipalities and First Nations to obtain outstanding information/proposals and support you in submitting a completed proposal. If, however, a proposal still does not meet the minimum requirements, or a proposal is not submitted and/or if no consensus is reached on the composition of the board then the ministry will determine the composition of the detachment board.

Completed proposals are to be submitted to the ministry by Monday, June 7, 2021.

We recognize the significant implications that the current COVID-19 emergency has had on municipalities and First Nations across the province. To this end, in addition to the written supporting material attached here, we are also pleased to work with you directly through virtual information sessions.

BY-LAW NO. 2021-18

Being a By-law to declare to be surplus, stop up, close and sell:

Part of the Original Shore Road Allowance laid out along the shore of Mill Lake in front of Lot 22 in Concession 2, in the geographic Township of McDougall, now in the Municipality of McDougall, in the District of Parry Sound, designated as Part 3 on 42R-21551 (FREETHY).

WHEREAS pursuant to Sections 8, 9, 11 and 35 of the <u>Municipal Act, 2001</u> S.O. 2001, Chapter 25, (the "Act") The Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall is empowered to stop up and close any part of a highway over which it has jurisdiction;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to Sections 8, 9 and 11 of the said <u>Municipal Act.</u> <u>2001</u>, ante, The Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall is empowered to sell any part of a highway that is legally stopped up and closed;

AND WHEREAS the Clerk of The Corporation of the Municipality of McDougall, did cause a Notice in the prescribed form of the proposed by-law to declare to be surplus, stop up and authorize the sale of that highway part described in this by-law ("the highway") to be published for four consecutive weeks in the "North Star", a newspaper of local circulation, and to be posted on the bulletin board in the municipal offices and on the municipal web site;

AND WHEREAS the permanent closing of the highway will not result in any person being deprived of his, her or its sole means of motor vehicle access to and from the person's land over any highway;

AND WHEREAS Council has determined that the highway proposed to be closed is surplus to the needs of the Municipality and deems it expedient to sell the highway as closed to the abutting owner or owners;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED AS A BY-LAW OF THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF MCDOUGALL AS FOLLOWS:

1. This Council does hereby permanently stop up and close:

Part of the Original Shore Road Allowance laid out along the shore of Mill Lake in front of Lot 22 in Concession 2, in the geographic Township of McDougall, now in the Municipality of McDougall, in the District of Parry Sound, designated as Part 3 on 42R-21551.

- 2. This Council does hereby declare that the land comprised of the closed highway is surplus to the needs of the Municipality.
- 3. This Council does hereby authorize the sale of Part 3 on 42R-21551 for the sum of \$11,350 subject to any easements that may be required by Bell Canada or Hydro One as Council in its discretion may determine, provided that any portion of the closed highway that is covered by water shall be retained by the Municipality.
- 4. The Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized to execute all documents in connection with the closing of the highway and the subsequent transfer of title.
