#### <u>Purpose</u>

To update Mayor and Council on the state of progress of the development of a single joint Community Safety and Well Being Plan for West Parry Sound Municipalities. Currently, the systems are response based and often not initiated until critical points in order to resolve social development issues. The goal is to create multi-sectoral partnerships that will work together to mitigate critical path points and provide proactive solutions that reduce emergency events by identifying issues ahead of time and begin to resolve them before emergency response is needed.

#### **Background**

Each Municipality in Ontario is legislated to develop a Community Safety and Well-Being Plan, CSWB ("the Plan") by July 2021. The CSWB Plan development team must work with community partners and municipal residents to develop the plan. The Fire Chiefs of West Parry Sound have been tasked with this project by their CAO's and have decided to approach this task similar to our emergency response plan requirements; that being to cooperate, develop, and implement a joint common CSWB plan that we would all share.

**The Statutory Advisory Committee** (Staff Sergeant Jeremy MacDonald, Fire Chief Dave Thompson, Fire Chief Gord Harrison, Fire Chief Brian Leduc, Whitestone community volunteer Janice Bray, Pam Nelson DSSAB, Denise Almeda HANDS Family Network, Kim Laurie – Canadian Mental Health Association, Gisele Hebert – Children's Aid Society, Penny Moffat, School Board; will act in partnership with the appointed **Plan Coordinator** (Fire Chief Gord Harrison) to facilitate the Plan's development. The Community Safety & Well-Being Plan Statutory Advisory Committee is a group of multi-sectoral community members from various organizations and community service groups. The Committee is legislated to have, at a minimum:

- An employee of the Municipalities and First Nations Community; (still seeking a First Nation Community member)
- A representative from the education sector;
- A representative from the health or mental health sector;
- A representative from the community or social services sector;
- A representative from the children and youth services sector; and
- Detachment Commander from Ontario Provincial Police.

The Statutory Advisory Committee will participate in meaningful discussion to identify our community's vulnerable sectors and risk factors, and collaborate with community partners to evaluate and enhance existing programs and services aimed at safety and well-being within the community. Our meeting schedule began in middle of April and have been by-weekly.

The advisory committee is now at the point to distribute the required public consultation through developed surveys. There is a community member public survey to be distributed through Municipalities and a community service statistical survey to be distributed to the health, mental health, education, social services and youth services sectors. The Municipal sector survey is attached.

Thank you for reaching out, Mayor Robinson.

We can appreciate how disappointing the news has been for many municipalities, to say the least. Enbridge Gas submitted over 200 eligible submissions for natural gas expansion to Ontario Energy Board (OEB) late last year for consideration. The OEB compiled a <u>report on all submissions</u> they received for the Province's review, and released it to the public on December 10, 2020.

The decision to select 28 project proposals was not made by Enbridge, but rather with the Ministry of Energy.

You may wish to consider reaching out to your local MPP and inquire as to why McDougal was not selected? MPP Miller may be able to provide you with some insight on this. We know Phase 2 was oversubscribed and we hope the Ministry will take this into consideration and introduce a phase three program in the future.

In the meantime, my team and I would be pleased to review your proposed project and prepare a high level feasibility cost should you wish? At the very least, we can see what the associated costs will be to service McDougall with natural gas for the municipalities consideration.

#### **Background:**

Application has been made to construct a private road that crosses over 33' of a municipal concession road allowance, being a boundary between the Municipality of McDougall and Township of Seguin. The concession road allowance is described as Concession 1, Lot 8 in the Municipality of McDougall and Concession 12, Lot 9 in the Township of Seguin. The applicants, Franco and Tanya Salituro, own lands on either side of the boundary, being Concession 1 Part Lot 6, Lots 7, 8,9, and 10, former McDougall Township, now the Municipality of McDougall, and Lots 6,7,8,9, and 10, Concession 12, former Foley Township, now the Township of Seguin.

The applicants propose to construct a cottage on Dora Lake in the Township of Seguin. In order to develop the Seguin lands, formal or legal access is required from a Municipal Road. The lands are accessed from Haines Lake Road, a municipally maintained road, and Finch Trail a private maintained road. The majority of Finch Trail traverses a former colonization road, with portions being in private ownership. The applicant is currently working on establishing deeded right-of-way over a small pocket of Finch Trail that is privately owned. Entering into an

agreement with the Municipality of McDougall is one of many components of satisfying the access requirement by Seguin Township. The applicants have also made application to enter into an agreement with the Township of Seguin.

The McDougall Official Plan allows for improvements to unmaintained municipal road allowance providing that the proponents enter into a legal agreement with the Municipality that includes provision for indemnification of liability, signage and liability insurance; providing that the proposed improvement will have no negative impacts on natural heritage features or on their ecological function.

Staff have reviewed the zoning on the subject road allowance and note that there is not contravention to Zoning By-law 2017-05, and that no natural heritage features or areas of provincial significance have been identified.

### **Recommendation:**

Staff have no objection to entering into an agreement with applicants to obtain access over the 33' municipal CRA. The agreement may include the following provisions: insurance requirements, clearing width, maintenance responsibility, non-exclusive use, inspection requirements, signage, and termination. All legal and surveying costs would be the responsibility of the applicants.

#### **Media Release**

The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) would like to commend the Province of Ontario for taking a giant step forward in improving waste diversion and protecting the environment.

Today, Ontario's Environment Minister Jeff Yurek formally announced the final regulation to transition the Blue Box program from municipalities to producers. When fully implemented, this regulation will go a long way in addressing litter in our communities, reducing single-use plastics making their way into watercourses and expanding the Blue Box program into new communities in Northern Ontario.

"This regulation has been looked at by three consecutive governments. I would like to recognize Premier Ford and Minister Yurek for having the courage to introduce this regulation, which will not only benefit our environment but will remove the cost of the Blue Box program from property taxes," stated FONOM President Danny Whalen

FONOM has been actively working for nearly a decade with AMO, M3RC, OWMA, and municipal staff from across the province on the framework for this regulation. Additionally, FONOM's membership has been instrumental in ensuring that all Northern and Rural Ontario (excluding those in the far north) is included in the transition.

"I would like to applaud the team that AMO assembled from across the province," stated President Whalen. "Staff from the City of Toronto and other regions within southern Ontario were instrumental in ensuring Northern Ontario is included in the regulation."

The FONOM Board would like to thank AMO's Board and Staff for the advocacy on this file on behalf of our members. Monika Turner, Dave Gordon, and Amber Crawford have worked tirelessly on this issue with Stewards and the Government, along with FONOM's own Councillor Mac Bain.

Some of the highlights of the Regulation are:

- Staggered transition from municipalities from 2023 to 2025
- Expanding collection to all communities outside the Far North by 2026;
- Standardizes what can be recycled across Ontario;
- Includes municipalities under 5,000 population
- Accepting common single-use and packaging-like products such as paper and plastic cups, foils, trays, bags, and boxes sold for home use;
- Collecting single-use items that are distributed or sold to consume food and beverage products, like stir sticks, straws, cutlery, and plates;



- Expanding services to more facilities such as apartment buildings, municipally run or non-profit long-term care homes and retirement homes, and schools;
- Expanding collection to more parks, playgrounds, and transit stations, more than tripling the number of public space recycling bins funded under the current program so there are more opportunities to recycle at home and on the go.
- Ensures existing deposit return programs such as The Beer Store will continue.

### **Future Survey: ROMA Economic Growth Plan**

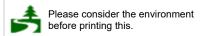

Dear Premier Ford:

Speeding on provincial, county and municipal roadways continues to put the lives of Ontarians at risk. While we have access to several tools to help mitigate speeding traffic, the one tool that is currently not fully available to us is Automatic Speed Enforcement (ASE) (aka Photo Radar). Over the past decade, in South West Oxford the vast majority of charges laid are for drivers travelling well in excess of the posted speed limit. The cost of providing police time for something that could be done through the use of technology is disturbing to our council. The Council feels that it would be far more effective to have police concentrate on other problems such as Break and Enters, illegal drugs and domestic problems.

We need a way to address the poor behaviours and habits that are putting our citizens at risk and tying up much needed first responder resources that could be better utilized to improve the well-being of our communities. Speeding, particularly through our small villages, creates community concerns for the safety and wellbeing of our children and other vulnerable members. We need your help.

In keeping with this The Council of the Township of South-West Oxford duly moved and carried the following resolution at the regular meeting held on January 5, 2021:

...RESOLVED that the Council of the Township of South-West Oxford provide direction to the Clerk to send a letter to the Premier, MPP Ernie Hardeman, AMO and all Ontario municipalities in support of the use of Automatic Speed Enforcement (photo radar) by municipalities.

### RE: Bill 228 - Banning unencapsulated Polystyrene Foam

**WHEREAS** unencapsulated expanded and extruded polystyrene foam (PS foam) is a common and economical product used for dock flotation; and

**WHEREAS** unencapsulated PS foam, when used as floatation, deteriorates and breaks down through exposure to water, sunlight and chemicals (gasoline, oil & other contaminants), as well as from animals and physical impacts from boats and other debris; and

WHEREAS the environmental impacts associated with the breakdown of unencapsulated PS foam are significant. PS foam is one of the top items of debris found on shorelines, beaches, and surface water around the world. Widespread and global contamination has resulted in PS foam being found in the gut contents of wildlife, including in the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence River Basin. PS foam causes adverse effects to wildlife when ingested. Laboratory experiments show negative impacts of PS foam on feeding behaviour, growth, hepatosomatic index (HSI), and reproduction. Under certain conditions, PS foam leaches known toxics styrene and benzene. Floating particles of PS foam also has aesthetic impacts on shorelines and waterways; and

**AND WHEREAS** there is no Federal legislation in Canada regulating the use of unencapsulated expanded polystyrene foam (EPS) for docks to date. However, on May 13, 2021, the Province of Ontario passed *Bill 228: Keeping Polystyrene Out of Ontario's Lakes and Rivers Act*, to regulate and control its use for floats; and

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative (Cities Initiative) recognizes the need for PS foam to be encapsulated when used for flotation; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Cities Initiative and its members call on the Federal Government of Canada (Ministries of Fisheries and the Environment) the Province of Ontario (Ministry of Natural Resources & Forestry, Ministry of Environment, Conservation & Parks), the Province of Quebec, The United States (U.S.) Federal Government, and the U.S. States of New York, Pennsylvania,

Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota to work in collaboration with each other to enact laws which:

- ban unencapsulated polystyrene (PS) products in all new and replacement public and private floating facilities across the Great Lakes Region and the coasts of Canada and the United Sates;
- 2. find common standards of defining encapsulation with the goal of zero emissions of PS foam;
- require the timely transition to approved encapsulated PS products, for all public and private floating facilities currently using unencapsulated PS foam; and
- 4. require the proper disposal of all unencapsulated expanded polystyrene (EPS) products currently being used for dock flotation.

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED** that Council for the Corporation of the Township of The Archipelago directs its staff to submit this resolution to the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Cities Initiative; and forward this resolution to all municipalities in the Great Lakes watershed and to Federal and Provincial Representatives.

# RE: <u>Bill 279 – Environmental Protection Amendment Act (Microplastics Filters</u> for Washing Machines), 2021

**WHEREAS** microfibers are human-made strands less than 5mm composed of either synthetic or natural materials. Microfibers are shed through the wear and tear of textiles through the laundering process;

**WHEREAS** billions of microfibers are released into the Great Lakes daily from machine laundering of clothes. Studies have found a single load of laundry can release up to millions of microfibers into washing machine effluent, which flows to the wastewater treatment plant. Wastewater treatment can capture up to 99% of microfibers in sewage sludge, but microfibers are still released into aquatic ecosystems through treated effluent. Billions of microfibers are released into the aquatic ecosystem daily in the Great Lakes basin, either directly via treated final effluent, or indirectly as runoff from landapplication of treated sewage sludge; and

**WHEREAS** microfiber contamination is widespread: Worldwide and local studies have shown microfibers present in commercial fish, Great Lakes fish (including Lake Trout, Rainbow smelt, Brown bullhead, etc.), honey, salt, Great Lakes beer, tap water, bottled water and much more; and

**WHEREAS** microfibers are the most prevalent type of microplastics in the environment and have been found in surface water, soil, biota, and atmospheric samples; and

**WHEREAS** a 2014 surface water study in Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, and their tributaries measured micoplastics at abundances between 90,000 and 6.7 million particles per square kilometer. These levels of microplastics are similar to or exceed concentrations found in ocean gyres like the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch; and

WHEREAS microplastics do not biodegrade; and

**WHEREAS** chemicals such dyes and flame retardants are added to textiles during manufacturing. Textiles can also absorb chemicals from their environment after manufacturing. Some of these chemicals are toxic, and harmful chemical compounds can be released into the environment via leaching from microfibers; and

**WHEREAS** a growing body of research shows that the effects of microplastics on animal life are far-reaching. Researchers have investigated the impacts of microplastics on gene expression, individual cells, survival, and reproduction. Mounting evidence shows that negative impacts can include decreased feeding and growth, endocrine disruption,

decreased fertility, and other lethal and sub-lethal effects. Some of these effects are due to ingestion stress (physical blockage), but many of the risks to ecosystems are associated with the chemicals in the plastic. Studies have shown that chemicals transfer to fish when they consume microplastics. When these fish end up on our dinner plates, we potentially increase the burden of hazardous chemicals in our bodies; and

WHEREAS a recent set of laundering experiments in the laboratory; have shown that an external filter can capture an average of 87% of fibres by count and 80% by weight before they go down the drain (McIlwraith et al. 2019). On a wider scale and in real-life context, Georgian Bay Forever, the University of Toronto and the Town of Parry Sound are completing a study that is measuring the effect that about 100 filters in households has on reducing microfibre pollution in the effluent of a wastewater treatment plant. The results of this study are to be released in August; and

**WHEREAS** add-on filters cost approximately \$180-220 CDN to purchase and install, which is prohibitive for the average household. Accordingly, voluntary adoption rates are low; and

**WHEREAS** France has passed legislation (France 2020-105, Article 79) that requires future washing machines sold to have filters. California has introduced a bill (California AB 622), and Ontario has tabled Private Member's Bill 279 to prohibit sales of washing machines without a filter of mesh size 100 microns or smaller. Companies such as Arclik have manufactured washing machines with filters built directly into them;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Cities Initiative (Cities Initiative) recognizes that to date the largest documented source of environmental microfibers is washing machines, and that findings indicate washing machine filters mitigate the majority of fibres shed during machine washing; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Cities Initiative recognizes the need to require future sales of washing machines to include filters with a maximum mesh size of 100 microns; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Cities Initiative and its members call on the Ontario government to pass Bill 279, and to call on the Canadian and U.S. government to create appropriate regulatory measures to the same effect; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that until households can only buy new laundry machines outfitted with <100 micron filters, the Cities Initiative and its members call on provincial, state and federal governments to provide funding and education to help constituents reduce microfiber waste.

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED** that Council for the Corporation of the Township of The Archipelago directs its staff to submit this resolution to the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Cities Initiative; and forward this resolution to all municipalities in the Great Lakes watershed and to Federal and Provincial Representatives.

The Municipal Council of the Town of Fort Erie at its meeting of May 31, 2021 passed the following resolution:

Whereas primary residences are currently exempt from a capital gains tax, and

**Whereas** currently secondary and additional non-primary properties are subject to capital gains, and

**Whereas** the Federal Government is currently looking into a primary residence capital gains tax as they have recognized that affordable housing has become a serious issue in Canada, and

**Whereas** smaller communities including the Town of Fort Erie are seeing unprecedented higher selling prices that are outpacing prices in larger cities, and

Whereas many hard-working Canadians who have only a primary residence with no additional non-primary homes count on their home equity as financial aid to apply to upsizing or downsizing their home depending on their personal situation, and

**Whereas** a change in taxation to primary residences would be a significant financial blow to Canadians and would create an unfair, two-tiered taxation which could lead to depleted savings, inter-generational disparities, disparities among diverse groups such as seniors who may have a significant portion of their savings vested in their primary residence, as well as, reducing the ability of home ownership thereby a further, higher need for rentals, and

Whereas the Federal government could look at other means to slow down the rapidly escalating housing costs to improve housing affordability;

### RE: Audited Financial Statements, Financial Information Return (FIR), and COVID-19 Update

The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit Audited Financial Statements for the year-ended December 31, 2020, and your 2020 Municipal FIR Schedule 77 are attached for your review. The status of the municipal reserve as of December 31, 2020, can be found on page 13, note 4, of the financial statements.

We would also like to update you on the Health Unit's financial situation related to the COVID-19 pandemic. We are monitoring the extra costs incurred to respond to COVID-19, and we are also monitoring cost savings related to regular work reductions.

When the Health Unit drafted its annual funding request, additional funding to cover both general COVID-19 extraordinary costs (e.g. Call Centre and personal protective equipment [PPE]) and costs related to the COVID-19 immunization initiative throughout the district were included in the request. These requests are currently in the approval process with the Ministry of Health (Ministry); we hope to have a positive response to the requests by early July.

Of note, the Health Unit did receive a letter from the Minister of Health, Christine Elliott dated January 13, 2021, (Appendix A) confirming the Ministry's support for pandemic and regular programming.

If the Health Unit receives the additional funding requested, there will be no risk of increased levy costs for 2021.

The Health Unit is not considering staff layoffs at this time as all staff are needed to address the COVID-19 pandemic response, along with prioritized regular program work. Approximately 150 additional staff have been hired on a temporary basis to assist with the COVID-19 immunization initiative.

Confirmation of 2022 funding, including any mitigation funding, is pending. Should the change to the 30/70 municipal/provincial cost-sharing be fully implemented, this would mean an increase to the 2022 municipal levy by 42% or more above the current 2021 levy amounts.

The Health Unit remains committed to protecting the health of our communities, and will keep municipalities apprised of any significant changes to our status.

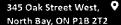

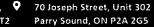

RE: 2021 COVID-19 Extraordinary Costs

Ontario's public health system has demonstrated remarkable responsiveness to COVID-19, as the outbreak has evolved locally and globally. The government acknowledges the extraordinary and continuing efforts of the public health sector, including public health units, to monitor, detect, and contain COVID-19 in the province.

For the 2021 funding year, public health units are expected to take all necessary measures to continue to respond to COVID-19 in their catchment areas, support the Ministry of Health in the provincial roll-out of the COVID-19 Vaccine Program, and continue to maintain critical public health programs and services as identified in Board of Health approved pandemic plans.

As the COVID-19 response continues, we do anticipate that many public health units will continue to incur additional expenses to support these efforts. In recognition of these unique circumstances, we want to assure you that there will be a process for public health units to request reimbursement of COVID-19 extraordinary costs incurred in 2021. Similar to previous processes, we ask that these costs be those over and above what can be managed from within the budget of the Board of Health, and that you continue to track these costs separately.

Thank you for the important service that your public health unit provides to Ontarians, and your ongoing dedication and commitment to addressing the public health needs of Ontarians.

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies

### Nature of Organization

The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit is incorporated without share capital under the Health Protection and Promotion Act and its principal activity is to provide mandatory public health programs. The Health Unit is a non-profit organization and is a registered charity exempt from income taxes under the Income Tax Act.

### **Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements of the Health Unit are prepared by management in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the Health Unit are as follows:

## Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit. The following programs are funded through grants from the Province of Ontario and through transfer payments from member municipalities.

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, current bank accounts and short-term deposits, if any, with terms to maturity of less than 90 days.

### **Tangible Capital Assets**

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Cost includes all costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of the tangible capital asset including transportation costs, installation costs, design and engineering fees, legal fees and site preparation costs. Contributed tangible capital assets are recorded at fair value at the time of the donation, with a corresponding amount recorded as revenue. Amortization is recorded on a straight-line basis over the estimated life of the tangible capital asset commencing once the asset is available for productive use as follows:

### **Retirement Benefits**

The Health Unit's contributions due during the period to its multi employer defined benefit plan are expensed as incurred.

### **Revenue Recognition**

Provincial funding revenues are recognized in the year to which the program relates. Municipal revenues are recognized in the year they are levied to member municipalities. Other revenues are recognized when services are provided and collection is reasonably assured. Investment revenue is recognized in the period earned.

Government transfers are recognized as revenue in the financial statements when the transfer is authorized and all eligibility criteria are met, except to the extent that transfer stipulations give rise to an obligation that meets the definition of a liability. Transfers are recognized as deferred revenue when transfer stipulations give rise to a liability. Transfer revenue is recognized in the statement of operations as the stipulation liabilities are settled.

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian public sector accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. The principal estimates used in the preparation of these financial statements are the determination of the estimated useful life of tangible capital assets. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

### **Economic Dependence**

Substantially all of the Health Unit's revenue is received from the Province of Ontario and municipalities in it's district. The continuation of the Health Unit is dependent on this funding.

Any adjustment to funding is recorded in the year it becomes known as an adjustment to net assets.

### 12. Contingencies

On July 1, 1987, a group of health care organizations, ("subscribers"), formed Healthcare Insurance Reciprocal of Canada ("HIROC"). HIROC is registered as a Reciprocal pursuant to provincial Insurance Acts which permit persons to exchange with other persons reciprocal contracts of indemnity insurance. HIROC facilitates the provision of liability insurance coverage to health care organizations in the provinces and territories where it is licensed. Subscribers pay annual premiums, which are actuarially determined, and are subject to assessment for losses in excess of such premiums, if any, experienced by the group of subscribers for the years in which they were a subscriber. No such assessments have been made to current date.

Since its inception in 1987, HIROC has accumulated an unappropriate surplus, which is the total of premiums paid by all subscribers plus investment income less the obligation for claims reserves and expenses and operating expenses. Each subscriber which has an excess of premium plus investment income over the obligation for their allocation of claims reserves and expenses and operating expenses may be entitled to receive distributions of their share of the unappropriated surplus at the time such distributions are declared by the Board of Directors of HIROC.

The Health Unit became a member of HIROC in January 2013 and is subject to any assessment on a proportionate basis.

### 13. Commitments

- a. The Health Unit rents office premises in Sturgeon Falls on a lease that expired during 2017, currently on a month to month agreement, Mattawa based on scheduled clinics, total was \$924 for the year, Parry Sound under lease expiring in August 31, 2021 at \$120,564 per year and Burks Falls under lease expiring in September 30, 2022 at \$27,849 per year.
- b. The Health Unit rents equipment under various long-term leases, the longest of which expires in 2024. The annual lease payments amount to \$34,666 (2019 \$34,666).

### 14. Pension Agreement

The Health Unit is an employer member of the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System (OMERS), which is a multi-employer, defined benefit pension plan. The Board of Trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing the management of the pension plan, including investment of the assets and administration of the benefits. The Health Unit has adopted defined contribution plan accounting principles for this Plan because insufficient information is available to apply defined benefit plan accounting principles. The Health Unit records as pension expense the current service cost, amortization of past service costs and interest costs related to the future employment contributions to the Plan for past employee service.

OMERS provides pension services to almost half a million active and retired members and approximately 1,000 employers. Each year an independent actuary determines the funding status of OMERS Primary Pension Plan (the Plan) by comparing the actuarial value of invested assets to the estimated present value of all pension benefits that members have earned to date. The most recent actuarial valuation of the Plan was conducted at December 31, 2020. The results of this valuation disclosed total actuarial liabilities of \$113,055 million in respect of benefits accrued for service with actuarial assets at that date of \$109,844 million indicating a going concern actuarial deficit of \$3,211 million. Because OMERS is a multi-employer plan, any pension plan surpluses or deficits are a joint responsibility of Ontario municipal organizations and their employees. As a result, the Health Unit does not recognize any share of the OMERS pension surplus or deficit. The amount contributed to OMERS for 2020 was \$1,215,221 (2019 - \$1,173,568) for current service.

### 15. Segmented Reporting

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants Public Sector Accounting Handbook Section PS 2700, Segment Disclosures, establishes standards on defining and disclosing segments in a government's financial statements. Government organizations that apply these standards are encouraged to provide the disclosures established by this section when their operations are diverse enough to warrant such disclosures. The Health Unit has only one identifiable segment, considered to be public health, as presented in these financial statements.

### 18. Uncertainty due to COVID-19

Although the disruption from the virus is expected to be temporary, given the dynamic nature of these circumstances, the duration of disruption and the related financial impact cannot be reasonably estimated at this time. The Health Unit's ability to continue delivering services and employ related staff, will depend on the legislative mandates from the various levels of government. The Health Unit will continue to focus on managing expenditures and leveraging existing funds and available credit facilities to ensure it is able to continue providing essential services to the area.

#### Three Ticks Test Positive for Lyme Disease Confirms Health Unit

NIPISSING & PARRY SOUND, ON – The North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) confirms that since April 2021, three black-legged ticks found in the district have tested positive for the bacterium *Borrelia burgdorferi*, a bacteria that can cause Lyme disease. Two of the ticks that tested positive were from the North Bay area, and one was from the Parry Sound area.

So far in 2021, a total of 37 ticks have been submitted for identification, of which 19 have been identified as black-legged ticks, also called deer tick or *Ixodes scapularis*. Although the number of ticks testing positive for the bacterium *Borrelia burgdorferi* is seemingly low, the Health Unit reminds the public to exercise caution when outdoors.

#### Methods to prevent tick bites include:

- Use bug spray or other insect repellants that contain DEET or Icaridin;
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants, and tuck your shirt into your pants and your pants into your socks;
- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily;
- Search your clothes and body for ticks at least once a day, paying special attention to areas such as the groin, navel, armpits, scalp, behind ears and knees;
- Don't forget to tick check children in your care;
- Try to stay on cleared paths when possible, as ticks are more commonly found in wooded areas, or in tall grasses, bushes and shrubs; and
- Take a shower as soon as you can after being outdoors.

If you find a tick on your body, remove it carefully with tweezers. Grasp the tick by the head as close to the skin as possible. If parts of the tick's mouth break off and remain in the skin, remove them with tweezers. If you can't remove the mouthparts, leave them alone and let the skin heal. Collect the tick, and make note of where you believe to have encountered it. See your health care provider right away, and when possible, bring the tick to the Health Unit.

#### **Quick Facts**

- There was one confirmed case of Lyme disease reported between January 1, 2020, and December 31, 2020, for residents of the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit area.
- Black-legged ticks are not common to the area; however, ticks can travel on birds and deer.
- Black-legged ticks can carry Lyme disease. Ticks are small blood-sucking insects that cannot fly. They
  live in wooded or brushy areas and attach themselves to passing animals or people. While most ticks
  do not carry diseases, it's important to avoid them and check for and remove them as soon as you find
  them.
- A person can become infected with Lyme disease if they are bitten by an infected tick.
- In most cases, the tick must usually be attached for at least 24 hours for the bacterium that causes Lyme disease to be passed on to the host.
- The most common symptom of Lyme disease is an expanding skin rash, which can appear between three and 30 days after a bite.
- If left untreated, other symptoms may develop including fever, chills, headache, fatigue muscle and joint aches, problems with your heartbeat, breathing, balance and short-term memory.
- The earlier the treatment is received the better.
- There has been an increase in confirmed cases of Lyme disease in Ontario, partly due to an increase and expansion of black-legged tick populations to new areas of the province.
- Infected ticks are continuing to spread and can now also be found in the Simcoe-Muskoka district,
  York Region and all of Eastern Ontario as well as Hamilton and parts of Northwestern Ontario. For
