Dear Head of Council/Chief Administrative Officer/Municipal Clerk:

On behalf of the Ministry of the Solicitor General, I want to thank all municipalities, together with their multi-sectoral partners, that have taken steps towards developing, adopting and implementing their local community safety and well-being (CSWB) plans.

As you know, the ministry extended the deadline for the completion and adoption of CSWB plans to July 1, 2021, to provide municipalities with an additional six months from the original deadline of January 1, 2021. Since then, we have received an overwhelming response from municipalities regarding their CSWB planning progress. This includes the submission of completed and interim plans and status updates. To date, of the 372 municipalities required to prepare and adopt a CSWB plan, 95 per cent (356 municipalities) have plans that are completed or in progress.

The development and completion of these plans demonstrates municipal leadership and commitment to proactively addressing crime and complex social issues facing your communities. Municipalities are best positioned to work with local partners to develop effective community strategies and programs and create sustainable communities that respond to local needs and conditions.

At this time, we are encouraging municipalities who have not already done so, to please submit their completed CSWB plan or provide an update on their CSWB planning status to the ministry via the following email address: <u>SOLGEN.Correspondence@ontario.ca</u>. Additionally, as a reminder, municipalities are required to publish their completed plans online within 30 days of adoption.

As you may be aware, under the *Police Services Act*, the Solicitor General has the power to enforce the CSWB planning requirements by appointing a CSWB planner to any municipalities that repeatedly and intentionally fail to complete a plan, at the municipality's expense. However, our government recognizes that municipalities are currently facing unprecedented circumstances in their communities due to the on-going impact of COVID-19. We also understand that some municipalities may experience delays in their planning and engagement processes as a result of the pandemic.

Ministry staff will continue to look for ways to support our municipal partners to ensure they are able to meet their legislative requirements for CSWB planning. Where possible, municipalities are encouraged to explore alternative and innovative approaches to continue on-going planning efforts, such as through virtual engagement (e.g., webinars, teleconferences, online surveys, etc.).

Municipalities are also encouraged to continue to work with respective police services, local multi-sectoral partners, and community members on the development and implementation of local CSWB plans. Localized, community-driven collaboration remains key to the success of CSWB planning, given the focus on creating workable solutions that are grounded in and tailored to individual community needs and features.

Ontario is committed to preventing negative impacts from conflicting land uses within communities, such as the effects of industrial noise and odour pollution on residential areas.

On May 4, 2021, Ontario proposed changes to the current land use compatibility guidelines ("D-Series guidelines") that municipalities and other planning authorities use when making land use planning decisions. The proposed changes aimed to update, renew and consolidate our land use compatibility guidelines to help ensure proper compatibility studies are completed before new sensitive land uses, such as residences, are built near existing major facilities (including industries or industrial areas), and vice versa.

During the 94-day consultation period, the ministry received over 500 comments. In response to the comments received, the ministry has decided to not move forward with this version of the proposed Land Use Compatibility Guideline. The current D-Series guidelines for land use compatibility will remain in effect and will continue to be the provincial guidelines referenced in the Provincial Policy Statement, 2020 and A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe land use compatibility policies.

Greetings,

On October 7, the Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade introduced the proposed Supporting People and Businesses Act, 2021 in the Ontario Legislature. As part of this Bill, the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry (NDMNRF) proposed legislative changes to three statutes. These proposed changes are intended to support the government's commitment to reduce regulatory burden on business, and modernize government to be simpler, faster, and more cost-effective, without compromising public health, safety and the environment. The proposed changes include the following:

Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994

Proposed amendments to the Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994 would enable streamlined authorizations for personal use harvesting, including fuelwood, building products and Christmas trees. These authorizations would be available once regulations are in place prescribing the terms and conditions that may apply to personal use harvesting. If these proposed amendments are enacted, the ministry will consult with the public, stakeholders and municipalities about any subsequent regulations proposed to implement them.

Professional Foresters Act, 2000:

Proposed amendments are intended to modify the scope of practice to better define what professional forestry is and reduce the overlap with other occupations (e.g., arborists, biologists).

Public Lands Act:

The proposed amendments to the Public Lands Act would:

- 1. Provide the Minister explicit authority to set, charge, waive, change, or refund fees related to the management, use or disposition of public lands to provide for a more efficient approvals process.
- 2. Provide the Minister explicit authority to make public lands-related decisions that currently rest with the Lieutenant Governor in Council (LGIC) to reduce the time needed for approvals.
- 3. Prevent the loss of public lands without the Crown's consent and for less than fair market value due to adverse possession by third parties, including providing the Minister with any necessary related authorities.
- 4. Allow dispositions or transfers of lands bordering water bodies where less than 25 per cent of frontage would remain public land to support Indigenous community interests, land claim settlements, and local community and economic development. These proposed amendments are not intended to significantly increase dispositions along water bodies and the ministry will still be required to undertake any applicable environmental assessment process and fulfill the duty to consult obligations, should they arise, prior to making any individual land disposition decision.

If the proposed amendments are passed by the legislature, they would improve clarity, customer service and reduce unnecessary burdens, resulting in a more effective and less time-consuming approvals process.

Additional information on all the proposals is also provided in the Appendix.

These proposed changes appear in the Supporting People and Businesses Act, 2021 that is currently before the Legislature. The Legislature will determine the next steps associated with the Bill. Appendix: Additional Information on the Proposed Amendments

Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994

NDMNRF is proposing amendments to the Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994 to improve service delivery and save people time when seeking approval to harvest wood from Crown lands for personal use, such as firewood, building products and Christmas trees.

Currently, the licensing requirements to harvest Crown forest resources for personal, non-commercial use are the same as the licensing requirements for industrial or commercial use. The Ministry's proposed changes would distinguish authorization requirements for wood harvested from Crown lands for personal use from industrial/commercial use. This would make the approval process easier for clients, forest industry and government.

The proposed changes would if enacted by the Legislature, enable the ministry to:

- Streamline authorization requirements,
- Create clear and consistent program delivery across the province,
- Reduce administrative burden, staff time and effort for government,
- Improve access by making applications available online, and
- Remove burden of developing overlapping agreements for forest industry.

Before the proposed amendments could be implemented, regulations would be required prescribing the terms and conditions applicable to personal use harvesting.

If the proposed amendments are passed by the legislature, the Ministry will consult with the public, stakeholders and municipalities about any subsequent regulation proposals developed to implement them.

Professional Foresters Act, 2000

The purpose of the Professional Foresters Act is to regulate the practice of professional forestry and provide the Ontario Professional Foresters Association (OPFA) the ability to govern its members in accordance with the Act, the regulation and the by-laws in order that the public interest may be served and protected.

In response to requests from the Ontario Professional Foresters Association, we are proposing changes to the PFA that would enhance the ability of the OPFA to provide oversight of its members by adding clarity to the practice of foresters, while limiting the potential impacts to other natural resource professionals (e.g., arborists) and municipal delivery of forest management programs and services.

Public Lands Act

1. Shifting certain decision-making authority regarding public lands to the Minister of NDMNRF from the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

Most public lands related decisions rest with the Minister of NDMNRF, however, some are made by the Lieutenant Governor in Council through an Order in Council. The Order in Council process takes time and has resulted in delays for clients awaiting decisions. Providing the following authorities to the Minister would be consistent with most other Minister authorities for the planning, management, and dispositions of public lands under the *Act:*

- i. Setting apart areas of public lands for any purpose that will benefit research in and the management, use and administration of public lands and forests.
- iii. Approving the disposal of public land to Ministry officers or employees (while meeting obligations set out in O. Reg. 381/07 regarding conflict of interest rules for public servants under the Public Service of Ontario Act).
- iv. Releasing a habendum restriction in letters patent, (i.e., removing a restriction that the land must be used for a specific purpose, such as for school purposes).
- v. Releasing a condition in an Order in Council which requires, where the management of public lands was transferred to the federal government, that the lands be returned to Ontario if the federal government is no longer using the land.
- vi. Releasing other restrictions in letters patents (e.g., a requirement that Lieutenant Governor in Council provide approval for a landowner to sell their land).
- 2. Allowing limited exemptions from requirement for Minster to set apart public reserves on water bodies.

Section 3 of the Public Lands Act sets out that where 25 per cent or more of the frontage on a waterbody is public lands that the Minister shall set apart at least 25 per cent of the lands, to a depth determined by the Minister, for public recreation and access. On water bodies where less than 25 per cent of the frontage is public lands, all remaining public lands are to be set aside for such purposes.

The proposed amendments would provide certain exemptions to the Public Lands Act Section 3 requirements, and ensure that the following would not be prevented:

i. Directing a disposition or ordering a transfer of control to implement an agreement with an Indigenous community. This may include transfers to the federal government to support land claims or additions to reserve or direct

sales to an incorporated Indigenous community-run organization for community or economic development initiatives.

- ii. Ordering the transfer to the federal government (or its agencies) of control of public lands. In addition to land claims or additions to reserve the federal government may require public lands for infrastructure projects or for the creation of protected areas.
- iii. Ordering the transfer to other provincial ministries (or their agencies) of control of public lands. Provincial government ministries may require public lands for infrastructure projects or for expansion of protected areas.
- iv. Directing a disposition to a municipality. Municipalities may require lands to support community or economic development initiatives such as waterfront improvement (i.e., trails, tourism attractions).

This proposal for Public Lands Act Section 3 is not intended to significantly increase dispositions along water bodies and the ministry will still be required to undertake any applicable environmental assessment process and fulfill the duty to consult prior to making any individual land disposition or transfer decisions.

3. Preventing adverse possession of public lands through unauthorized use, possession, or occupation.

Individuals may obtain possessory title to public lands after 60 years of adverse possession (i.e., unauthorized tenancy or "squatting"). This prevents the Province from preserving public lands for uses including economic development and environmental protection, receiving fair value for lands through sale or lease, and the efficient settlement of Indigenous land claims. Further details include:

- i. Proposed changes to the Act would prevent any person from acquiring an interest in public lands through use, possession or occupation of the lands without permission from the Province (i.e., unauthorized tenancy or "squatting").
- ii. Persons who can demonstrate possessory title to public land (60+ years of adverse possession) prior to any change being made would not be impacted.
- iii. The ministry would continue to process quit claim letters patent applications for persons in these circumstances.
- iv. The proposed changes would provide the Minister with the authority to correct registrations or deposits against public lands that have been made without the Province's permission.

- v. Eliminating adverse possession would prevent limitations on the availability of land for exercising Aboriginal and treaty rights and settling land claims.
- 4. Clarifying Minister's authority to manage fees for all services, permissions, or decisions.

The proposed change clarifies that the Minister has explicit authority to set, charge, waive, change, or refund fees for all services, permissions or decisions related to the management, use or disposition of public lands. No new fees or changes to existing fees are being proposed or would result if this proposal is passed.

If the proposed changes to the legislation are enacted, the Ministry would update O.Reg.326/94 (Crown land camping permit) and O.Reg.975 (Work Permits) to ensure these regulations align with the changes made to the Public Lands Act.

Please be advised that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Learnington, at its meeting held Tuesday, September 14, 2021 enacted the following resolution:

No. C-279-21

WHEREAS residents and staff at long-term care (LTC) homes have been disproportionately affected by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS in the first wave of the pandemic (March - July 2020) there were approximately 5,488 resident cases and 2,290 staff cases in Ontario and tragically 1,817 residents and seven staff lost their lives to this disease; and

WHEREAS on 15 April 2020, Premier Ford stated, "we will stop at nothing to protect those who cannot protect themselves. Today we are launching an all-out plan to fight COVID-19 in our long-term care homes. We will fortify the iron ring of protection around our long-term care residents and those who care for them. We'll go further in our testing, screening, surveillance, targeting the homes facing outbreaks"; and

WHEREAS there have been approximately 9,417 resident cases and 4,217 staff cases in Ontario in the second wave (2 September 2020-16 February 2021) and 1,869 residents and three staff lost their lives, representing an increase of resident deaths from the first to second wave; and

WHEREAS for-profit LTC homes have seen a disproportionate incidence of care failing to meet the standard of the Long-Term Care Act, which states that "...a long-term care home is primarily the home of its residents and is to be operated so that it is a place where they may live with dignity and in security, safety and comfort and have their physical, psychological, social, spiritual and cultural needs adequately met"; and

WHEREAS the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) report dated 20 May 2020 revealed conditions including inadequate staffing levels and training, limited medical supplies, unsafe medication administration, insufficient procedures to reduce the spread of

COVID-19, poor infection prevention and control standards of practice, deficiencies in infrastructure and significant concerns about standards of care including seniors calling out for help, rotting food, missed meals, seniors left in soiled diapers and linens and cockroach and bug infestations; and

WHEREAS similar conditions were found in the second wave, including ongoing shortages of qualified, trained staff, ineffective use of PPE to prevent COVID-19 transmission, violation of protocols and practices including one instance in which residents who had tested positive for COVID-19 had their door handles removed, physical distancing and isolation challenges from continuing to house several residents in ward rooms with a shared bathroom and ongoing infection prevention and control standard concerns, all problems that were not fixed after the recommendations of the CAF;

WHEREAS the Provincial Government has launched an independent commission to investigate COVID-19 spread within LTC homes, how residents, staff and families were impacted and the adequacy of measures taken by the province and other parties to prevent, isolate and contain the spread; and

WHEREAS the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) has provided a Boardapproved submission, Improving the Long-Term Care Outbreak Response in Ontario: Submission to the Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission, on 29 January 2021, outlining recommendations to the Commission on behalf of the municipal governments that operate 100 of the 626 long-term care homes in Ontario; and

WHEREAS AMO's submission puts forward 48 recommendations for action in both public and private long-term care homes across nine themes: Vision for Long-Term Care and Leadership Culture, Public Health and Safety, Planning and Communications, Staffing Measures, Care for Residents, Funding, Inspections -Enforcement and Compliance, and Mental Health and Well-Being; and

WHEREAS one of the key recommendations of the AMO submission is that the Ministry of Long-Term Care and Ministry of Health review the adequacy of infection prevention and control programs under the Long-Term Care Homes Act, 2007 in preventing and managing COVID-19 outbreaks, and to institute higher standards with increased funding to homes to implement these standards; and

WHEREAS the Canada Health Act's aim is to protect, promote and restore the physical and mental well-being of residents of Canada, and that the Federal Government provides health care funding to Provinces and Territories through the Canada Health Transfer; and

WHEREAS the Federal Government does not currently provide funding earmarked to support the LTC home sector, and;

WHEREAS the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) works with and advocates to the Federal Government to secure new tools and empower municipalities to build stronger communities; and

WHEREAS the operation of LTC homes is a municipal responsibility in Ontario but is of significance to the federal-municipal relationship.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT Learnington Municipal Council endorses AMO's recommendations contained in its submission to the Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission;

THAT Learnington Municipal Council strongly urges the Provincial Government to move forward with implementation of these recommendations, including instituting higher standards with increased funding to homes to implement those standards;

THAT Learnington Municipal Council advocate to the Federal Government to enhance federal health care funding to the Provinces and Territories, specifically dedicating funding to long- term care, and to undertake further efforts to protect, promote and restore the physical and mental well-being of long-term care residents in Canada;

THAT Learnington Municipal Council request the FCM to develop a policy and advocacy position on enhanced federal support for long-term care;

District of Parry Sound (West) Belvedere Heights Home for the Aged - Community Support Services (the "Organization") is a non-profit organization providing volunteer supported programs to the community to foster health and independence for the sick and disabled.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements of the Organization are the representations of management prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for local governments as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada. The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies followed in the preparation of these financial statements:

(a) Accrual basis of accounting:

Sources of revenue and expenditures are reported on the accrual basis of accounting.

The accrual basis of accounting recognizes revenue as it becomes available and measurable; expenditures are recognized as they are incurred and measurable as a result of receipt of goods or services and the creation of a legal obligation to pay.

(b) Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost which includes amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset.

(c) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the periods specified. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include valuation allowances for receivables. Actual results could differ from those estimates. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the year in which they become known.

2. Financial risks:

(a) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Organization will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Organization manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations. The Organization prepares budgets and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations. There has been no change to the risk exposure from 2020.

(b) Credit risk:

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty may default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss. The Organization is exposed to credit risk with respect to the accounts receivable. The Organization assesses, on a continuous basis, accounts receivable and provides for any amounts that are collectible in the allowance for doubtful accounts.

2. Financial risks (continued):

(c) Other risks:

The Corporation's main sources of revenue are from funding. In March 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization. This resulted in the Canadian and Provincial governments enacting emergency measures to combat the spread of the virus.

The impact of COVID-19 is expected to negatively impact operations for a duration that cannot be reasonably predicted. The further overall operational and financial impact is highly dependent on the duration of COVID-19, including the potential occurrence of additional waves of the pandemic, and could be affected by other factors that are currently not known at this time. Management is actively monitoring the effect of the pandemic on its financial condition, liquidity, operations, suppliers, and workforce. Given the daily evolution of the pandemic and the global responses to curb its spread, the Organization is not able to fully estimate the effects of the pandemic on its results of operations, financial condition, or liquidity at this time.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements of District of Parry Sound (West) Belvedere Heights Home for The Aged (the "Home") are prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for local governments as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board and the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the Home are as follows:

(a) Accrual basis of accounting:

The accrual basis of accounting recognizes revenues as they become available and measurable; expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable as a result of receipt of goods or services and the creation of a legal obligation to pay.

(b) Deposits:

Deposits represent deposits received on Seniors Life Lease units. These amounts will be recognized as part of the proceeds on the sale of the life leases in the year the unit is sold.

(c) Ministry of Long-Term Care:

The Ministry of Long-Term Care undertakes a financial review of the Home's operations from time to time. Adjustments to the financial statements, if any, as a result of these reviews are accounted for in the period when notification is received from the Ministry.

(d) Reserves and Reserve Funds:

Certain amounts, as approved by the Home, are set aside in reserves and reserves funds for future operating and capital purposes. Transfers to and from reserves and reserve funds are adjusted to the respected fund when approved.

(e) Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost which includes amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost, less residual value is amortized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives as follows:

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(f) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian public sector accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the dates of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the carrying amount of tangible capital assets and valuation allowances for accounts receivable. Actual results could differ from those estimates. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the year in which they become known.

2. Participating municipalities:

The participating municipalities are as follows:

Town of Parry Sound Township of the Archipelago Township of Carling Township of McDougall Township of McKellar Township of McMurrich/Monteith Township of Seguin Township of Whitestone

3. Structural compliance funding:

Under the terms of the development agreement with the Ministry of Long-Term Care, the Home has a long-term funding contract to receive funding in the amount of \$7,631,105 for the Redevelopment Project, of which \$6,300,215 has been received by year end. The amount of \$382,586 (2019 - \$381,540) was received in the current year and the balance will be received in monthly payments over the next 90 months.

The agreement is subject to termination by the Ministry if the Home is unable to complete the project, breaches any term or condition of the agreement or ceases to operate.

8. Pension agreements:

The Home made contributions to OMERS (the "Plan"), which is a multi-employer Plan, on behalf of all permanent, full-time and part-time members of its staff. The Plan is a defined benefit plan which specifies the amount of the retirement benefit to be received by the employees based on the length of service and rates of pay.

The contributions required on account of current service for 2020 of \$445,709 (2019 - \$425,195) is included in the current fund operations.

9. Budget figures:

Budgets established for capital funds, reserves and reserve funds are based on a project-oriented basis, the costs of which may be carried out over one or more years. Revenue fund budgets are affected on an ongoing basis as various government programs become available to the Home. As such, the budgets are not directly comparable with current year actual amounts and Accumulated Surplus and Changes in Net Financial Assets.

10. Segment disclosures:

Segmented information has not been provided as it has been determined that such disclosures would not provide any additional relevant information to users.

11. Commitments and contingencies:

a) Consulting services:

On December 14, 2020, the Home entered into a consulting services agreement with West Parry Sound Health Centre (the "consultant"). Under the terms of the agreement, the consultant shall provide advice and recommendations on an as-needed basis at the request of the Home in relations to its business and operations. This agreement has an annual fee of \$326,000, requiring payment in equal monthly instalments. This agreement remains in effective until terminated on the earlier of December 31, 2021 and the date upon which the parties have entered into an approved management services agreement.

b) Administrator services:

On December 14, 2020, the Home entered into an administrator services agreement with West Parry Sound Health Centre (the "Hospital"). Under the terms of the agreement, the Hospital shall make available personnel to serve as the Home's Administrator. This agreement has an annual fee of \$147,000, requiring payment in equal monthly instalments. This agreement remains in effective until terminated on the earlier of December 31, 2021 and the date upon which the parties have entered into an approved management services agreement.

12. Effects of COVID-19:

In March of 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization and has had a significant financial, market and social dislocating impact.

Financial statements are required to be adjusted for events occurring between the date of the financial statements and the date of the auditors' report which provides additional evidence relating to conditions that existed as at year end. At the time of approval of these financial statements, the Home implemented the following activities in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- Enhanced protocols implemented in line with Public Health guidelines; and
- Put in place measures to limit and control access to the premises

The situation is dynamic and the ultimate duration and magnitude of the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on the Home's operations and financial position is not known at this time. These impacts could include a decline in future revenues, changes to the value of assets and liabilities and the use of accumulated net assets to sustain operations. An estimate of the financial effect of the pandemic on the Home is not practical at this time.

During the year, the Ministry of Long-Term Care provided additional funding relating to the COVID-19 pandemic. A total of \$835,069 was received in the form of additional funding for operating and capital costs incurred as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic. An additional \$405,502 in funding was received in the form of pandemic pay to help cover the additional wage paid to healthcare workers as a result of provincial legislation. As at December 31, 2020, \$1,026,970 in additional funding was recognized in the Ministry of Long-Term Care – current on the statement of operations and accumulated surplus.

BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES

REPORTS

Some areas higher than others. No real reason other than the influx of people. No explanation for why some investigations are higher than others.

Each township gets its own numbers for the quarter. Not received by D. Crocker – forwarded by S/Sgt.

RMS Overall

Violent crime down 40% from last year and overall 32%. Most significant decrease is crimes against other persons. Property crime is down. Not unusual as a rash of B&E's can inflate numbers. Thefts and frauds are also down. Mischiefs and possession of stolen property have increased. Drug possession numbers are down. Not much change in trafficking numbers. Clearance rates are down this quarter but up overall. Unfounded incidents are down by 36%.

Criminal record checks are down due to the pandemic

- Only front line workers being checked
- Now re-opened and doing all types

S/Sgt. asked how committee wished to proceed with individual municipality numbers. Agreed that they would go through each municipality.

Archipelago

Nothing to speak to - differences are minor

Carling

D. Crocker - Assaults and violent crime are up for overall, same for this quarter S/Sgt. advised we are in strange times

- cannot speak to specifics but definitely seeing strange numbers

- S/Sgt. would like to compare over five years

D. Crocker – 31 ytd from 22 in billing summary

- S/Sgt. indicated nothing jumping out from numbers

Parry Sound

B. Keith – Stats are down compared to West Parry Sound.

Drugs overall for West Parry Sound has increased and questioning why this has occurred

- S/Sgt. advised that this was driven by one investigation that resulted in a warrant

Seguin

R. Osborne - Numbers are pretty stable.

Question about neighbour disputes at properties – problem with short term rentals

- Should neighbours call police if problem with tenants?
- S/Sgt. advised this would be dependent on type of call and jurisdiction, ie. Bylaw or police
 - another factor would be whether By-law is available at the time
 - R. Osborne indicated that By-law is available 24/7 in Seguin
 - police can also provide assistance to By-law if needed

Whitestone

Not much to comment on

- numbers not very high
- more people around contributing
- down on some serious crimes

Detachment ICON

No short term solution to fix numbers. Analytics department is still working on a fix. The best we can do is provide previous quarter as the current quarter is not accurate.

Can expect a significant increase in the Big 4 this year as already significantly up in the first quarter. Focused patrols increase the numbers. Officers are better trained in SFST and every officer has the training now.

R. Osborne – Are cruisers any better equipped?

S/Sgt. – There are enough roadsides for every officer working, marine included. R. Osborne – Is the number of people driving impaired likely the same, just catching more?

B. Keith – GSPS noted an increase in impaired driving too. Pandemic is a factor. S/Sgt. – We will have a better idea in a few years why numbers are the way they are now.

CRS Report

Patrol hours are up. Marine patrol hours are standard for this time of year. 25 hours of ATV patrol due to people camping on Crown Land.

Transfers – One member to the TIME team. A replacement is coming from Southern Georgian Bay Detachment on 04Aug21. New Sergeant is from Norfolk – very experienced officer.

Awards – Put on hold due to pandemic. Awards are being sent out by RHQ (Regional Headquarters) and will be one on one presentations. The formal ceremony is being forgone because of the pandemic.

CFS Billing

Some up and some down. No rhyme or reason. Influx of people has positive and negative effects.

Archipelago

G. Walker – Noticed a huge number of properties changing hands. New people coming to area and seem to be causing problems.

D. Crocker – Notes the problems on the roads. Speeds are a huge issue.

Shebeshekong Road has been very bad. What do police suggest?

S/Sgt. – People need to call police, need to know problem areas. This helps the detachment know where to conduct focused patrols. The information is captured by the Regional Analyst. Hitting the area hard helps change behaviour. Officers need to be out there when the behaviour is happening though. Have done focused patrol in some areas with great results and may need to re-visit areas at times though. Municipalities can implement traffic calming measures too.

J. McEwen – Rate payers are hesitant to call in

S/Sgt. - Have to put onus back on them

R. Osborne – People don't always want to leave name when reporting.

S/Sgt. – Don't necessarily have to identify self. Crime Stoppers can be used if not urgent.

R. Osborne – Highway 401 mentality is coming up here. Can officers stop a pack of drivers all doing the same speed?

S/Sgt. – yes

G. Walker – Billing makes sense. Close in number of calls but bigger difference in hours – makes sense due to type of calls.

Carling

D. Crocker – Nothing outrageous. Increase in operational hours and an increase in mental health calls.

S/Sgt. – Mental health calls are up across the board.

Parry Sound

B. Keith – Wondering about Other Operational, ie. Lost Property and Dropped Cell S/Sgt. – Lost Property incidents mean anything lost that does not fit a specific code. The increase in people in the community could cause this increase.

- Dropped Cell – dropped call or hang up before goes through, no voice contact.

B. Keith – Would like a lexicon or agenda page that explains acronyms.

Seguin

S/Sgt. – Hours are down a bit from 2020. Violent crime down significantly – 80 hours in 2020, 16 in 2021. Other incidents are close. Majority of gas drive offs are not actual thefts, there is no intent. These incidents are common at the Petro-Canada as well Canadian Tire and Shell.

R. Osborne – Is the detachment at full compliment?

S/Sgt. – Yes, when member arrives in August.

R. Osborne – Any movement on configuration of board?

S/Sgt. – Nothing yet and likely will not hear from Solicitor General until all municipalities have made their submissions.

R. Osborne – Seguin and McDougall have made submissions.

D. Crocker – Does not anticipate hearing until fall.

Whitestone

Overall numbers are down and hopefully this continues. Property crime violations are up a bit. Good in some ways to have people around but can also cause issues.

CSO Report

Still fairly involved in community and part of a lot of meetings. No questions on what CSO provided.

Drugs

Marijuana seizures not as common. Focusing on drugs that are directly affecting the community. A traffic stop in the Wal-Mart parking lot resulted in fentanyl being found in a vehicle with a toddler. The other main incident was a motor vehicle collision on Highway 69 in which a vehicle went head on with a tractor trailer. The occupants were transporting drugs and money.

D/Cst. B. Fox is the Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) member for West Parry Sound. He can request the assistance of other CSCU members to assist him. D/Cst. Fox is passionate about his work and knows the players. The detachment plans on designating another member to assist him if the detachment's off season.

D. Crocker – Any drugs related to Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs?

S/Sgt. – The big picture is that drugs are always related to organized crime. They are mainly originating from the GTA and there is a chain.

D. Crocker – Is D/Cst. Fox the person to contact with information?

S/Sgt. – Yes. However, if the person wishes to remain anonymous then the safest way is to go through Crime Stoppers. This provides protection from case law to the individual.

B. Keith – Does succession planning play a role in putting someone in with D/Cst. Fox? S/Sgt. – It absolutely plays a role. This is a unique position. Another example would be the position of marine officers. This position also requires careful succession planning.

NEW BUSINESS

Focused Patrol

1) Whitestone had complaints about people camping on Crown Land during EMCPA. These complaints were brought to the MNR and the OPP. A joint operation was conducted. The first step was to deter people with RIDE. Following this, officers actually went into the location and gave the people a chance to leave. If the people were still at the location when officers went back, then they were charged. The messaging got out and prevented a lot of people from coming up to the area. Members covered the area for two weeks and continued to check it regularly although it was difficult to access. Our four dedicated marine officers, also ATV trained, provide coverage seven days a week. They continue to check the location.

2) Hwy 124 Construction

This construction covers a 60 km/h stretch. It has been made a focused patrol. There has been a change in legislation pertaining to Stunt Driving. 40 km/h or more over in a posted 80 km/h or less zone is now deemed to be Stunt Driving. Officers are patrolling while workers are there.

R. Osborne – Are fines doubled in zone? S/Sqt. – Yes, if workers present.

Format for Upcoming CPAC

R. Osborne – Suggesting that a timeline be set for how long meetings should be on Zoom rather than doing meeting by meeting.

J. McEwen – Recommends wait until after next meeting. Will have a better picture by then of how long is needed.

B. Keith – Suggests that end of January would be a good time. The Police Services Board information should be available by then.

S/Sgt. – We will continue virtual until the January meeting.

G. Walker – Will check with MaryAnn to see if they can host next meeting. Advises that unless hear otherwise, will be able to host.

Correspondence

No correspondence.

Other Business

B. Keith – Would be beneficial to have police on Joseph between Church Street and No Frills due to high speed of motorists. Speed spy was used. Thursday and Friday between 1600 and 1800 hrs as well as around 1330 hrs seem to be the problem times. S/Sgt. – Will have Sergeants encourage officers to have two vehicles sit in area doing notes. Two vehicles are necessary for officer safety.

R. Osborne – Expressed condolences for the loss of the Toronto Police Service Officer. It is a dangerous and demanding job and officers deserve a great deal of respect.

G. Walker left the meeting at 2030 hrs.

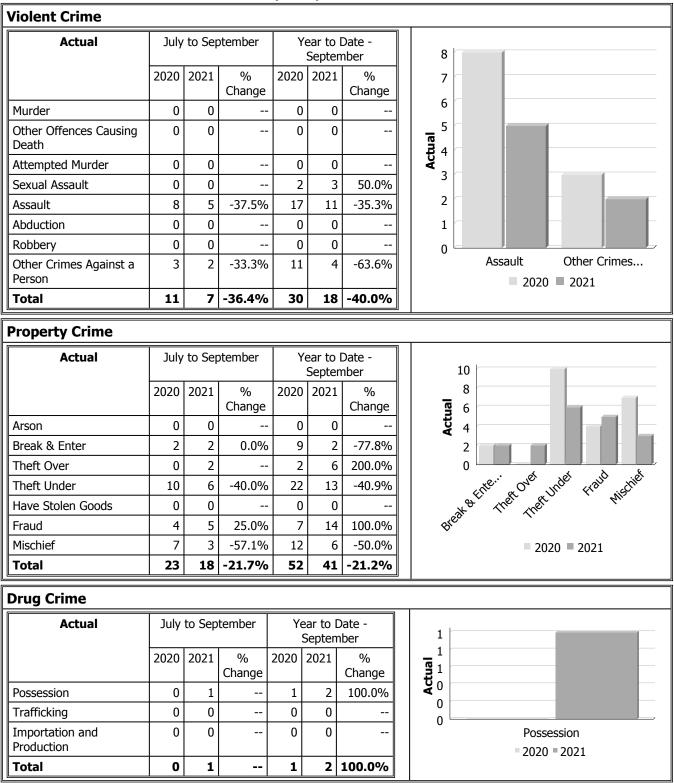

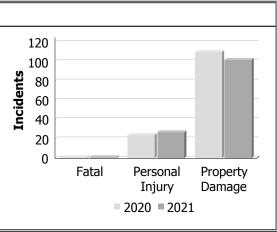

Benchmark Drug Offence:

- 1) On the 5th of July, officers conducted a traffic stop on Hwy 400 is Seguin Township where Psilocybin chocolate was found in plain view. A conductive energy weapon and several thousand dollars of Canadian Currency were subsequently located in the vehicle. A female from Toronto was charged with Possession of a Schedule III substance, Unauthorized Possession of a Weapon, Occupant of Motor Vehicle knowing there was a Prohibited or Restricted Weapon, Possession of Property obtained by Crime over \$5000, Possession of Illicit Cannabis, and Possession of a Schedule III substance for the Purpose of Trafficking. This is still before the courts.
- 2) On the 8th of July, members of the West Parry Sound OPP, CSCU, and OCEB conducted a CDSA search warrant at a residence in the Town of Parry Sound. One local male and one local female were subsequently arrested and a quantity of cocaine, fentanyl, crystal meth and oxycodone was seized. The female was held for bail and the male was released. All charges are still before the courts.
- 3) On the 5th of August, a local male and female were reported to be intoxicated outside of the LCBO by staff. The male was arrested for public intox. The female was arrested and charged for possession for the purpose of trafficking fentanyl and heroin. She was held for bail and the charges are still before the courts.

4) On the 28th of September, police received a report of possible drug use on Church Street. The suspect vehicle was stopped on Rosetta St. There were two occupants from the Midland area in the vehicle. The male was wanted out of Barrie and subsequently arrested. During a search incident to arrest, police located a large amount of cocaine and fentanyl and a possible firearm in the vehicle. Both occupants of the vehicle were charged with Possession of a Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking and Possession of a Weapon for a Dangerous Purpose. The charges are still before the court.

Re: New Recreation Centre

Dear Mr. Sanderson and Mr. McGarvey:

Given the June 7, 2021, announcement that the West Parry Sound Area Recreation and Culture Centre (the Wellness Centre) will receive \$23.3 million from the Government of Canada and Government of Ontario to assist in the funding of the Wellness Centre, Parry Sound Area Active Transportation (PSAAT) feels that it is very important that site selection and design of the Wellness Centre prioritize principles of energy efficiency and sustainability, for example by maximizing active transportation access for staff and users. Development of the Wellness Centre is a great opportunity to promote the current and future health and wellbeing of visitors and residents. With a long-term view, design and implementation can lead to a new municipal building that contributes to local climate change plans and reduced overall operating costs.

As such, PSAAT would like to make the following recommendations:

- 1. Location
 - a. Should be within easy walking and cycling distance of as many of the seven (7) municipalities' residents as possible. Ideally, it will be in close proximity to schools so it can be utilized during downtime and also for physical education and training programs as well as competition events.
- 2. Access
 - a. Provide for end of trip facilities (e.g. equipment storage and bicycle racks, sidewalks and shaded areas).
 - b. If the site location is out of town, i.e., in close proximity to the current YMCA, it should have excellent walking and bike access with bridges over the larger roads.
- 3. Walking Facilities
 - a. Offer four (4) season walking facilities.
- 4. Outdoor Exercise
 - a. Allow for future sheltered outdoor walking exercise facilities for year-round, all-weather use.
- 5. Integration with Long Range Plans
 - a. Act as an integral part of, and perhaps as the hub, of the region's walking and cycling route and trail system.
- 6. Environmental and Energy Leadership



- a. Lead by example in terms of energy efficiency and renewable energy generation. Employ geothermal storage and both solar photovoltaic and hot water energy harvesting capacity. If the facility is located within several hundred metres of other large buildings, it should act as a hub in a district heating system.
 - Further, there are grant opportunities, including a \$175,000 grant available for geothermal site testing from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.
 - If natural gas is still deemed to be necessary for heating the structure, it should be regarded as a short term bridge energy source or as a backup to the inevitable all electric/renewable and geothermal system.
- b. Provide charging facilities for both EVs (fast chargers to 250+kWh) and electric cycles 120V in the plans. Revenue will be generated by the fast chargers but 120v charging should be free to promote biking and also because the cost of collecting revenue would be higher than the revenue itself.

Health Unit Reaching People Where They Are At

NIPISSING & PARRY SOUND, ON - Since the start of the COVID-19 vaccine rollout, the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) has worked to ensure the COVID-19 vaccine is available to all eligible individuals in the district. This has required a variety of strategies to reach different populations within the district, including the mobile vaccine clinic.

Between September 4 and October 4, 2021, the mobile vaccine clinic has administered 1,984 doses of COVID-19 vaccine; 848 first doses, 1,080 second doses and 66 third doses to those eligible.

"The use of the mobile vaccine clinic has allowed us to reach people in locations that we wouldn't have been able to before," explains Andrea McLellan, Director of COVID-19 Immunization Strategy. "We have been able to meet people where they are at, literally, including smaller municipalities and outside locations where people tend to visit regularly, such as grocery stores."

As of October 6, 2021 at 3 p.m., 85 per cent of residents 12 years of age and older have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine and 79 per cent of residents 12 years of age and older are fully vaccinated. To reach the provincial target of 90 per cent of eligible individuals to be fully vaccinated, the Health Unit's district needs 5,746 people who have not been vaccinated to be fully vaccinated and 6,698 people who already have their first dose to get their second dose.

Those who have questions about the COVID-19 vaccine can call the Health Unit's call centre at <u>1-844-478-1400</u> or book a phone call with a physician through <u>VaxFacts</u>. Parents who have questions about the COVID-19 vaccine for their child can speak to a pediatric nurse through <u>SickKids</u>. The vaccine is still only available for children born in 2009 or earlier.

Individuals who wish to receive their COVID-19 vaccine can visit <u>myhealthunit.ca/GetVaccinated</u> for up-todate information on where the mobile clinic will be. Appointments are currently not required to attend vaccine clinics, and both Pfizer and Moderna are offered at all clinics.

See the Person. Be Kind. Everyone Has a Story. Take Action on Stigma and Homelessness.

NORTH BAY, ON - Nipissing District Homelessness and Housing Partnership (NDHHP) has launched a homelessness anti-stigma campaign called *See the Person*. The campaign promotes kindness toward people without a place to call home and encourages community members to learn more about housing and homelessness in their community. NDHHP is a collective of local organizations that work to reduce, address, and prevent homelessness in the Nipissing District.

In the campaign, people with lived experience of homelessness, or 'experts by experience', share their insights and personal experiences. Jennifer Farrell, an expert by experience, says it's simple, "See the Person. Be kind. Everyone has a story," when discussing how people who are experiencing homelessness should be treated. "Negative attitudes and stereotypes are extremely harmful and damage a person's self-worth. It is very challenging to face stigma while managing other challenges in one's life. We need to work toward a more caring, inclusive community."

Stigma results in serious mental health impacts like deep feelings of shame. It contributes to social exclusion and acts as a barrier for people to seek necessary services within their community. Farrell says, "When people are treated with dignity and respect, it opens the door for healing and a sense of belonging. That's what everyone needs when they're down."

Homelessness is a complex community issue that has become increasingly visible in Nipissing District. The campaign aims to shed light on some of the key drivers of homelessness. Tawnia Healy, Community Health Promoter with North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit says, "Homelessness is often due to factors outside of a person's control." Factors such as poverty, lack of access to an affordable place to live, inadequate income, racism, discrimination, and impacts of childhood trauma all have a role to play in homelessness. Healy says, "It is unfair and unjust to stigmatize people for their health or housing status when the conditions for good health are simply not available to everyone."

Through the See the Person campaign, NDHHP encourages community members to take action on stigma and homelessness through compassion, education and advocacy.
